Bill Introductions

Senator Schodorf moved, with a second by Senator Kelly, a conceptual bill introduction regarding revenue and school finance. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Chairman Umbarger opened the public hearing on:

HB 2264--Department of health and environment, director of health, term of office

Staff briefed the committee on the bill.

Roderick L. Bremby, Secretary, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, testified in support of <u>HB</u> <u>2264</u> (<u>Attachment 1</u>). Secretary Bremby explained that the bill would allow the Director of the Division of

Health, who also serves as the State Health Officer, to be appointed to serve a term of four years in case of a vacancy, and thereafter, at the pleasure of the Secretary. He noted that the bill would also provide job security for a period of four years – a key tool for recruiting superior candidates to fill the Health Director position.

There being no further conferees to come before the committee, the Chairman closed the public hearing on **HB 2264**.

The Chairman turned the committee's attention to discussion of:

SB 294--Kansas expanded lottery act; electronic gaming; lottery gaming facilities

Senator Barone distributed copies of an explainer to a proposed balloon amendment that he was introducing (<u>Attachment 2</u>). He explained that the key changes proposed are:

- Remove KDFA financing from the bill
- Increase the State's share from 65 % to 78 %
- Establish minimum floor to the state of 24 % of gross revenues
- Create new Education Opportunity Fund which strengthens the commitment of revenues to education
- - Triple Lock Box Provision (new section 39)
- Adds language to ensure that the process for selecting manager is competitive, while ensuring large investment

Committee questions and discussion followed. <u>Senator Barone moved</u>, with a second by <u>Senator Umbarger</u>, to amend <u>SB 294</u> and adopt the balloon amendment with additional conceptual amendments in both sections that if a facility located outside the city limits, the money would go to the county, and allow for technical amendments (Attachment 3). Motion carried on a voice vote.

Senator Steineger moved, with a second by Senator Teichman, to remove the contents of HB 2481, amend the language of SB 294 into Senate Substitute for HB 2481 and report Senate Substitute for HB 2481 favorable for passage. Motion carried on a roll call vote. Senator Kelly and Senator Emler explained their vote that they voted "Aye" only to have the debate on the bill in the Senate.

The Chairman opened the public hearing on:

HB 2338--Kansas veterans' experience history project grant awards authorized, appropriations for such project

Staff briefed the committee on the bill.

Representative Dennis McKinney testified in support of <u>HB 2338</u> (<u>Attachment 4</u>). He explained that the bill presents an effort to record the experiences and systematically archive the stories of WWII veterans.

Representative Ray Merrick spoke in support of <u>HB 2338</u> (<u>Attachment 5</u>). He explained that with each passing day we are losing hundreds of World War II Veterans, and with their passing, the history is being lost that they helped create. Representative Merrick noted that he would like to thank Representative McKinney for his efforts.

Jennie Chinn, Executive Director, Kansas State Historical Society, testified as a proponent of <u>HB 2338</u> (<u>Attachment 6</u>). Ms. Chinn mentioned that the State Historical Society enthusiastically supports the bill as long as the appropriations come with the program and that they would be unable to carry out the project within existing agency funds.

E. L. Farr, Kansas Veterans of Foreign Wars, spoke in support of <u>HB 2338</u> (<u>Attachment 7</u>). Mr. Farr explained that it is time to get Kansas Veterans of World War II to get their stories printed for the next generation. He shared some of his experiences during World War II.

<u>Senator Teichman moved</u>, with a second by <u>Senator Kelly</u>, to report <u>HB 2338</u> favorable for passage. <u>Motion carried on a roll call vote</u>.

Chairman Umbarger opened the public hearing on:

HB 2301--Creating the Senator Stan Clark pregnancy maintenance initiative program

Staff briefed the committee on the bill.

LaVeta Adams, Director, Family Life Services, Arkansas City, Kansas, testified in support of <u>HB 2301</u> (<u>Attachment 11</u>). Ms. Adams explained that <u>HB 2301</u> would implement funding for certain agencies that help pregnant women. She explained how their agency operates.

Representative Brenda Landwehr appeared before the committee in support of <u>HB 2301</u>. (No written testimony was submitted.) Representative Landwehr explained that she has always felt that the Pregnancy Maintenance Initiative Program should be put into bill form rather than a proviso every year. She explained that there was an amendment added by the House of Representatives that added additional reporting.

Sarah London, Kansas Public Policy Manager, Planned Parenthood of Kansas and Mid-Missouri, spoke in support of HB 2301 (Attachment 12). Ms. London explained that they are in support of the bill, with exceptions which are listed in the written testimony. Copies of the following information were distributed:

- If You Are Pregnant: Directory of Available Services (Attachment 13)
- Information on "Woman's Right to Know" (Attachment 14)

Mike Farmer, Executive Director, Kansas Catholic Conference, testified in support of <u>HB 2301</u> (Attachment <u>15</u>). Mr. Farmer explained that this Pregnancy Maintenance Initiative is one of the few, if not the only, programs of its kind in the state that requires a dollar for dollar match.

Julie Burkhart, Executive Director, ProKanDo, appeared before the committee in support of <u>HB 2301</u> (<u>Attachment 16</u>). Ms. Burkhart proposed to make this type of grant accessible to a wider range of potential grantees - so as to provide services from a broad array of agencies, they recommend striking certain language in lines 41-41, "promoting, referring for, or education in favor of ...". Suggested language is found in Ms. Burkhart's written testimony.

Jana Mackey, National Organization for Women, testified in support of <u>HB 2301</u> (<u>Attachment 17</u>). She noted that NOW supports all reproductive rights, including the right to bear and raise children. Ms. Mackey explained that they support <u>HB 2301</u> and its purpose of making it possible for women to exercise these rights in difficult times.

There being no further conferees to come before the committee, the Chairman closed the public hearing on **HB 2301**.

Testimony on HB 2264 Director of Health Term of Office

Good afternoon, Mr. Chair and members of the committee. My name is Roderick L. Bremby, Secretary of Kansas Department of Health and Environment. We appear before you to testify in favor of House Bill 2264, which would allow the Director of Division of Health, who also serves as the State Health Officer, to be appointed to serve a term of four years in case of a vacancy, and thereafter, at the pleasure of the Secretary. The current law requires that the *first* person appointed to the Director of Health position serve a term of four years. A successor who fills a vacancy can only serve for the unexpired term.

House Bill 2264 would provide job security for a period of four years--a key tool for recruiting superior candidates to fill the Health Director position. The need for job security is even more crucial when vacancies arise in the middle of a legislative or gubernatorial terms, and the applicant is faced with the uncertainty of taking a position that may last fewer than two years, no matter what his or her level of performance. Establishing a firm term of office gives qualified applicants the security they need to accept the position, and know that they will have sufficient time in office to accomplish their goals in serving the citizens of Kansas.

The role of State Health Officer and Health Director requires a steep learning curve as physicians adapt to the intricacies of state government, constituent needs, and the legislative process. State Health Officer tenure cut short by a limited time in office means that all of the recruiting, orientation, and educational time required for the new State Health Officer to be effective has been lost to the state. In addition, the ability to

Senate Ways and Means 3-30-05 Attachment 1 achieve public health goals is fully dependent upon building relationships and maintaining the stability of these partnerships. This stability is especially critical in times of potential political turnover, as results every two years in the electoral process. Ensuring a four-year term for the Director allows time for these relationships to develop and mature, enhancing the effectiveness of the office, regardless of the prevailing political winds.

Another reason for supporting this bill is the very nature of public health projects: public health projects by definition demonstrate results over the medium to long term. The clinical spectrum of chronic disease and the process of changing health behaviors often take time and will not likely show results in the short term. In order to ensure continuity of programming and effective evaluation of public health efforts, consistency in direction is crucial. Ensuring a term of four years for the Director (and continued service at the pleasure of the Secretary) avoids the problems of waste in resources, effort, and manpower that are likely to occur with radical shifts in short-term direction.

Finally, as stated earlier, one of the crucial roles of the Director is to act as the State Health Officer. Because public health and health care issues can often be controversial, the fixed term of office gives the State Health Officer the security needed to be objective in communicating health information to the public and the legislature, no matter how uncomfortable that necessary information might be.

Expanded Lottery Act SB 294

Locations

Destination Development Zones

Five locations identified as Destination Development Zones. Development of Destination Resorts limited to counties identified in the legislation. Resort must be part of an overall strategy of creating tourism destinations in or near the zone.

