MINUTES OF THE HOUSE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Kathe Decker at 9:00 AM on March 8, 2005 in Room 313-S of the Capitol.

SB 42 - concerning teacher; relating to certification thereof; amending K.S.A. 72-1387 and repealing the existing section.

<u>Brief - SB 42 would remove the teacher certification fee limitation and allow the State Board of Education to set the licensure fee for all Kansas teachers and administrators.</u>

Dale Dennis testified before the Committee, recommending that K.S.A. 72-1387 be amended to permit the State Board to determine the licensure fee and strike language which places a cap of \$24 per license. (Attachment 1).

Discussion followed.

With no other questions or comments, Chairman Decker closed the hearing on SB 42.

SB 43 - concerning payments to schools for driver training courses; amending K.S.A. 8-272 and repealing the existing section.

Brief - SB 43, as amended, would do the following: remove the stipulation that \$1,540,000 is to be distributed each year to school districts for driver training courses; removed the stipulation that \$210,000 is to be distributed each year to school districts for motorcycle safety courses; and remove the stipulation that \$70,000 is to be distributed each year to school districts for truck driver training courses.

Dale Dennis testified before the Committee. Looking at the bill on line 24, he pointed out to the Committee that the appropriation amount is in the statute. (Attachment 2). A recommendation was made that the dollar limit in K.S.A. 8-272 be eliminated and that the amount earmarked, without a limitation be available for distribution to schools to reimburse them for the number of students completing driver education. We currently reimburse school districts approximately \$84 per driver education student which equates to about 27 percent of the districts' cost for driver education. Amending K.S.A. 8-272 would have the effect of offsetting the cost to the students and their parents as well as transfers from the schools districts' operating funds.

Discussion followed.

Next to testify as a proponent for <u>SB 43</u> was James Hathaway. A handout by district name and USD number was distributed, showing public and private districts that offer driver education. A total of 298 schools were on the list. (<u>Attachment 3</u>).

Eldon Chlumsky appeared as a proponent for <u>SB 43</u>, (<u>Attachment 4</u>). As a district that supports driver education for a major community in his state, he encouraged the Committee to remove the cap placed on Driver Education funds, thus allowing the Kansas State Department of Education to appropriately distribute such funds to approved driver education programs across the state.

Discussion followed.

A motion was made by Representative Craft and seconded by Representative Horst to work SB 42.

Representative Yonally made a motion to do the technical clean up that has been recommended. Seconded by Representative Horst, the motion passed on a voice vote.

A motion was made by Representative Horst and seconded by Representative Storm to pass **SB 42** favorably as amended. The motion passed on a voice vote.

Representative Storm made a motion to do a cleanup to reflect that the Board of Regents is responsible for the truck and part of the motorcycle driving training. The motion was seconded by Representative Horst and passed on a voice vote.

A motion was made by Representative Loganbill to pass **SB 43** favorably as amended. This was seconded by Representative Roth and passed on a voice vote.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:05 a.m. The next meeting of the full committee is scheduled for Wednesday, March 9, 2005.

2005 Senate Bill 42

Senate Bill 42 amends K.S.A. 72-1387 and allows the State Board of Education to set the licensure fee for all Kansas teachers and administrators.

Current law provides that the State Board of Education is required to determine the licensure fee for the renewal of teacher licenses. The current fee of \$24 has been in effect since 1986. Due to efficiencies and computerization, we have been able to maintain the licensure fee at \$24. Revenue collected from this fee can only be used for licensure purposes.

After consulting with professional education organizations, we recommend that K.S.A. 72-1387 be amended to permit the State Board to determine the licensure fee and strike language which places a cap of \$24 per license.

2005 Senate Bill 43

Senate Bill 43 amends statutes concerning the state safety fund which provides funding for driver education courses approved by the State Board of Education.

Current law provides that a portion of the driver's license fees will be distributed to school districts based upon the number of students who have completed driver education and met the criteria established by the State Board of Education. This law provides a cap of \$1,540,000 which may be distributed on an annual basis.

The Kansas Legislature amended KSA 8-272 in 2003 and increased driver's license fees resulting in additional funds in the State Safety Fund (driver education reimbursement). As a result of increased fees, there is more money available for distribution to school districts than the statute allows.

We recommend that the dollar limit in KSA 8-272 be eliminated and that the amount earmarked, without a limitation, be available for distribution to schools to reimburse them for the number of students completing driver education.

We currently reimburse school districts approximately \$84 per driver education student which equates to about 27 percent of the districts' cost for driver education. Amending KSA 8-272 would have the effect of offsetting the cost to the students and their parents as well as tranfers from the school districts' operating funds.

PROPONENT FOR SENATE BILL 43

It is a pleasure for me to speak to you today as a proponent for Senate Bill 43. As you know, a percentage of all drivers' license fees collected by the Department of Revenue is deposited in the State Safety Fund of the Department of Education and is earmarked for driver education. As these fees have been increased, more money has been added to the State Safety Fund balance. The Department of Education has been limited, however, in the amount distributed to school districts for driver education courses even though these additional funds have been collected and are available.

With the cost of fuel, insurance, maintenance, and instructor salaries all increasing over the past few years, the formula for current reimbursement is not keeping up with these rising costs, and it is placing more burden on the 298 public/private schools that are currently offering driver education programs. This amendment is not asking for additional funds, only your support in making these funds available. Therefore, the amendment is very appropriate at this time to allow the Department of Education to aid schools in continuing to offer this valuable course that helps shape a young person's attitude about safety in an automobile, and, hopefully, attain a level of skill that will enable them to survive their teen years and make good driving decisions. It has been long recognized that parents look to these accredited courses for professional help in teaching their kids to drive. In the state of Kansas, a student is required to complete a driver education course to get a Restricted license at age 15 and insurance discounts are available as well. Therefore, I urge you to support this amendment to SB 43. It is a win-win situation for all parties concerned.

Wichita Public Schools Senate Bill 43 Hearing Notes 3.8.05 Driver Education General Overview

- Driver Education programs are supported in all seven comprehensive high schools including East, Heights, North, Northwest, South, Southeast, and West.
- The program consists of three aspects including classroom instruction, simulation instruction, and behind the wheel instruction.
- 15.2 FTE positions are budgeted, 16 teachers are supported either fully or partially with the 15.2 position count. 13 of the Driver Education teachers teach Driver Education full time. Two additional staff members are funded through the Special Education budget.
- We have multiple programs within every school year that include Regular Driver Education during the school day, Evening Driver Education (at East High) on multiple evenings and weekends, Summer Driver Education that occurs during a six week session during June and July, and Special Education Driver Education that is housed at East High School during the regular school day.
- USD 259 operates the largest Driver Education program within the state of Kansas. Our successful completion student numbers have been very stable at about 1750 total per year. This compares to the next two closest programs in our state with successful completion of students totaling 600 in USD 233 Olathe and 417 students in USD 229 Blue Valley this past year.
- In 1993, the legislators of our state of Kansas enacted the law that requires youth within our state to have successfully completed an approved course in Driver Education prior to being eligible for a restricted license at the age of 15.
- The Wichita Public Schools Board of Education enacted fee payments to offset the costs of Driver Education several years ago, along with these actions, students that qualify for reduced or free lunches are provided access to this course at reduced rates during the regular school year. The Wichita Public Schools has a proud history of providing the Driver Education course to all students within our community.
- Estimated percentages of students that paid reduced or free rates for Driver Education this school year, 2004-2005, per BOE policy are as follows with comparison to each school's reduced or free rates:
