<u>HB 2315 - Permanent registration for technical college vehicles leased for truck driver training program.</u>

Proponents:

Tom Whitaker, Kansas Motor Carriers Association, appeared today representing the Wichita Area Technical College in support of **HB 2315**. In 2003, the legislature passed a bill that allowed the Wichita Area Technical College to lease 5 tractor trailers and permanently register them just like a school district, or city, or county. Previous to this bill, this section only applied to vehicles owned by the city, county, or school district. With the passage of **SB 7**, the technical college separated from the school district. In order to continue the availability of the permanent registration **HB 2315** needs to be adopted, it talks about technical colleges versus area vocational schools for the lease. It just continues policy which was established in 2003. (Attachment 1)

Mary Ellen Conlee, Wichita Area Technical College, testified in favor of the bill. On July 1, 2004, the Wichita Area Technical College separated from the governance of USD 259 and came under the governance of an independent board of trustees. This was done in order for the college to have the ability to grant Associate degrees. Under school district governance, the college was able to permanently register both owned and leased vehicles at reduced cost for vehicles exclusively used for the Truck Drivers Training Center. This bill would allow the college to continue the existing practice. (Attachment 2)

Jennie Rose, Kansas Association of Community College Trustees, said that they have a truck driving school at one of their community colleges at Fort Scott. While they currently don't lease trucks, by adding "and community colleges" to the bill they could have that option in the future. She requested the bill be amended to add community colleges. (Attachment 3)

Senator Wilson moved to amend **HB 2315** as requested. Senator O'Conner seconded the motion. Motion carried. Senator Wilson moved to pass **HB 2315** as amended. Senator O'Conner seconded the motion. Motion carried. Senator Donovan will carry the bill.

HB 2409 - Designating part of U.S. highway 54 as Veterans Memorial highway.

Proponent:

Representative John Grange appeared in support of <u>HB 2409</u>. The bill would designate a portion of highway 54 where it enters the Kansas-Missouri border, then west to the east city limits of Kingman, as the Veterans Memorial highway. The total distance is 205 miles. The designation will honor all veterans of Active, Reserve, and National Guard service, regardless of theater of operation or branch of service. Representative

Grange said his predecessor, Bill Mason, a 12 year member of the House of Representatives, a champion of Veterans Recognition, and a well-respected member of the community, asked him to carry the bill. The fiscal responsibility of the signage is to be borne by gifts and donations for the signs and an additional 50% of the same costs for maintenance and replacement. There are co-signers of the bill who represent the districts along the route. It passed the House 122 - 0. (Attachment 4)

Senator Wilson said, being a veteran himself, he appreciated the bill and asked for the cost of the signs. Representative Grange said about \$1,000 for the two signs, depending on the size and complexity, and 50% of that for the maintenance cost. So, they would owe about \$1,500.

Senator Wilson offered an amendment to name the portion of K-10 from the western boundary of Johnson county then east to the junction of K-10 highway and interstate highway 435 the Governor John Anderson, Jr. highway. Senator Wilson said Governor Anderson was a two-term governor and led the state through some pretty difficult times in the early 60's. He's well know, well liked, and well respected. He said the money would be raised privately.

Ken Gudenkauf, KDOT, advised that this highway would have a higher fiscal note because it's on a 3-way section. He would image the signs would run about \$2,500 each. Senator Wilson said they would raise the money.

Senator Wilson moved to amend **HB 2409** per his request. Senator Palmer seconded the motion. Motion carried. Senator Wilson moved to pass **HB 2409** as amended. Senator Palmer seconded the motion. Motion carried. Senator Wilson will carry the bill.

Final Action

SB 278 -Division of vehicles records, certain driver's license records.

Senator O'Connor moved to pass SB 278 favorably. Senator Schmidt seconded the motion. Motion carried. Senator Wilson will carry the bill.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE SENATE TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE:

I am Tom Whitaker, executive director of the Kansas Motor Carriers Association. I appear here this morning representing our 1,200 member firms and specifically the Wichita Area Technical College in support of House Bill No. 2315.

HB 2315 makes a technical change to K.S.A. 8-1,134 which allows cities, counties and school districts to permanently register motor vehicles at a reduced cost. In 2003, the Legislature approved HB 2159 which allowed the Wichita Area Vocational School to lease 5 tractor trailers for their truck driver training program. At that time, the Wichita Area Vocational School was part of the Wichita School District.

Due to changes in governance over the school, it is no longer part of the school district and cannot continue to permanently register the tractor trailers used in their truck driving training program. HB 2315 would allow the Wichita Area Technical College to continue permanently registering their vehicles as they have been for the last two years.

KMCA supports HB 2315 and asks for your favorable consideration of the bill. Thank you for the opportunity to appear before you today. I would be pleased to respond to any questions you may have.

Chairman Donovan, members of the committee, I am Mary Ellen Conlee representing the Wichita Area Technical College testifying in favor of HB 2315.

On July 1, 2004 the Wichita Area Technical College separated from USD 259 governance to an independent Board of Trustees. This change resulted from the Kansas Board of Regents and 2003 Kansas Legislative direction requiring that schools providing post-secondary technical education needed to move from K-12 to independent governance if they wanted to grant Associate degrees.

Under school district governance, the college was able to permanently register both owned and leased vehicles at reduced cost for vehicles exclusively used for our Truck Drivers Training Center. The technical change in K.S.A. 8-1, 134 would allow the college to continue the existing practice. Leasing vehicles for the truck driving program has allowed the college to train its students on the most advanced equipment available.

We support HB 2315, requested by Kansas Motor Carriers Association on behalf of their members and the Wichita Area Technical College. I would be happy to respond to any questions that you may have.

Senator Donovan and members of the committee, thank-you for allowing me to provide testimony in support of HB 2409. This process will designate a portion of US Highway 54 where it enters the Kansas-Missouri border, then west to the east city limits of Kingman, as the Veterans Memorial Highway. The total distance is 205 miles.

This designation will honor all veterans of Active, Reserve, and National Guard service regardless of theater of operation or branch of service. My predecessor, Bill Mason, a 12-year member of this House of Representatives asked me to carry this bill. Mr. Mason is a champion of Veterans Recognition and a well-respected member of the community.

Kansas has 10,739 miles of paved roads that include, 9,565 miles of roads of the Rural State System and 814 miles of City Connecting Links. According to the Kansas Turnpike Authority (KTA) 2005 Annual report, KTA has 238 miles of paved roads. To date there are currently 4,785.60 miles of special designated highways. I have enclosed an attachment of these existing designated roads for your review.

The average traffic count on this stretch of road from the Missouri border through, Ft Scott, Iola, Yates Center, Eureka, El Dorado, Augusta, Andover, Wichita, Goddard, Garden Plain, Cheney, and on to Kingman, is 10,449 vehicles per day with 1,154 trucks per day. As you can see there is a significant number of travelers along this route.

The fiscal responsibility for the signage is to be borne by gifts and donations for the signs and an additional 50% of the same costs for maintenance and replacement. We currently have the commitment for funds from private sources to install the signs. This cost will be \$1,000 for the required two signs, one at each beginning of the designated road. It is my hope others along the route will want to participate and they will be responsible for the additional signage within their community area.

As you know I had co-signers of this bill who represent the districts along the route. I think this is an indication of the interest to accomplish this small tribute to our fighting forces and I would ask you to favorably pass this bill out of the committee.