Northeast Kansas Zone: Wyandotte County

Southeast Kansas Zone: Cherokee and Crawford County

South Central Kansas Zone: Sedgwick County

Southwest Kansas Zone: Ford County North Central Kansas Zone: Geary County

Local Control

Kansas Lottery cannot consider proposals for development of a destination resort until the voters in a county have authorized the county's participation. In addition to the local vote, the developer of a destination resort must have formal endorsement of the city or county where they propose a project.

First Year revenues generated by Accelerated payments to the state by Destination Resort developers and parimutual racetrack licensees. Actual revenue may be more, because the racetrack facilities would be generating direct revenues from VLT operation during FY 2006.

Five Destination Resorts and five parimutuel facilities would be authorized to place electronic gaming machines or video lottery terminals at their facilities.

Revenues Allocated to Supplementing Education Funding

Legislation places state's share of revenues for supplementing funding for primary, secondary public education and higher education. K-16

The live horse racing industry and greyhound industry make a significant contribution to the economy of rural Kansas. Adding VLT's at the tracks will add big value to the rural sectors of Kansas, which benefit from the greyhound, quarterhorse and thoroughbred breeding industries. This legislation can add \$200 million dollars to the rural economies of our state.

AN ACT concerning lotteries; concerning electronic gaming, lottery facility games and other lottery games; amending K.S.A. 74-8702, 74-8705, 74-8710, 74-8723, 74-8830 and 74-8832 and K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 19-101a and 74-8711 and repealing the existing sections; also repealing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 19-101k.

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41 42 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 74-8702 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-8702. As used in the Kansas lottery act, unless the context otherwise requires:

- (a) "Commission" means the Kansas lottery commission.
- (b) "Executive director" means the executive director of the Kansas lottery.
- (c) "Gaming equipment" means any electric, electronic or mechanical device or other equipment unique to the Kansas lottery used directly in the operation of any lottery and in the determination of winners pursuant to this act. "Gaming equipment" means any electric, electronic, computerized or electromechanical machine, mechanism, supply or device or any other equipment, which is: (1) Unique to the Kansas lottery and used pursuant to the Kansas lottery act; and (2) integral to the operation of an electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game; and (3) affects the results of an electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game by determining win or loss.
- (d) "Kansas lottery" means the state agency created by this act to operate a lottery or lotteries pursuant to this act.
- (e) "Lottery retailer" means any person with whom the Kansas lottery has contracted to sell lottery tickets or shares, or both, to the public.
- (f) "Lottery" or "state lottery" means the lottery or lotteries operated pursuant to this act.
- (g) (1) "Major procurement" means any gaming product or service, including but not limited to facilities, advertising and promotional services, annuity contracts, prize payment agreements, consulting services, equipment, tickets and other products and services unique to the Kansas lottery, but not including materials, supplies, equipment and services common to the ordinary operations of state agencies.

matter covered by or addressed in the Kansas expanded lottery act or a management contract executed pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery 5

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- "Person" means any natural person, association, limited liability company, corporation or partnership.
- (i) "Prize" means any prize paid directly by the Kansas lottery pursuant to its the Kansas lottery act or the Kansas expanded lottery act or any rules and regulations adopted pursuant to either act.
- (j) "Share" means any intangible manifestation authorized by the Kansas lottery to prove participation in a lottery game, except as provided by the Kansas expanded lottery act.
- "Ticket" means any tangible evidence issued by the Kansas lottery to prove participation in a lottery game other than a lottery facility game.
- (l) "Vendor" means any person who has entered into a major procurement contract with the Kansas lottery.
- (m) "Returned ticket" means any ticket which was transferred to a lottery retailer, which was not sold by the lottery retailer and which was returned to the Kansas lottery for refund by issuance of a credit or otherwise.
- "Video lottery machine" means any electronic video game machine that, upon insertion of cash, is available to play or simulate the play of a video game authorized by the commission, including but not limited to bingo, poker, black jack and keno, and which uses a video display and microprocessors and in which, by chance, the player may receive free games or credits that can be redeemed for cash.
- (o) (1) "Lottery machine" means any machine or device that allows a player to insert cash or other form of consideration and may deliver as the result of an element of chance, regardless of the skill required by the player, a prize or evidence of a prize, including, but not limited to:
- (A) Any machine or device in which the prize or evidence of a prize is determined by both chance and the player's or players' skill, including, but not limited to, any machine or device on which a lottery game or lottery games, such as poker or blackjack, are played;
- (B) any machine or device in which the prize or evidence of a prize is determined only by chance, including, but not limited to, any slot machine or bingo machine; or
- any lottery ticket vending machine, such as a keno ticket vending machine, pull-tab vending machine or an instant-bingo vending machine.
 - "Lottery machine" shall not mean:
- (A) Any food vending machine defined by K.S.A. 36-501, and amendments thereto:
 - any nonprescription drug machine authorized under K.S.A. 65-

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650, and amendments thereto;

(C) any machine which dispenses only bottled or canned soft drinks, chewing gum, nuts or candies; or

(D) any machine excluded from the definition of gambling devices under subsection (d) of K.S.A. 21-4302, and amendments thereto:; or

(E) any electronic gaming machine, lottery facility game or video lottery terminal operated in accordance with the provisions of the Kansas

expanded lottery act.

- (p) "Electronic gaming machine" means any electronic, electromechanical, video or computerized device, contrivance or machine authorized by the Kansas lottery which, upon insertion of cash, tokens, electronic cards or any consideration, is available to play, operate or simulate the play of a game authorized by the Kansas lottery pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act, including, but not limited to, bingo, poker, blackjack, keno and slot machines, and which may deliver or entitle the player operating the machine to receive cash, tokens, merchandise or credits that may be redeemed for cash. Electronic gaming machines may use bill validators and may be single-position reel-type, single or multi-game video and single-position multi-game video electronic game, including but not limited to, poker, blackjack and slot machines. Electronic gaming machines shall be directly linked to a central computer at a location determined by the executive director for purposes of security, monitoring and auditing. Electronic gaming machines may be linked to the central video lottery terminal computer system.
- (q) "Progressive electronic game" means a game played on an electronic gaming machine for which the payoff increases uniformly as the game is played and for which the jackpot, determined by application of a formula to the income of independent, local or interlinked electronic gaming machines, may be won.
- (r) "Token" means a representative of value, of metal or other material, which is not legal tender, redeemable for cash only by the issuing lottery gaming facility manager and which is issued and sold by a lottery gaming facility manager for the sole purpose of playing an electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game.

(s) "Lottery gaming facility" means that portion of a building, including the real and personal property, that is owned or leased by the state for the purposes of operating, managing and maintaining lottery facility games.

(t) "Lottery gaming enterprise" means an entertainment enterprise which includes a lottery gaming facility authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act and ancillary lottery gaming operations that have a common business or marketing strategy. A lottery gaming enterprise shall be designed to attract to its lottery gaming facility consumers who reside

outside the immediate area of such enterprise.

(u) "Lottery gaming facility manager" means a corporation, limited liability company or other business entity authorized to construct and manage, or manage alone, pursuant to a management contract with the Kansas lottery, and on behalf of the state, a lottery gaming enterprise and lottery gaming facility.

(v) "Accelerated lottery gaming facility net payment" means the advanced payment to the state treasurer of a portion of the state's future share of residual lottery gaming facility revenues upon approval of a management contract with a lottery gaming facility manager for the development or construction of a lottery gaming facility and management of a lottery gaming enterprise pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act.

(w) "Lottery gaming facility revenues" means the total revenues from lottery facility games at a lottery gaming facility after all related prizes

are paid.

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(x) "Residual lottery gaming facility revenues" means the balance of the lottery gaming facility revenues in each account in the lottery gaming facility fund established in subsection (a) of section 8, and amendments thereto, after the transfer to an operating account for the payment of lottery gaming facility expenses and interest on financing approved in the management contract, as described in subsection (b) of section 8, and amendments thereto.

(y) "Lottery gaming facility expenses" means normal business expenses, as defined by the executive director pursuant to generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP), associated with the ownership and operation of a lottery gaming facility find enterprise, payments to any city or county and payments to the problem gambling grant fund.

(z) "Lottery facility games" mean any electronic gaming machines and any other lottery games in the form of Class II or III gaming which, as of May 1, 2004, are authorized to be conducted or operated at a tribal gaming facility, as defined in K.S.A. 74-9802, and amendments thereto, located within the boundaries of this state.

(aa) "Ancillary lottery gaming facility operations" means additional non-lottery facility game products and services not owned and operated by the state which may be included in the overall development associated with the lottery gaming facility. Such operations may include, but are not limited to, restaurants, hotels, motels, museums or entertainment facilities. Such operations conducted on state-owned property shall pay reasonable compensation to the state for the use of the space.

