A bill establishing a joint committee on Kansas Security, with 5 members each from the HB 2393: House and Senate appointed by Legislative leadership.

Representative Jim Morrison testified before the committee and ask for consideration in amending the bill to grant the newly established Joint Committee on Security with more authority, by changing Section 1, line 13 and 14 to reduce the number of members appointed from the House and Senate from (5) to (3). He stated that the reasoning behind this request is that during the legislative session, it's impossible to meet with a ten (10) member Joint Committee due to scheduling conflicts. He also requested that the language in section (c) lines 37, 38, and 39, and 43 be stricken from the bill (Attachment 1).

Committee questions followed.

Robert Waller, Senior Fiscal Analyst, Legislative Research Department gave a brief summary of HB 2393 regarding Kansas Security.

Senator Jay Scott Emler spoke in support of HB 2393. He believed that the Security Committee should be a standing committee that will be able to serve the public welfare on a year round basis (Attachment 2).

Committee questions followed.

Representative Tafanelli announced that the hearing on HB 2393 was now closed. No action was taken on the bill. Action will be taken on the bill next week allowing committee members time to draft amendments on the bill.

Representative Tafanelli opened the hearings on HB 2687 and requested that staff member Robert Waller, Senior Fiscal Analyst, Legislative Research Department give a brief summary of the bill.

**HB 2687** A bill directing the Division of Budget to track all Department of Homeland Security federal funds that enter the state budget system, and place the authority of reviewing, coordinating, and approving the distribution of all Department of Homeland Security funds with the Adjutant General's Department, Division of Emergency Management.

Senator Jay Emler spoke in support of **HB 2687**. Concern has been expressed at the Governor's Council and during Interim Committee meetings that funds may not be distributed in the most effective and beneficial

manner due to lack of coordination. <u>HB 2687</u> places the responsibility for the coordination with the division of Kansas Emergency Management in the Office of the Adjutant General. There is a need to coordinate the many sources so that there is fair distribution of funding (<u>Attachment 3</u>). This bill does not give veto power to the Adjutant General.

Captain Mark A. Bruce, Kansas Highway Patrol (KHP) appeared on behalf of Colonel Bill Seck and discussed KHP's role as administrative agency for the Federal Office of Domestic Preparedness Grant. The Kansas Highway Patrol agrees with the coordination aspects provided by HB 2687 to track homeland security funds received by the state. The merit of this concept was realized by Governor Sebelius last summer when cabinet members were appointed to the Council on Homeland Security. The Council is chaired by Colonel Seck and membership includes representation from the following agencies: Adjutant General's Department, Animal Health Department, Board of Emergency Medical Services, Division of Budget, Governor's Office, Kansas Association of Counties, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Kansas Highway Patrol, Kansas League of Municipalities, State Fire Marshal, Ex Officio members: Senator Jim Barone, Senator Jay Emler and Representative Lee Tafanelli (Attachment 4).

Chairman Tafanelli requested that because of the number of conferees, that questions be held until each agencies conferees are finished.

Chairman Tafanelli thanked Captain Bruce for his report.

Colonel Bill Seck, Kansas Highway Patrol stated that the Kansas Highway Patrol Department has done a tremendous job overseeing this program, and takes great pride in tracking every dollar that comes in from Washington. Colonel Seck stated that this bill would be a duplication of effort.

Committee questions followed.

Chairman Tafanelli asked Colonel Seck what statute or authority has the Highway Patrol as the coordinator of Homeland Security efforts in Kansas, or is this a mandate issued by the Council?

Colonel Seck stated that this was a direction from the Governor's Council.

Interim Director Dick Morrissey, Kansas Department of Health and Environment stated that creation of another entity within the Kansas Division of Emergency Management appears to be redundant and would add another bureaucratic layer to an already complex management system designed by the federal Departments of Homeland Security and Health and Human Services (Attachment 5).

Committee questions followed.

 $Colonel\ Tod\ M.\ Bunting, Adjutant\ General\ of\ Kansas\ appeared\ before\ the\ committee,\ and\ made\ brief\ remarks.$ 

Chairman Tafanelli thanked Colonel Bunting for appearing.

