MINUTES OF THE SENATE TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Les Donovan at 8:30 A.M. on February 22, 2005 in Room 527-S of the Capitol.

SB 210 - Requiring strobe lights on school buses.

Proponent:

Senator Apple said he spent about 12 years on the Louisburg School Board. During that time they asked the people they leased their buses from for white strobe lights on the top of the buses. They have had the system for 5 or 6 years now. He talked to the superintendent last night and found that they are still working well for the area. When you have a late night event, or if you have a highway with a 60 mph speed limit and are picking up children in all kind of inclement weather, the white strobe lights stand out. People soon relate a white flashing light to a school bus. The cost is minimal and most of the new buses are wired for them, it's just a matter of screwing the strobe light in the top. The bill states the new buses would be required to have the strobe lights by January 1, 2006 and all buses by January 1, 2008. He thinks **SB 210** presents an opportunity to create a safe environment for school kids across the state. (Attachment 1)

Chairman Donovan noted that the fiscal note states that according to the Department of Education, the bill would have negligible costs to local districts and would not require any additional state appropriations to the Department.

Senator Wilson moved to pass SB 210 bill favorably. Senator O'Connor seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Final action:

SB 35 - School zones, disobeying crossing guard, speeding in zone, fines doubled

Senator Journey explained a balloon he had on the bill. (<u>Attachment 2</u>) Basically it defines crossing guards. It expands the definition so that if the crossing guards are minors under adult supervision it is a violation. It also make it clear that crossing guards do not have the power to issue citations or arrest people other than provided by other statutes. It also authorizes the various governmental bodies in nonpublic schools to train and authorize crossing guards if they wish.

Senator Journey moved to adopt the amendment to SB35. Senator Petersen seconded the motion. Motion carried. Senator Journey moved to pass the bill out favorably as amended. Senator Gilstrap seconded the motion. Motion carried. Senator Journey will carry the bill.

SB 81- Traffic regulation, use of headlamps, windshield wipers

Chairman Donovan reminded the committee that the bill dealt with requiring the use of headlights and time windshield wipers are in full mode.

Bruce Kinzie said he received the draft for the bill that was prepared by someone else and he thinks he can reword it and make it a little more precise. On line 25, add "continuous" before the word use and out "smoke, fog". On line 30 and 31, strike our the words "except when such windshield wipers are used intermittently in misting rain, sleet, or snow". And then on line 21, add ", including smoke or fog," after the word conditions.

Senator Schmidt moved to adopt the above amendment. Senator Petersen seconded the motion. Motion carried. Senator Schmidt moved to pass the bill as amended. Senator Petersen seconded the motion. Motion carried.

SB184 - Repealing K.S.A. 75-5010, the division of aviation

Senator Wilson moved to table the bill. Senator Palmer seconded the motion. Motion carried.

SB 253 - Highway advertising control act of 1972, amendments

Senator Wilson moved to table the bill. Senator Palmer seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Chairman Donovan said the committee had worked all of the bills referred to the committee except <u>SB 2 - Kansas consumer protection act, disclosure by dealer that motor vehicle was leased or rented, not required</u>, and <u>SB 88 - Kansas turnpike authority, speed based tolls</u>. After much consideration, he decided not to hear these bills.

Senator O'Connor moved to approve the committee minutes of February 2, 3, 9, and 15. Senator Wilson seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Meeting adjourned at 9:02 a.m.

Thank you for allowing me to testify in support of SB 210. I had the privilege of serving on the USD 416 Board of Education from 1991-2003. During that time we implemented a policy that school buses in our district must be equipped with white strobe lights on the top of the bus that would operate whenever children were on board. School buses operate in all types of weather and visibility and the lights serve as a warning that a school bus is near. Whether coming home from an away game in the fog or seeing a school bus stopped early in the morning on a busy highway, it was nice to know that the students were in a well marked vehicle. My request is that we implement this program statewide to add to the level of protection for our school children.

It is my understanding buses are prewired for the strobe lights. The cost of implementing this program would be minimal compared to the level of safety that would be achieved for our children.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

New Section 1. (a) No person shall willfully fail or refuse to comply with any lawful order or direction of any uniformed adult school crossing guard invested by law with authority to direct, control or regulate traffic.