(bb) "Certificate of authorization" means a written approval of the executive director authorizing a prospective lottery gaming facility manager to proceed with county approval under section 3, and amendments thereto, and any applicable county or city planning and zoning require-

ments for the establishment of a lottery gaming facility pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act. No prospective lottery gaming facility manager shall seek the approval under section 5, and amendments thereto, unless such prospective manager holds a certificate or temporary certificate of authorization.

(cc) "Management contract" means a contract, subcontract or collateral agreement between the state and a lottery gaming facility manager for the management of a lottery gaming facility owned and operated by the state, negotiated and signed by the executive director on behalf of the state. Management contracts shall not be subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 75-3738 through 75-3744, and amendments thereto, or to any statutory provision regulating major procurements.

(dd) "Parimutuel licensee" means a facility owner licensee or facility

manager licensee under the Kansas parimutuel racing act.

(ee) "Parimutuel licensee location" means the racetrack facility, as defined in K.S.A. 74-8802, and amendments thereto, owned or managed by the parimutuel licensee. A parimutuel licensee location may include any existing structure at such racetrack facility or any structure that may be constructed on real estate where such racetrack facility is located.

- (ff) "Destination development zone" means one of the following zones where one or more lottery gaming facilities may be operated pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act as a part of an overall strategy of creating regional tourism destinations to enhance the local and state economy through increased tourism opportunities:
- 25 (1) The northeast Kansas development zone, which consists of Wy-26 andotte county;
- 27 (2) the southeast Kansas development zone, which consists of Craw-28 ford and Cherokee counties;
 - (3) the south central Kansas development zone, which consists of Sedgwick county;
 - (4) the southwest Kansas development zone, which consists of Ford county; or
 - (5) the north central Kansas development zone, which consists of Geary county.
 - (gg) "Gray machine" means any mechanical, electro-mechanical or electronic device, capable of being used for gambling, that is: (1) Not authorized by the Kansas lottery, (2) not linked to a lottery central computer or the central video lottery terminal computer system, (3) available to the public for play and (4) capable of simulating a game played on a video lottery terminal or any similar gambling game authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act.

New Sec. 2. (a) Sections 2 through 29, and amendments thereto, shall be known and may be cited as the Kansas expanded lottery act. The

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Kansas expanded lottery act shall be part of and supplemental to the Kansas lottery act.

(b) If any provision of this act or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect any other provision or application of the act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application.

New Sec. 3. (a) The executive director shall issue a certificate of authorization to each prospective lottery gaming facility manager which meets the necessary requirements established by the executive director and as set forth herein. The executive director shall select as prospective lottery gaming facility managers only such entities as the executive director deems best able to serve the interests of the state of Kansas, the public good and convenience. In the selection of lottery gaming facility managers, the executive director shall consider factors such as financial responsibility, integrity, reputation, experience and such other factors as the executive director deems appropriate.

(b) The executive director may charge an administrative application fee. Such fee shall be submitted with the application for a certificate of authorization and shall be reasonably related to the actual costs of processing the application.

(c) To receive a certificate of authorization, a prospective lottery gaming facility manager shall, at a minimum:

- (1) Have sufficient access to financial resources to support the activities required of a lottery gaming facility manager under the Kansas expanded lottery act;
- (2) be current in filing all applicable tax returns and in payment of all taxes, interest and penalties owed to the state of Kansas and any taxing subdivision where such prospective manager is located in the state of Kansas, excluding items under formal appeal pursuant to applicable statutes; and
- (3) have three consecutive years experience in the management of a gaming-related facility operated pursuant to state or federal law.
- (d) Any certificate of authorization issued to a parimutuel licensee which proposes to establish a lottery gaming facility at a parimutuel licensee location shall be contingent upon approval by the Kansas racing and gaming commission of a plan for compliance with the requirements for live racing and purse supplements established pursuant to sections 30 and 38, and amendments thereto. Upon application of a parimutuel licensee, the Kansas racing and gaming commission shall open a proceeding to consider such licensee's proposal for development of a lottery gaming facility at the parimutuel licensee location. Such proposal shall include provisions for: (1) Compliance with the requirements of section 30, and amendments thereto; (2) payment of purse supplements from the appro-

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priate funds established by section 38, and amendments thereto; and

(3) a plan for protecting and promoting live racing in Kansas. The Kansas racing and gaming commission shall hear evidence and testimony from all interested parties. Upon a finding by the Kansas racing and gaming commission that the proposal is in the best interest of live racing in Kansas and more beneficial to live racing than placement of video lottery terminals at such parimutuel licensee location, the Kansas racing and gaming commission may approve such proposal and recommend issuance of a certificate of authorization by the executive director of the Kansas lottery pursuant to this section.

(e) Subject to the requirements of this section, a certificate of authorization shall not be unreasonably withheld. The executive director shall issue a temporary certificate of authorization for the purpose of proceeding under section 5. and amendments thereto, to a prospective lottery gaming facility manager if: (1) The executive director believes such manager will meet the appropriate requirements for a certificate of authorization; (2) the prospective manager and the principals, officers and directors, of such prospective manager, have completed acceptable background investigations by federal or state authorities; and (3) a complete review of the application for a certificate cannot be completed within 30 days of the application filing.

New Sec. 4. (a) The executive director, with the approval of the Kansas lottery commission, may enter into a management contract with a prospective lottery gaming facility manager holding a certificate of authorization to construct and manage, or manage alone, on behalf of the state of Kansas, a lottery gaming facility or lottery gaming enterprise at specified destination locations within development zones in the state where the executive director determines the operation of such facility would promote tourism and economic development if it is in a county where a proposition submitted pursuant to section 5, and amendments thereto, has been approved by the voters of such county. Approval of a management contract by the executive director and the commission shall not be unreasonably withheld. Action on a management contract shall be taken within 60 days of submission of the management contract proposal, unless extended by agreement of the proposed manager and the commission.

(b) In determining whether to enter into a management contract with a prospective lottery gaming facility manager to manage a lottery gaming facility or lottery gaming enterprise pursuant to this section, the commission shall take into consideration the following factors: The size of the proposed facility; the geographic area in which such facility is to be located; the proposed facility's location as a tourist and entertainment destination; the estimated number of tourists that would be attracted by the

(a) The lottery commission shall establish, pursuant to rules and regulations, a procedure to receive, consider and approve proposed management contracts for lottery gaming facilities. Such procedure shall provide for review of competitive proposals within a destination development zone.

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proposed facility; the number and type of lottery facility games to be operated at the proposed facility; and agreements related to ancillary lottery gaming facility operations. In order to facilitate competition among lottery gaming facilities and to increase gaming revenues to the state, no lottery gaming facility manager may hold management contracts for two or more lottery gaming facilities which are located within 20 miles of one another within the state of Kansas. In addition, no management contract shall be awarded for a lottery gaming facility located within Johnson, Wyandotto, Douglas, Shawnee, Leavenworth or Miami counties in Kansas to any owner, operator or manager of any casino or other gaming establishment which is in operation and located within Buchanan, Gass, Clay, Jackson, Johnson, Lafayette, Platte and Ray counties in Missouri.

- (c) The commission may authorize more than one lottery gaming facility within a destination development zone if the commission determines that it is in the best interest of the state to approve multiple management contracts within such zone. The commission shall determine through a review of market studies included in proposals whether development of multiple lottery gaming facilities within the same market place is reasonably feasible. If the commission deems it necessary, the commission may provide for an independent market study to assess the market impact of more than one lottery gaming facility within the same market area.
- (d). The commission shall not approve a management contract unless the commission determines that the proposed development: (1) Consists of an investment in infrastructure, including ancillary lottery gaming facility operations of at least \$150,000,000 for the northeast and southcentral development zone; or (2) consists of an investment infrastructure including ancillary lottery gaming facility operations of at least \$25,000,000 and demonstrates through a market study that at least 25% of its gaming consumers would reside outside the state of Kansas for all other development zones.
 - (e) All management contracts authorized under this section shall:
- (1) Have a maximum initial term of 15 years from the date of opening of the lottery gaming facility. At the end of the initial term, the contract maybe renewed by mutual consent of the state and the lottery facility gaming manager;
- (2) establish a mechanism to facilitate payment of lottery gaming facility expenses, payment of the lottery gaming facility manager's share of the residual lottery gaming facility revenues and distribution of the state's share of the residual lottery gaming facility revenues;
- (3) establish the types of lottery facility games to be installed in such facility;
 - (4) establish the maximum construction cost or purchase cost of the

- (c)(1) No management contract shall be awarded for a lottery gaming facility located within Wyandotte county to any owner, operator or manager of a casino or other gaming establishment which is in operation and located in Buchanan, Cass, Clay, Jackson, Johnson, Lafayette, Platte or Ray county, Missouri.
- (2) No management contract shall be awarded for a lottery gaming facility located within Cherokee or Crawford county to any owner, operator or manager of a casino or other gaming establishment which is in operation and located in: (A) Barry, Barton, Cedar, Dade, Jasper, Lawrence, McDonald, Newton or Vernon county, Missouri; (B) Craig, Delaware, Mayes or Ottawa county, Oklahoma; or (C) Benton county, Arkansas.