George Teagarden, Kansas Animal Health Department, stated he was neutral on HB 2687.

Robert Sage, Rose Hill Chief of Police, said that moving the responsibility over to the Division of Emergency Management will disrupt and already working system and will certainly cause delays in the disbursement of funds down to the local level.(Attachment 6)

Chairman Tafanelli closed the hearings on <u>HB 2687</u>, and stated that the bill would be worked during subsequent meetings.

Testimony to the Select Committee on Kansas Security HB 2393

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee I am here to speak **in favor** of HB 2393. It is a very important concept but I would like to see it strengthened. Having been Chairman of a Joint Committee (Telecommunications) that was originally 6 members then enlarged to 10 I can tell you *from experience* that 6 members is much better than 10 for this type of a committee. Please consider changing Section 1 line 13 and 14 to be three (3) members rather than the five indicated.

Doing just about any business during the legislative session is impossible with a 10 member joint committee – too many scheduling conflicts. As I will later explain, you need to be considering the very real probability that you will need to meet often during the legislative session. Gathering 6 members together with at least one of each chamber is much more difficult than 4.

I do not agree with the method of selecting the chair and vice-chair for reasons I will later mention but section 1 part a and b are the norm for joint committees **except** for the Joint Committee on Information Technology. We select our own Chair and Vice-chair but otherwise operate the same as provided in HB 2393.

Language in section (c) lines 37, 38 and 39 and 43 need to be stricken – again because of comments I will later mention.

Page 2 section (d) need to insert a period (.) after expense striking all the remainder of lines 2, 3, 4 and 5. Also on line 12 add "or introduce legislation" following **recommendations**.

Infrastructure on line 18 (may or may not need clarification that this includes buildings, transportation, telecommunications, roads and rail systems as well as airports and public works).

Terrorist activity is not limited to New York and Oklahoma. Anywhere, anytime terrorism can strike and Kansas would be a good "demonstration target" to show our real vulnerability. Any activity of terrorism at Wolf Creek would send chills down the backs of most every American.

I'm not so sure that a report from the security committee should be made available to the legislature in the normal sense. If we really intend to have a genuine "security" committee it should be treated the same as the U.S. House and Senate security committee operate. They operate separately with different responsibilities but there is

no reason we could not have a joint committee do the same as the two in the U.S. Legislature.

Members of the committee should be authorized to investigate security of the entire infrastructure mentioned above plus any other area that may involve the protection of our citizens and guests.

Members need to have "security clearances" and background checks the same way as done in the military, homeland security, FBI and other agencies. If a member cannot pass the background check and have proper security level then he/she should not be on our security committee.

Much, if not most all, of the meetings should be closed and not necessarily announced so exemptions to open meetings will need to be added. Otherwise the ability of a Legislative Committee to truly investigate and make recommendations for or introduce legislation to change situations that show security weakness is moot and the committee is really not needed. I would hope your charge is more than the security badges we wear, computer security and building security around the Capitol.

We need a **Legislative** group empowered to truly determine what our security situation really is and to properly interface with Homeland Security. Some might say that our current system of security is working just fine and need not be altered. I believe that only the legislature, representing the citizens of Kansas, properly empowered and working directly with the U.S. Government Homeland Security is important.

The argument that this is the purpose of the executive branch need to tell me why then does the Federal Government have an executive level security system AND a legislative group at the least performing oversight of those operations. How can the Legislature oversee the operations of a closed operation like Homeland Security, FBI, CIA and others unless the members of the legislature have access to their information? I am certain the Legislative members have secret if not top secret clearance. How else can they interface with the CIA? Same argument for us in the Kansas Legislature. How do we, in the Legislature, assure the public that the executive branch security operations are operating properly and in the interest of our citizens?

If we choose NOT to create such a committee then it would be possible for the executive branch to operate completely without oversight on issues of security. That is not a good idea. So, put some weight and teeth to the Joint Committee so you will be empowered to truly oversee the security operations and plans for this state. You also should have subpoen a power but that is another issue.