(b) This section shall be part of and supplemental to the uniform act

regulating traffic.

Sec. (2) K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 8-2118 is hereby amended to read as follows: 8-2118. (a) A person charged with a traffic infraction shall, except as provided in subsection (b), appear at the place and time specified in the notice to appear. If the person enters an appearance, waives right to trial, pleads guilty or no contest, the fine shall be no greater than that specified in the uniform fine schedule in subsection (c) and court costs shall be taxed as provided by law.

- (b) Prior to the time specified in the notice to appear, a person charged with a traffic infraction may enter a written appearance, waive right to trial, plead guilty or no contest and pay the fine for the violation as specified in the uniform fine schedule in subsection (c) and court costs provided by law. Payment may be made by mail or in person and may be by personal check. The traffic citation shall not have been complied with if a check is not honored for any reason, or if the fine and court costs are not paid in full. When a person charged with a traffic infraction makes payment without executing a written waiver of right to trial and plea of 15. guilty or no contest, the payment shall be deemed such an appearance, waiver of right to trial and plea of no contest.
- (c) The following uniform fine schedule shall apply uniformly throughout the state but shall not limit the fine which may be imposed following a court appearance, except an appearance made for the purpose of pleading and payment as permitted by subsection (a). The description of offense contained in the following uniform line schedule is for reference only and is not a legal definition.

New Sec. 2. "School crossing guard" means any person 18 years of age and older or any person under 18 years of age who is being directly supervised by a person at least 18 years of age, acting with or without compensation and who is authorized under section 1, and amendments thereto, to supervise, direct, monitor or otherwise assist school children at a street or intersection in the vicinity of a school crosswalk or bus stop.

New Sec. 3. (a) The governing body of any school district, nonpublic school, city or county is hereby authorized to appoint and equip volunteers and designated employees of such school district, nonpublic school, city or county, and may provide training to such volunteers as school crossing guards, as defined in section 2, and amendments thereto, to direct traffic at school crossings, streets and highways in the vicinity of schools and bus stops, by means of lawful orders, signs or semaphores. Such persons shall wear a distinctive garb or insignia indicating such appointment.

(b) School crossing guards shall not have the power to issue citations or the power to arrest provided to law enforcement officers.

- (d) Traffic offenses classified as traffic infractions by this section shall be classified as ordinance traffic infractions by those cities adopting ordinances prohibiting the same offenses. A schedule of fines for all ordinance traffic infractions shall be established by the municipal judge in the manner prescribed by K.S.A. 12-4305, and amendments thereto. Such fines may vary from those contained in the uniform fine schedule contained in subsection (c).
- (e) Fines listed in the uniform fine schedule contained in subsection (c) shall be doubled if a person is convicted of a traffic infraction, which is defined as a moving violation in accordance with rules and regulations adopted pursuant to K.S.A. 8-249, and amendments thereto, committed within any road construction zone as defined in K.S.A. 8-1458a, and amendments thereto.
- (f) For a second violation of K.S.A. 8-1908 or 8-1909, and amendments thereto, within two years after a prior conviction of K.S.A. 8-1908 or 8-1909, and amendments thereto, such person, upon conviction shall be fined 1 1/2 times the applicable amount from one, but not both, of the schedules listed in the uniform fine schedule contained in subsection (c). For a third violation of K.S.A. 8-1908 or 8-1909, and amendments thereto, within two years, after two prior convictions of K.S.A. 8-1908 or 8-1909, and amendments thereto, such person, upon conviction shall be fined two times the applicable amount from one, but not both, of the schedules listed in the uniform fine schedule contained in subsection (c). For a fourth and each succeeding violation of K.S.A. 8-1908 or 8-1909, and amendments thereto, within two years after three prior convictions of K.S.A. 8-1908 or 8-1909, and amendments thereto, such person, upon conviction shall be fined 21/2 times the applicable amount from one, but not both, of the schedules listed in the uniform fine schedule contained in subsection (c).
- (g) Fines listed in the uniform fine schedule contained in subsection (c) relating to exceeding the maximum speed limit, shall be doubled if a person is concicted of exceeding the maximum speed limit in a school zone authorized under subsection (a)(4) of K.S.A. 8-1560, and amendments thereto.