The commission shall not approve a management contract unless the commissions determines that the proposes development: (1) Constitutes a lottery gaming enterprise; and (2) demonstrates through a market study that, considering all other competing gaming and entertainment venues, the proposed development would: (A) Be economically feasible, (B) be profitable for the state and (C) not render economically infeasible any other lottery gaming enterprise. In addition, the

(5) specify the terms of the lease including, but not limited to, terms which establish state control of the lottery gaming facility and that any lease payments shall be treated as an operating expense, if the lottery gaming facility is leased by the state;

(6) calculate the accelerated lottery gaming facility net payment by multiplying the maximum number of electronic gaming machines authorized for and located in the facility by \$15,000 per machine;

(7) specify the mechanism for recovering the accelerated lottery gaming facility net payment from the state's share of the residual lottery gaming facility revenues;

(8) specify that financing for construction and operation of the lottery gaming facility on behalf of the state and of the payment to the state of other sums required by the management contract is to be arranged by the lottery gaming facility manager and that the state shall cooperate in the financing by executing all necessary security interests for the construction, equipping and operation of the lottery gaming facility;

(9) incorporate terms and conditions for the ancillary lottery gaming facility operations;

(10) designate as key employees, subject to approval of the executive director, any employees or contractors providing services or functions which are related to lottery facility games authorized by a management contract:

(11) include financing commitments for construction;

(12) include a resolution of endorsement from the city, if the proposed facility is within the corporate limits of a city, or from the county if the proposed facility is located in the unincorporated area of the county;

(13) include for parimutual licensee location a requirement that any parimutuel licensee developing a destination casino pursuant to this act comply with all orders and rules and regulations of the Kansas racing and gaming commission with regard to the conduct of live racing, including the same minimum days of racing as specified in section 16, and amendments thereto, for operation of video lottery terminals at parimutuel licensee locations; and

(14) include any payment, up to 2% of the lottery gaming facility revenues to the city, and up to 2% of the lottery gaming facility revenues to the county in which the lottery gaming facility is located, for services as determined by the management contract. Such payment shall be deemed to be an expense of the lottery gaming facility.

(f) Any management contract under which the accelerated lottery

(15) allow the lottery gaming facility manager to operate the lottery gaming facility in a manner consistent with this act, but shall place full, complete and ultimate ownership and control of the gaming operation of the lottery gaming facility with the Kansas Lottery. The Kansas Lottery shall retain the ability to overrule any significant gaming decision without notice required prior to taking such action. The Kansas Lottery shall retain full control over all decisions concerning lottery gaming facility games.

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gaming facility net payment has not been paid to the state treasurer within 180 days of the date of approval of the management contract shall be null and void.

- (g) Management contracts authorized by this section may include provisions relating to:
- (1) Accounting procedures to determine the lottery gaming facility revenues, unclaimed prizes and credits;
- (2) minimum requirements for a lottery gaming facility manager to provide qualified oversight, security and supervision of the lottery facility games including the use of qualified personnel with experience in applicable technology;
- (3) eligibility requirements for employees, contractors or agents of a lottery gaming facility manager who will have responsibility for or involvement with actual gaming activities or for the handling of cash or tokens:
 - (4) background investigations to be performed by the Kansas lottery;
- (5) licensure requirements of any employee, contractor or agent as provided by the Kansas expanded lottery act or rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto;
- (6) provision for termination of the management contract by either party for cause; and
- (7) any other provision deemed necessary by the parties, including such other terms and restrictions as necessary to conduct any lottery facility game in a legal and fair manner.
- (h) A management contract shall not constitute property, nor shall it be subject to attachment, garnishment or execution, nor shall it be alienable or transferable, except upon approval by the executive director, nor shall it be subject to being encumbered or hypothecated. No interest in the management contract shall descend by the laws of testate or intestate devolution, but any interest shall cease and expire upon the death of the lottery gaming facility manager or all interest holders in such manager, except that executors, administrators or representatives of the estate of any deceased lottery gaming facility manager and the trustee of any insolvent or bankrupt lottery gaming facility manager may continue to operate pursuant to the management contract under order of the appropriate court for no longer than one year after the death, bankruptcy or insolvency of such manager.
- (i) (1) The Kansas lottery shall be the licensee and owner of all software programs used at a lottery gaming facility for any lottery facility game.
- (2) A lottery gaming facility manager, on behalf of the state, shall purchase or lease for the Kansas lottery all lottery facility games. The lottery gaming facility manager shall be entitled to reimbursement from the state for all out-of-pocket expenses related to purchasing, leasing and

installing such games. The Kansas lottery shall be the owner of all lottery facility games, except for those leased by the state or leased by the lottery gaming facility manager on behalf of the state, and all lottery facility games shall be subject to the ultimate control of the Kansas lottery in accordance with this act.

(j) A lottery gaming facility shall comply with any planning and zoning regulations of the city or county in which it is to be located. The executive director shall not contract with any prospective lottery gaming facility manager for the operation and management of such lottery gaming facility unless such manager first receives any necessary approval under planning and zoning requirements of the city or county in which it is to be located.

New Sec. 5. (a) Before the lottery commission may approve management contracts for operation of lottery gaming facilities in a county, the qualified voters of the county where a lottery gaming facility is proposed to be located must approve the operation of lottery gaming facilities within the county as provided by this section. Once the question has been submitted to and approved by the voters of the county, subsequent elections shall not be required for the approval of the operation of additional lottery gaming facilities in such county.

(b) (1) The board of county commissioners of any county may submit, by resolution, and shall submit upon presentation of a petition filed in accordance with this section, to the qualified voters of the county a proposition to permit the operation of lottery gaming facilities within the county pursuant to this section. The proposition shall be submitted to the voters either at a special election called by the board of county commissioners for that purpose and held not less than 90 days after the resolution is adopted or the petition is filed or at the next general election, as shall be specified by the board of county commissioners or as specified in the petition, as the case may be.

(2) A petition to submit a proposition pursuant to this section shall be filed with the county election officer. The petition shall be signed by qualified voters of the county equal in number to not less than 10% of the voters of the county who voted for the office of secretary of state at the last preceding general election at which such office was elected. The following shall appear on the petition: "We request an election to determine whether the Kansas lottery shall be authorized to contract for operation of a lottery gaming facility in _______ county."

(3) Upon the adoption of a resolution or the submission of a valid petition calling for an election pursuant to this section, the county election officer shall cause the following proposition to be placed on the ballot at the election called for that purpose: "Shall the Kansas lottery be authorized to contract for operation of a lottery gaining facility in _______ county?"

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- (4) If a majority of the votes cast and counted at such election is in favor of approving the operation of lottery gaming facilities within the county, the lottery commission may accept applications for operation of lottery gaming facilities within the county pursuant to this act. If a majority of the votes cast and counted at an election under this section is against permitting the operation of lottery gaming facilities within the county, the lottery commission shall not approve management contracts for the operation of lottery gaming facilities within the county. The county election officer shall transmit a copy of the certification of the results of the election to the executive director.
- (5) The election provided for by this subsection (b) shall be conducted, and the votes counted and canvassed, in the manner provided by law for question submitted elections of the county.
- (c) The lottery commission may consider qualified proposals for lottery gaming facility management contracts for developments in a county where the commission finds that after March 1, 2005, the county has held an advisory election of qualified voters pursuant to the county's home rule authority if the commission determines that the ballot question was in substantial compliance with the requirements of subsection (b)(3) and the election was administered by the county election officer in a manner consistent with the requirements of state election law.
- (d) The question of the operation of a lottery gaming facility in a county may be submitted at the same election as the question of placement of video lottery terminals in the county under section 26, and amendments thereto.
- (e) A ballot question submitted prior to April 15, 2005, which uses the phrase "destination casino" shall be deemed valid for the purposes of this section.
- New Sec. 6. (a) Electronic gaming machines operated pursuant to this act, including those operated as lottery facility games, shall:
- (1) Pay out an average of not less than 87% of the amount wagered over the life of the machine;
- (2) be directly linked to a central lottery communications system to provide monitoring, auditing and other available program information to the Kansas lottery;
- (3) be on-line and in constant communication with a central computer situated at a location determined by the executive director and specified in the management contract; and
- (4) be subject to deactivation at any time by order of the executive director.
- (b) The communications systems selected by the executive director shall not limit participation to only one electronic gaming machine manufacturer, distributor, supplier or provider. The lottery gaming facility

 manager shall lease or purchase for the Kansas lottery and at the lottery gaming facility's expense all equipment necessary to implement such central communications and auditing functions.