Thank you for allowing me to testify. I support passage of this legislation but would hope the suggestion I have given be taken seriously and at the very least reduce the size to no more than 6. Another bill may then be needed to address the powers of the committee but it would be nice to do that all in one.

Testimony on HB 2687 to House Select Committee on Kansas Security

> Presented by Captain Mark A. Bruce Kansas Highway Patrol

Good afternoon Mr. Chairman and members of the committee. My name is Mark Bruce and I appear before you today on behalf of Colonel Bill Seck and the Kansas Highway Patrol in its role as administrative agency for the State Homeland Security Grant Program. I appreciate the opportunity to provide you with an overview of that portion of Homeland Security funds for which the Patrol has oversight and to address the provisions of HB 2687 as well.

The State Homeland Security Grant Program provides funding specifically for the purchase of specialized equipment to enhance the capability of state and local agencies to prevent and respond to incidents of terrorism involving the use of chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear or explosive weapons. It also provides funding for costs related to the design, development, conduct and evaluation of terrorism related exercises and training to prepare first responders for such an incident. As a provision of the program, 80% of all funds received by the state are required to be passed through to local jurisdictions.

The Office for Domestic Preparedness(ODP) made this grant program available to all states in 2001. In order to apply, each state's governor was required to appoint a State Administrative Agency for management purposes. Then Governor, Bill Graves, selected the Patrol to serve in that capacity. The initial application pertained to funds from Federal Fiscal Years 1999, 2000 and 2001. The total applied for and received was \$2,321,000. Of that amount, ODP designated \$116,000 for planning and administration of the grant program and the balance of funds, \$2,205,000, were obligated for equipment. All of this funding, including the planning monies, was passed through to local jurisdictions for the purchase of equipment.

In Federal Fiscal Year 2002, the state received a total of \$4,151,000. \$3,967,000 was allocated for equipment and \$184,000 was set aside for exercising the state's first responder community. Of the total received in 2002, \$20,000 or one-half of a percent, was retained by the state.

Prior to being allowed to apply for funding in Federal Fiscal Year 2003, each state's governor was again required to appoint a State Administrative Agency. Governor Sebelius maintained the Patrol as the designee in Kansas. In that year, Congress appropriated two rounds of funding for the grant program. Our part one allocation totaled \$7,401,000 and was broken down as follows by ODP: \$5,194,000 for equipment, \$1,298,000 for exercises, \$519,000 for planning and \$390,000 for training. The state opted to spend up to 20% of the equipment allocation, which equates to \$1,038,000, for the development of a radio interoperability solution in Select Committee on Kansas Security

the of emergency. This equipment, which will be operated and maintained by the Kansas Departher of Transportation, consists of two traveling tower systems. Each system has a power unit, a trailer mounted antenna with repeaters and two ACU-1000s, which will enable all responders to communicate with each other at the scene of any disaster. The state will also expend approximately \$300,000 of the \$519,000 in planning funds to complete a statewide assessment and strategy that is mandatory in making itself eligible for funding in 2004. And finally, the \$1,298,000 in exercise funds are being sub-granted to the Kansas Division of Emergency Management to fund seven, regional exercise and training coordinators.

The state's part two allocation in Federal Fiscal Year 2003 was \$19,603,000. Of that amount, \$11,592,000 is being provided to local jurisdictions for the purchase of equipment. \$4,000,000 is being spent to develop a statewide training program to educate first responders and governmental officials on issues pertaining to terrorism and weapons of mass destruction. \$2,614,000 will be used to enhance the protection of critical infrastructure at both the state and local level. \$1,250,000 has been allocated for exercises and up to \$147,000 will be spent to adequately staff the State Administrative Agency in its overall management of the program.

With the creation of the United States Department of Homeland Security last year, several federal agencies and their programs became a part of this new entity. As a consequence, the grant program for Federal Fiscal Year 2004 consists of three parts. The first is the Homeland Security Grant Program(HSGP) which is the same program that has existed since funding became available in 2001. \$21,891,000 has been allocated for the HSGP. Funding will also be received for the Law Enforcement Terrorism Prevention Program in the amount of \$6,496,000. This money is specifically earmarked for law enforcement agencies across the state and is basically a mini-version of the HSGP. The final allocation of 2004 funding in the amount of \$455,000 is for the Citizen Corps Program. Citizen Corps is a FEMA program that has been and will continue to be administered by the Kansas Division of Emergency Management.

Kansas will have received a total of **\$62,318,000** in the six, federal fiscal years since this grant program came into existence.

The Kansas Highway Patrol agrees with the coordination aspects provided by HB 2687 to track homeland security funds received by the state. In fact, the merit of this concept was realized by Governor Sebelius last summer when she appointed members to her council on homeland security for this very purpose. The council is chaired by Colonel Seck and membership includes representation from the following agencies:

The council meets monthly to discuss issues and make decisions relevant to homeland security and homeland security funding. In addition to the tasks performed by this body, much work is accomplished by a small, "report back" working group that consists of the Kansas Division of Emergency Management, the Kansas Department of Health and Environment and the Kansas Highway Patrol. These three agencies coordinate nearly 80% of all homeland security related funds in the state. Additionally, every state agency that coordinates homeland security related grant funds has been asked to provide quarterly, financial information to the Patrol, on behalf of the council, to ensure that every dollar is accounted for and that there is no duplication of effort.

ne position of the Patrol that passage of HB 2687 may be duplicative, as the coordination provision. At it proposes already exist and its promulgation would result in the creation of an additional layer of bureaucracy. Furthermore, this proposal eliminates the current process that involves making homeland security related expenditures by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, the Kansas Division of Emergency Management and the Kansas Highway Patrol. Additionally, HB 2687 will undoubtedly involve some degree of additional and avoidable, fiscal impact to the state.

The Patrol also has concerns regarding the funds that would be subject to this measure should it pass. The proposed definition of "homeland security funds" is extremely broad and includes federal funds received for the purpose of sustaining, enhancing or improving the safety and security of the state. The Patrol recently received funding from the Department of Justice to fund 25 trooper positions. Prior to the awarding of this grant, justification had to be made regarding the impact that these positions would have on homeland security. Obviously the purpose of these positions will be to sustain, enhance and improve the safety and security of the state. We would question the appropriateness of being required to coordinate with any other entity regarding the conduct of routine road patrol. It also appears that this definition could easily be construed to include federal highway funds, local law enforcement grants and a host of other federally funded programs that enhance the safety and security of the state.

Again, I appreciate having been given the opportunity to appear before you today to speak on this most important homeland security issue. I trust that my comments have been beneficial as you consider the merit of HB 2687. I, along with any of the other Patrol personnel present here today, would be happy to answer any questions that you might have.

If you have a different reporting period for your grants, please let us know so we can develop a method for including progress on your grant. We have included a list of numbers from the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) that reflect many of the grants that may have a homeland security attribute. If your catalog number is not on our list but is related to homeland security, let us know so we can add that CFDA number. Also, if your grant CFDA number is included in our list but has no homeland security relationship, let us know so we can exclude that grant. 

Thank you Chairman Taffanelli and Members of the House Select Committee on Security for this opportunity to testify on House Bill 2687, which creates a program within the Kansas Division of Emergency Management to review, approve, and coordinate grant applications for Kansas homeland security funds and coordinate the distribution of such funds. My name is Richard Morrissey. I serve as Interim Director of Health for the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE), and as the Executive Director of the Bioterrorism Program.

The public health arm of the Kansas Bioterrorism Program was created in 1999, when the first federal funding for bioterrorism planning and preparedness was provided to states. Between 1999 and 2001, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) awarded KDHE approximately \$850,000 each year. In 2002, Kansas, along with all other states were infused with supplemental funding from the CDC to greatly expand their planning and preparedness efforts for bioterrorism. The Kansas Bioterrorism Program received \$12.3 million in 2002. The 2003 CDC award and current operating budget for the public health arm of the Program is just over \$12 million.

The hospital segment of the Kansas Bioterrorism Program was formalized when the first funding from the Health Resources Services Administration (HRSA) was provided to states in 2002, with an initial award of \$1.3 million. In 2003, the overall federal allocation for this program was substantially increased, resulting in Kansas receiving \$5.3 million from HRSA, the current operating budget for the hospital arm of the Kansas Bioterrorism Program.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has developed a strong working relationship with the Kansas Division of Emergency Management and Kansas Highway Patrol. The administrators responsible for managing the federal homeland security funds within each of these

respective agencies meet regularly to coordinate all activities and expenditures to eliminate the possibility of duplication of effort and to assure that these funds are used judiciously and most effectively to improve our state's level of homeland security and bioterrorism preparedness.

Additionally, KDHE participates along with the Kansas Division of Emergency Management and the Kansas Highway Patrol on the Governor's Homeland Security Council, which was created last year. This Council is charged with overseeing and coordinating the activities and expenditures related to the federal homeland security funds awarded to Kansas.

Creation of another entity within the Kansas Division of Emergency Management appears to be redundant and would add another bureaucratic layer to an already complex management system designed by the federal Departments of Homeland Security and Health and Human Services.

Because procedures and protocols are already in place that meet the purpose of the bill, the bill is unnecessary.

KDHE will continue to work closely with the Kansas Division of Emergency Management, Kansas Highway Patrol, and other state and local partners to assure improved levels of homeland security and bioterrorism preparedness. Additionally, the agency will continue to participate on the Governor's Homeland Security Council, which is charged with overseeing the implementation of all homeland security funds in Kansas.

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee:

Hello, my name is Robert Sage and I am the Chief of Police in Rose Hill. In addition to wearing that hat, I am the chairman for the Butler County 911 Advisory Board and the chairman for the Butler County Emergency Services Association. I would like thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony regarding HB 2687 and promise not to take up a lot of your time.

After hearing about this bill, I thought you may want to have a perspective from the people who this will ultimately affect. As a police chief and the chairman of the above mentioned board and association, I represent those people and agencies in Butler County who are the beneficiaries of the Homeland Security Fund. We are the people, out in the field, who have been using this money for years to obtain the equipment and training that we otherwise would not be able to afford. The Kansas Highway Patrol currently administers this fund. It is dispersed down from KHP to local county emergency managers who administer the money on the local level and disperse it out to the various agencies in their respective counties. There have been no problems with communication, purchase authorizations or delivery of equipment. I'm not so brash as to offer that this is the case statewide; however, I don't think Butler County exists in a vacuum. I believe this is the rule rather than the exception. A valid point to be made about this current system is that it provides for a level of "checks and balances" by sharing the management of the Funds.

It is our opinion that moving the responsibility over to the Division of Emergency Management will disrupt an already working system and will certainly cause delays in the dispersement of funds down to the local level, which, hopefully, will only be short term. Not to mention that it would remove an important check and balance. I'm not trying to suggest that KDEM is not capable of handling the Funds, I'm merely pointing out that there is an inherent risk in moving it from an organization that already has a working system in place to handle it and giving it to an organization that must create that system from the ground up.

In addition, I would like to recognize KHP, KDOT and KDEM for its efforts at achieving communications interoperability in Kansas. There have been some dramatic advances towards interoperability to include HR 1616 (which passed the Senate Utilities Committee on February 3<sup>rd</sup>) and HB 2756 which will be heard before the Senate Utilities Committee on February 16<sup>th</sup>. With that in mind, Col. Seck with KHP, has already announced that the mandatory "hold back" money from the Fund can be used as seed money to help establish the Kansas communications system revolving fund established in HB 2756.

Mr. Chairman, Committee Members, the system that is in place works. It works very well. I strongly believe that "tinkering" with the existing system will only cause unnecessary frustration (and potentially devastating delays in dispersement) to us, the people on the bottom rung of the ladder who this money is intended to benefit. That would certainly be a disservice to us and most importantly, to those people we are sworn to protect – the citizens of Kansas. Thank you.