(c) No employee, contractor or other person who has any legal affiliation with a lottery gaming facility manager shall loan money to or otherwise extend credit to patrons of a location where electronic gaming machines or lottery facility games are situated.

New Sec. 7. (a) Each specific type of electronic gaming machine and lottery facility game shall be approved by the Kansas lottery. The Kansas lottery shall examine prototypes of electronic gaming machines and lottery facility games and shall notify the lottery gaming facility manager which types of electronic gaming machines or lottery facility games are in compliance with the requirements of this act. The use of progressive electronic gaming machines is expressly permitted.

- (b) No electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game shall be operated pursuant to this act unless the executive director first issues a certificate for such machine or game authorizing its use at a specified location. Each electronic gaming machine and lottery facility game shall have such certificate prominently displayed thereon. Any electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game which does not display the certificate required by this section is contraband and a public nuisance subject to confiscation by any law enforcement officer.
- (c) The executive director shall require any manufacturer, supplier, provider, lottery gaming facility manager or other person seeking the examination and certification of electronic gaming machines or lottery facility games to pay the anticipated actual costs of the examination in advance. After the completion of the examination, the executive director shall refund any overpayment or charge and collect amounts sufficient to reimburse the executive director for any underpayment of actual costs. The executive director may contract for the examination of electronic gaming machines and lottery facility games required by this section, and may rely upon testing done by or for other states regulating electronic gaming machines or lottery facility games, if the executive director deems such testing to be reliable and in the best interest of the state of Kansas.
- New Sec. 8. (a) There is hereby established in the state treasury the lottery gaming facility fund (LGFF). A separate account for each lottery gaming facility manager shall be maintained in the LGFF for receipt of lottery gaming facility revenues from each respective manager. The lottery gaming facility manager shall remit daily all lottery gaming facility revenues to the state treasurer. Upon receipt of the remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state treasury and credit it to the respective account maintained for such manager in the LGFF.
 - (b) Upon receipt of each remittance under subsection (a), the state

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treasurer shall immediately transfer 50% of the lottery gaming facility revenues received from the remitting facility manager into a separate state lottery gaming facility operating account (LGFOA) to be used by the state for the payment of all lottery gaming facility expenses, including all interest on any bonds issued pursuant to section 0, and amendments thereto, or other approved financing. On a monthly basis, a transfer in the amount of the monthly interest then due on the bonds shall occur from the LGFOA to the debt retirement account established in section 8(c)(2), and amendments thereto. On a monthly basis, a transfer in an amount equal to 0.5% of the lottery gaming facility revenues shall occur from the LGFOA to the problem gambling grant fund established by K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 79-4805, and amendments thereto.

The executive director or the executive director's designee shall remit payment for all expenses approved by the lottery gaming facility manager within three days of submission of documentation evidencing the expense to the executive director or the executive director's designee.

(c) On a monthly basis, the treasurer shall transfer the residual lottery gaming facility revenues in each account in the LGFF as follows:

(1) To the lottery gaming facility manager, not more than 35%; and

(2) to a trust fund account to be established within the state's funds, not less than 65%, to be used exclusively for the necessary and appropriatefunding for elementary, secondary and higher education. For each lettery gaming fuellity; the state shall maintain a lottery gaming facility debt retirement account (LGFDRA) for the payment of any bonds, and interest thereon, issued pursuant to section 0, and amendments thereto, or other financing obligations related to the lottery gaming facility. Interest such bonds shall be payable from the LGFDRA out of the funds transferred from the LGFOA pursuant to section 8(b), and amendments thereto. To the extent principal on such bonds or other financing obligations related to the lottery gaining facility remains unpaid, the state treasurer first shall transfer to the LGFDRA out of the state's share of the residual lottery gaming facility revenues as provided in section 8(c)(2), and amendments thereto, such sums as are necessary to pay scheduled principal then due. Thereafter, the balance of the residual lottery gaming facility revenues shall be transferred to the trust fund account as provided in section $\theta(c)(2)$, and amendments thereto.

(d) On a monthly basis, the executive director and the lottery gaming facility manager shall reconcile the amounts deposited into the LGFOA for the lottery gaming facility manager's payment of the projected lottery gaming facility expenses and bond interest or approved financing interest with the actual lottery gaming facility expenses and interest accrued. After completion of the reconciliation, the state shall transfer any amount remaining in the LGFOA to the LGFF to be distributed in the manner For a lottery gaming facility that is owned by the state

New Sec. 9. (a) The Kansas development finance authority is hereby authorized to issue revenue bonds, including refunding revenue bonds, in amounts sufficient to pay the development and construction costs associated with a lottery gaming facility and the amount of the accelerated lottery gaming facility net payment, plus all amounts required for the costs of bond issuance and any required reserves on the bonds. The bonds, and interest thereon, issued pursuant to this section shall be payable from the debt retirement account established in section 6(c), and amendments thereto.

(b) The provisions of subsection (a) of K.S.A. 74-8905, and amendments thereto, shall not prohibit the issuance of bonds by the Kansas development finance authority for the purposes of this section and any such issuance of bonds is exempt from the provisions of subsection (a) of K.S.A. 74-8905, and amendments thereto, which would operate to preclude such issuance.

(c) Revenue bonds including refunding revenue bonds, issued hereunder shall not constitute an indebtedness of the state of Kansas, nor shall they constitute indebtedness within the meaning of any constitutional or statutory provision limiting the incurring of indebtedness.

(d) Revenue bonds, including refunding revenue bonds, issued hereunder and the income derived therefrom shall be exempt from all state, county and municipal taxation in the state of Kansas, except Kansas estate

New Sec. 10. (a) The executive director, or the executive director's designee, may observe and inspect all electronic gaming machines, lottery facility games, lottery gaming facilities and all related equipment and facilities operated by a lottery gaming facility manager.

(b) In addition to the powers granted pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8704 and sections 3 and 4, and amendments thereto, the executive director shall have the power to:

(1) Examine, or cause to be examined by any agent or representative designated by the executive director, any books, papers, records or memoranda of any lottery facility gaming manager, or of any business involved in electronic gaming machines or lottery facility games authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act, for the purpose of ascertaining compliance with any provision of the Kansas lottery act, the Kansas expanded lottery act, or any rules and regulations adopted thereunder;

New Sec. 9. The Kansas lottery, through rules and regulations shall establish:

- (a) A certification requirement, and enforcement procedure, for officers, directors, key employees and persons directly or indirectly owning a 5% or more interest in a lottery gaming facility manager. Such certification requirement shall include compliance with such security, fitness and background investigations and standards the executive director deems necessary to determine whether such person's reputation, habits or associations pose a threat to the public interest of the state or to the reputation of or effective regulation and control of the lottery gaming facility. Any person convicted of any felony, a crime involving gambling or a crime of moral turpitude prior to applying for a certificate as such sales agent or at any time thereafter shall be deemed unfit. The Kansas lottery shall conduct the security, fitness and background checks required pursuant to this subsection;
- (b) a certification requirement, and enforcement procedure, for those persons, including electronic gaming machine manufacturers, technology providers and computer system providers, who propose to contract with a lottery gaming facility manager or the state for the provision of goods or services related to a lottery gaming facility, including management services. Such certification requirements shall include compliance with such security, fitness and background investigations and standards of officers, directors, key gaming employees and persons directly or indirectly owning a 5% or more interest in such entity, the executive director deems necessary to determine whether such person's reputation, habits and associations pose a threat to the public interest of the state or to the reputation of or effective regulation and control of the lottery gaming facility. Any person convicted of any felony, a crime involving gambling or a crime of moral turpitude prior to applying for a certificate hereunder or at any time thereafter shall be deemed unfit. If the executive director determines the certification standards of another state are comprehensive, thorough, and provide similar adequate safeguards, the executive director may certify an applicant already certified in such state without the necessity of a full application and background check. The Kansas lottery shall conduct the security, fitness and background checks required under this subsection;
- (c) provisions for revocation of a certification required by paragraph (a) or (b) upon a finding that the certificate holder, an officer or director thereof or a person directly or indirectly owning a 5% or more interest therein: (1) Has knowingly provided false or misleading material information to the Kansas lottery or its employees; or (2) has been convicted of a felony, gambling related offense or any crime of moral turpitude; and
- (d) provisions for suspension, revocation or nonrenewal of a certification required by paragraph (a) or (b) upon a finding that the certificate holder, an officer or director thereof or a person directly or indirectly owning a 5% or more interest therein: (1) Has failed to notify the Kansas lottery about a material change in ownership of the certificate holder, or any change in the directors or officers thereof; (2) is delinquent in remitting money owed to the Kansas lottery; (3) has violated any provision of any contract between the Kansas lottery and the certificate holder; or (4) has violated of any provision of the Kansas expanded lottery act or any rule and regulation adopted hereunder.

(2) investigate alleged violations of the Kansas expanded lottery act

- and alleged violations of any rules and regulations, orders and final decisions of the commission or the executive director:
- (3) request a court to issue subpoenas to compel access to or for the production of any books, papers, records or memoranda in the custody or control of any lottery gaming facility manager related to the management of the lottery gaming facility, or to compel the appearance of any lottery gaming facility manager for the purpose of ascertaining compliance with the provisions of the Kansas lottery act and the Kansas ex-
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- panded lottery act or rules and regulations adopted thereunder;
 - (4) inspect and approve, prior to publication or distribution, all advertising by a lottery gaming facility manager which includes any reference to the Kansas lottery; and (5) take any other action as may be reasonable or appropriate to en-
 - force the provisions of the Kansas expanded lottery act and any rules and regulations, orders and final decisions of the executive director or the commission.
 - (c) Appropriate security measures shall be required in any and all areas where electronic gaming machines and other lottery facility games authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act are located or operated. The executive director shall approve all such security measures.
 - (d) The executive director shall require an annual audit of the electronic gaming machine operations and lottery facility games of each lottery gaming facility manager contracting with the Kansas lottery. Such audit shall be conducted by a licensed accounting firm approved by the executive director. Such audit shall be conducted at the expense of the lottery.
 - (e) None of the information disclosed pursuant to this section shall be subject to disclosure under the Kansas open records act, K.S.A. 45-216 et seq., and amendments thereto.
 - New Sec. 11. (a) Wagers shall be received only from a person at the location where the electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game is authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act. No person present at such location shall place or attempt to place a wager on behalf of another person who is not present at such location.
 - (b) Violation of this section is a class A nonperson misdemeanor upon a conviction for a first offense. Violation of this section is a severity level 9, nonperson felony upon conviction for a second or subsequent offense.
 - New Sec. 12. (a) Except as authorized in subsection (c), it is unlawful for any lottery gaming facility manager, or its employees or agents, to allow any person to play electronic gaming machines or lottery facility games or share in winnings of a person knowing such person to be:
 - (1) Under 21 years of age;

- (2) the executive director, a member of the commission or an employee of the Kansas lottery;
 - (3) an employee or agent of the lottery gaming facility manager;
- (4) an officer or employee of a vendor contracting with the Kansas lottery to supply gaming equipment to the Kansas lottery for use in the operation of any electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game conducted pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act;
- (5) a spouse, child, stepchild, brother, stepbrother, sister, stepsister, parent or stepparent of a person described in subsection (a)(2), (a)(3) or (a)(4); or
- (6) a person who resides in the same household as any person described by subsection (a)(2), (a)(3) or (a)(4).
- (b) Violation of subsection (a) is a class A nonperson misdemeanor upon conviction for a first offense. Violation of subsection (a) is a severity level 9, nonperson felony upon conviction for a second or subsequent offense.
- (c) The executive director may authorize in writing any employee of the Kansas lottery and any employee of a lottery vendor to play an electronic gaming machine or a lottery facility game authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act to verify the proper operation thereof with respect to security and contract compliance. Any prize awarded as a result of such play shall become the property of the Kansas lottery and be added to the prize pools of subsequent lottery games. No money or merchandise shall be awarded to any employee of the Kansas lottery playing an electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game pursuant to this subsection.
- (d) It shall be a severity level 9, nonperson felony for any individual, firm, corporation or other legal entity to place in operation or continue to have in place any gray machine for use by members of the public at any location in this state.
- New Sec. 13. A person under age 21 shall not be permitted in an area of any location where any electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act is being operated or conducted, except for a person at least 18 years of age who is an employee of the lottery gaming facility manager. No employee under age 21 shall perform any function involved in gaming by patrons. No person under age 21 shall be permitted to make a wager on an electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act.
- New Sec. 14. Except for persons acting in accordance with rules and regulations of the Kansas lottery or by written authority of the executive director in performing installation, maintenance, inspection and repair services, any person who, with the intent to manipulate the outcome, pay

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New Sec. 15. (a) Except in accordance with rules and regulations of the Kansas lottery or by written authority from the executive director in performing installation, maintenance, inspection and repair services, it is a class A nonperson misdemeanor for the executive director, the commission or any employee or agent of the commission, or the lottery gaming facility manager or any employee of such manager, to knowingly, while in Kansas, place a wager on or bet or play an electronic gaming machine or other lottery facility game authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act.

- (b) It is a class A nonperson misdemeanor for any member, employee or appointee of the commission to knowingly accept any compensation, gift, loan, entertainment, favor or service from any lottery gaming facility manager.
- (c) It is a severity level 8, nonperson felony for any person playing or using any electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game in Kansas knowingly to:
- (1) Use other than a lawful coin or legal tender of the United States of America, or to use coin not of the same denomination as the coin intended to be used in an electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game; except that in the playing of any electronic gaming machine, lottery facility game or similar gaming device, it shall be lawful for any person to use gaming billets, tokens or similar objects therein which are approved by the Kansas lottery;
- (2) use gaming billets, tokens or similar objects in a lottery gaming facility other than in the facility for which the billet, token or similar object was approved;
- (3) possess or use, while on the premises of a lottery gaming facility, or any location where electronic gaming machines or other lottery facility games are authorized pursuant to this act, any cheating or thieving device, including, but not limited to, tools, wires, drills, coins attached to strings or wires or electronic or magnetic devices to facilitate removing from any electronic gaming machine or lottery facility game or any money or contents thereof;
- (4) possess or use while on the premises of a lottery gaming facility, or any location where electronic gaming machines or other lottery facility games are authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act, any key or device designed for the purpose of, or suitable for, opening or entering any electronic gaming machine, lottery facility game or similar gaming device or drop box.

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(d) Any duly authorized agent or employee of the commission or a lottery gaming facility manager may possess and use any of the devices described in paragraphs (3) and (4) of subsection (c) in furtherance of inspection or testing as provided in the Kansas expanded lottery act or in furtherance of such person's employment at any location where electronic gaming machines, lottery facility games or other lottery games are authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act.

New Sec. 16. Each lottery gaming facility manager shall post one or more signs at the location where such manager operates electronic gaming machines or lottery facility games to inform patrons of the toll-free number available to provide information and referral services regarding compulsive or problem gambling. The text shall be determined by the secretary of the department of social and rehabilitation services. Failure by a lottery gaming facility manager to post and maintain such signs shall be cause for the imposition of a fine not to exceed \$500 per day.

New Sec. 17. Pursuant to section 2 of the federal act entitled "An Act to Prohibit Transportation of Gambling Devices in Interstate and Foreign Commerce," 15 U.S.C. 1171 through 1777, the state of Kansas, acting by and through the duly elected and qualified members of the legislature, does hereby in this section, and in accordance with and in compliance with the provisions of section 2 of such federal act, declare and proclaim that it is exempt from the provision of section 2 of such federal act to the extent that such gambling devices as described therein are being transported to or from the Kansas lottery or to or from a lottery gaming facility manager at a location within the state of Kansas where electronic gaming machines or lottery facility games are authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act.

New Sec. 18. No taxes, fees, charges, transfers or distributions, other than those provided for in the Kansas expanded lottery act, shall be made or levied by any city, county or other municipality from or against net machine income or lottery gaming facility revenue derived from electronic gaming machines and lottery facility games operated pursuant to this act.

New Sec. 19. All sales of electronic gaming machine games and lottery facility games authorized by the Kansas expanded lottery act shall be exempt from sales taxes imposed pursuant to K.S.A. 12-187 et seq. and 79-3601 et seq., and amendments thereto.

New Sec. 20. Each lottery gaming facility manager shall hold the executive director, the commission and the state harmless from and defend any and all claims which may be asserted against the executive director, the commission and the state, or the agents or employees thereof, arising from the operation of electronic gaming machines, lottery facility games or other lottery-type games pursuant to the Kansas expanded lot-

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tery act. This section may be satisfied by procurement of insurance as a lottery gaming facility expense of the lottery gaming facility naming the executive director, the commission and the state as additional insured parties. The provisions of this section shall not apply to any claims arising from a negligent act or omission or willful or malicious misconduct of the executive director, the commission or the state, or the agents or employees thereof.

New Sec. 21. As a condition precedent to contracting for the privilege of being a lottery gaming facility manager, such manager shall file with the secretary of state of this state a written and irrevocable consent that any action or garnishment proceeding may be commenced against such manager in the proper court of any county in this state by the service of process on a resident agent, and stipulating and agreeing that such service shall be valid and binding as if service had been made upon such manager. Such written consent shall state that the courts of this state have jurisdiction over the person of the lottery gaming facility manager and are the proper and convenient forum for such action and shall waive the right to request a change of jurisdiction or venue to a court outside this state and that all actions arising under this act and commenced by such manager shall be brought in this state's courts as the proper and convenient forum. Such consent shall be executed by the lottery gaming facility manager and, if a corporation, by the president and secretary of such corporate manager. Such consent shall be accompanied by a certified copy of the order or resolution of the board of directors, trustees or managers authorizing the president and secretary to execute the same.

New Sec. 22. The Kansas expanded lottery act, lottery gaming facility managers and management contracts under the Kansas expanded lottery act shall not be subject to the provisions of and restrictions on major procurement contracts, including, but not limited to, the provisions of K.S.A. 74-8705, and amendments thereto.

New Sec. 23. The sale or service by lottery gaming facility managers or ancillary lottery gaming facility operations and the consumption by patrons of lottery gaming facilities of alcohol, liquor, wine, spirits, cereal malt beverages and other intoxicating liquors is hereby permitted upon and in lottery gaming facilities and ancillary lottery gaming facility operations. The provisions of K.S.A. 41-719, and amendments thereto, relating to alcoholic liquor shall not be applicable to lottery gaming facilities and ancillary lottery gaming facility operations.

New Sec. 24. As used in sections 24 through 46, and amendments thereto, unless the context otherwise requires:

(a) "Accelerated video lottery net payment" means the advanced payment to the state treasurer of a portion of the state's future share of net video lottery terminal income pursuant to the final management contract

between the executive director and a video lottery parimutuel sales agent for the operation of video lottery terminals at a parimutuel litensee location.

- (b) "Central video lottery terminal computer system" means the central computer system, which monitors the operations of all video lottery terminals, approved by the Kansas lottery and which is provided by the central video lottery terminal computer system provider in accordance with this act.
- (c) "Central video lottery terminal computer system provider" means a person with whom the executive director has contracted for the purpose of providing and maintaining a central video lottery terminal computer system and the related management facilities with respect to operating and servicing the video lottery terminals.
- (d) "Gray machine" means any mechanical, electro-mechanical or electronic device, capable of being used for gambling, that is: (1) Not authorized by the Kansas lottery, (2) not connected to the central video lottery terminal computer system, (3) available to the public for play and (4) capable of simulating a game played on a video lottery terminal or any similar gambling game authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act.
- (e) "Net video lottery terminal income" means all cash or other consideration utilized to play a video lottery terminal, less all cash or other consideration paid out to winning players as prizes.
- (f) "Organization licensee" has the meaning provided by K.S.A. 74-8802, and amendments thereto.
- (g) "Parimutuel licensee" means a facility owner licensee or facility manager licensee under the Kansas parimutuel racing act.
- (h) "Parimutuel licensee location" means the racetrack facility, as defined in K.S.A. 74-8802, and amendments thereto, owned or managed by the parimutuel licensee. A parimutuel licensee location may include any existing structure at such racetrack facility or any structure that may be constructed on real estate where such racetrack facility is located.
- (i) "Progressive video lottery game" means any game whose jackpot grows and accumulates as it is being played on a video lottery terminal and whose outcome is randomly determined by the play of video lottery terminals linked to the central video lottery terminal computer system.
- (j) "Video lottery" means any lottery conducted with a video lottery terminal or, with respect to a progressive game, a network of linked video lottery terminals.
- (k) "Video lottery game" means any electronically simulated game of chance, including but not limited to video poker, keno, line-up, or black-jack, displayed and played on a video lottery terminal.
 - (I) "Video lottery parimutuel sales agent" means a parimutuel li-

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censee specifically certified by the Kansas lottery to become a certified video lottery parimutuel sales agent and offer video lottery terminals for play at the parimutuel licensee location.

(m) "Video lottery terminal" means any electronic, electromechanical, video or computerized device, contrivance or machine authorized by the Kansas lottery which, upon insertion of cash, tokens, electronic cards or any consideration, is available to play, operate or simulate the play of a game authorized by the Kansas lottery pursuant to the Kansas gaming act, including, but not limited to, bingo, poker, blackjack, keno and slot machines, and which may deliver or entitle the player operating the machine to receive cash, tokens, merchandise or credits that may be redeemed for cash. Electronic gaming machines may use bill validators and may be single-position reel-type, single or multi-game video and single-position multi-game video electronic games, including, but not limited to, poker, blackjack and slot machines. Video lottery terminals shall be linked directly to a central computer at a location determined by the executive director for purposes of security, monitoring and auditing.

(n) "Video lottery terminal associated equipment" means any proprietary device, machine or part used in the manufacture, operation or maintenance of a video lottery terminal.

(o) "Video lottery terminal management contract" means an agreement between the Kansas lottery and a video lottery parimutuel sales agent which governs the placement and operation of video lottery terminals, including allocation and payment of expenses, management fee and net lease, recovery of any accelerated video lottery net payment and the state's share of net video terminal income?

(p) "Video lottery terminal manufacturer" means any individual, firm, corporation or other legal entity certified by the Kansas lottery to assemble or produce video lottery terminals or video lottery terminal associated equipment for sale or use in this state.

(q) "Voucher" means a bearer instrument in the form of a printed ticket or facsimile issued by a video lottery terminal to a player that represents the existing credit balance accumulated by a player of the video lottery terminal. A voucher is a secure document that carries a unique identifier in the form of a serial number and bar code issued by the central video lottery terminal computer system.

New Sec. 25. (a) The Kansas lottery shall implement a video lottery program whereby the Kansas lottery places video lottery terminals at parimutuel licensee locations.

(b) The Kansas lottery shall not place video lottery terminals at any parimutuel licensee location unless the commission has adopted rules and regulations as provided in sections 24 through 35, and amendments thereto. Video lottery terminals

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which shall not be less than 20% of net video lottery terminal income. A video lottery terminal management contract shall not constitute property, nor shall it be subject to attachment, garnishment or execution, nor shall it be alienable or transferable, except upon approval by the executive director, nor shall it be subject to being encumbered or hypothecated. No interest in the management contract shall descend by the laws of testate or intestate devolution, but any interest shall cease and expire upon the death of the video lottery parimutuel sales agent or all interest holders in such agent, except that executors, administrators or representatives of the estate of any deceased video lottery parimutuel sales agent and the trustee of any insolvent or bankrupt video lottery parimutuel sales agent may continue to operate pursuant to the management contract under order of the appropriate court for no longer than one year after the death, bankruptcy or insolvency of such video lottery parimutuel sales agent

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- (c) The Kansas lottery shall not place video lottery terminals at parimutuel licensee locations in a county unless the question of the placement of video lottery terminals in such county has been submitted to and approved by the voters of such county as provided in section 26, and amendments thereto.
- New Sec. 26. (a) Before the Kansas lottery places any video lottery terminals in a county, the qualified voters of the county must approve the placement of video lottery terminals in the county as provided by this section.
- (b) (1) The board of county commissioners of any county may submit by resolution, and shall submit upon presentation of a petition filed in accordance with this section, to the qualified voters of the county a proposition to permit the placement of video lottery terminals in the county pursuant to this subsection. The proposition shall be submitted to the voters either at a special election called by the board of county commissioners for that purpose and held not less than 90 days after the resolution is adopted or the petition is filed or at the next general election, as shall be specified by the board of county commissioners or as specified in the petition, as the case may be.
- (2) A petition to submit a proposition pursuant to this subsection shall be filed with the county election officer. The petition shall be signed by qualified voters of the county equal in number to not less than 10% of the voters of the county who voted for the office of secretary of state at the last preceding general election at which such office was elected. The following shall appear on the petition: "We request an election to determine whether the Kansas Lottery shall be authorized to place video lottery terminals in _____ county."
- (3) Upon the adoption of a resolution or the submission of a valid petition calling for an election pursuant to this section, the county election officer shall cause the following proposition to be placed on the ballot at the election called for that purpose: "Shall the Kansas Lottery be authorized to place video lottery terminals in ______ county?"
- (4) If a majority of the votes cast and counted at such election is in favor of approving the placement of video lottery terminals in the county, the executive director may enter into video lottery terminal management contracts for placement of video lottery terminals in the county as provided by this act. If a majority of the votes cast and counted at an election under this section is against placement of video lottery terminals in the county, the executive director shall not enter into video lottery terminal management contracts for placement of video lottery terminals in the county. The county election officer shall transmit a copy of the certification of the results of the election to the executive director.
 - (5) The election provided for by this section shall be conducted, and

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the votes counted and canvassed, in the manner provided by law for question submitted elections of the county.

- (c) The lottery commission may place video lottery terminals in a county where the commission finds that after March 1, 2005, the county has held an advisory election of qualified voters pursuant to the county's home rule authority if the commission determines that the ballot question was in substantial compliance with the requirements of subsection (b)(3) and the election was administered by the county election officer in a manner consistent with the requirements of state election law.
- (d) The question of the placement of video lottery terminals in a county may be submitted at the same election as the question of operation of lottery gaming facilities in the county under section 5, and amendments thereto.
- New Sec. 27. (a) In accordance with rules and regulations adopted by the commission, the executive director shall have general responsibility for the implementation and administration of the provisions of this act relating to video lottery, including, without limitation, the responsibility to:
- (1) Establish a statewide video lottery terminal network in accordance with the provisions of this act;
- review and determine promptly and in reasonable order all certificate applications or proceedings for suspension or revocation of certificates;
- (3) perform all duties required of the executive director under the provisions of this act relating to video lottery;
- (4) collect all fees imposed pursuant to sections 25 through 35, and amendments thereto;
- (5) certify net video lottery terminal income by inspecting records, conducting audits, having agents of the Kansas lottery on site or by any other reasonable means;
- (6) assist the commission in the promulgation of rules and regulations concerning the operation of a statewide video lottery terminal network, which rules and regulations shall include, without limitation, the following:
- (A) The denomination of all bills, coins, tokens or other media needed to play video lottery terminals;
- (B) payout from video lottery terminals, provided that such payouts shall not be less than 87% of the amount wagered over the life of the video lottery terminal;
- (C) a certification requirement and enforcement procedure for officers, directors, board members and key employees, specified by the executive director, of video lottery parimutuel sales agents, which certification requirement shall include compliance with such security, fitness

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- and background standards as the executive director may deem necessary relating to competence, honesty and integrity, such that a person's reputation, habits and associations do not pose a threat to the public interest of the state or to the reputation of or effective regulation and control of the video lottery; it being specifically understood that any person convicted of any felony, a crime involving gambling or a crime of moral turpitude within 10 years prior to applying for a certificate as such sales agent or at any time thereafter shall be deemed unfit. The Kansas lottery shall conduct the security, fitness and background checks required pursuant to such rules and regulations;
- (D) a certification requirement and enforcement procedure for those persons or entities, including video lottery terminal manufacturers and the central video lottery terminal computer system providers, who propose to contract with a video lottery parimutuel sales agent or the state for the provision of goods or services related to the video lottery, including management services, which certification requirements shall include compliance with such security, fitness and background standards of officers, directors, key employees specified by the executive director and persons who own, directly or indirectly, 5% or more of such entity, as the executive director may deem necessary relating to competence, honesty and integrity, such that a person's reputation, habits and associations do not pose a threat to the public interest of the state or to the reputation of or effective regulation and control of the video lottery; it being specifically understood that any person convicted of any felony, a crime involving gambling or a crime of moral turpitude within 10 years prior to applying for a certificate hereunder or at any time thereafter shall be deemed unfit. The executive director may determine whether the certification standards of another state are comprehensive, thorough, and provide similar adequate safeguards and, if so, may in the executive director's discretion certify an applicant already certified in such state without the necessity of a full application and background check. The Kansas lottery shall conduct the security, fitness and background checks required under this rule and regulation;
- (E) the number of video lottery terminals permitted in each parimutuel licensee location, subject to the following: The total number of video lottery terminals shall not exceed 2,000 at a parimutuel licensee location in Wvandotte county; 1,500 at a parimutuel licensee location in Sedgwick county; 1,500 at a parimutuel licensee location in Crawford county; and an aggregate of 500 at parimutuel licensee locations in Greenwood and Harper counties;
- standards for advertising, marketing and promotional materials used by video lottery parimutuel sales agents;
 - (G) the registration, kind, type, number and location of video lottery

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terminals at any parimutuel licensee location;

- (H) the on-site security arrangements for the video lottery terminals;
- rules and regulations and procedures for the accounting and reporting of the payments required from video lottery parimutuel sales agents under section 19, and amendments thereto, including the calculations required for such payments;
- (J) requiring the reporting of information about any video lottery parimutuel sales agent, its employees, vendors and finances necessary or desirable to ensure the security of the video lottery system. None of the information disclosed pursuant to this subsection shall be subject to disclosure under the Kansas open records act; and
- (K) the reporting and auditing of financial information of video lottery parimutuel sales agents, including, but not limited to, the reporting of profits or losses incurred by video lottery parimutuel sales agents and the reporting of such other information as the executive director may require to determine compliance with the Kansas expanded lottery act and the rules and regulations adopted hereunder. None of the information disclosed pursuant to this subsection shall be subject to disclosure under the Kansas open records act.
- (b) In addition to any other powers granted pursuant to the Kansas lottery act or the Kansas expanded lottery act, the executive director shall have the power to:
- (1) Examine, or cause to be examined by any agent or representative designated by the executive director, any books, papers, records or memoranda of any video lottery parimutuel sales agent, or of any business involved in video lottery terminals or video lottery games authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act, for the purpose of ascertaining compliance with any provision of the Kansas lottery act or the Kansas expanded lottery act, or any rules and regulations adopted thereunder;
- (2) investigate alleged violations of the Kansas lottery act and alleged violations of any rules and regulations, orders and final decisions of the commission or the executive director;
- (3) request a court to issue subpoenas to compel access to or for the production of any books, papers, records or memoranda in the custody or control of any video lottery parimutuel sales agent related to the management or operation of video lottery terminals, or to compel the appearance of any video lottery parimutuel sales agent for the purpose of ascertaining compliance with the provisions of the Kansas lottery act and the Kansas expanded lottery act, and rules and regulations adopted thereunder;
- (4) inspect and approve, prior to publication or distribution, all advertising by a video lottery parimutuel sales agent which includes any reference to the Kansas lottery; and

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- (5) take any other action as may be reasonable or appropriate to enforce the provisions of the Kansas expanded lottery act and any rules and regulations, orders and final decisions of the executive director or the commission.
- (c) Appropriate security measures shall be required in any and all areas where video lottery terminals authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act are located or operated. The executive director shall approve all such security measures.
- (d) The executive director shall require an annual audit of the video lottery terminal operations of each video lottery parimutuel sales agent. Such audit shall be conducted by a licensed accounting firm approved by the executive director. Such audit shall be conducted at the expense of the lottery.
- (e) None of the information disclosed pursuant to subsection (b) or(d) shall be subject to disclosure under the Kansas open records act.
- (f) The Kansas lottery shall operate the video lottery terminal network through the central video lottery terminal computer system. The central video lottery terminal computer system shall be capable of auditing the operation, financial data and program information of the video lottery terminal network. All equipment or devices required for operation of the central video lottery terminal computer system shall be included in any contract made for the purpose of providing or operating such system.
- (g) The central video lottery terminal computer system shall be used for the operation of the video lottery terminal network and shall incorporate electronic fund transfer procedures to facilitate the collection of revenue, be capable of disabling any video lottery terminal from play, and be capable of communicating with all video lottery terminals approved by the Kansas lottery. The central video lottery terminal computer system provider shall provide certified manufacturers with the protocol documentation and the audit information and controls necessary to enable the manufacturers' video lottery terminals to communicate with the Kansas lottery's central video lottery terminal computer system. The central video lottery terminal computer system shall not limit participation to only one manufacturer of video lottery terminals or video lottery terminal associated equipment.
- (h) The executive director may remove from play and confiscate any video lottery terminal or gray machine that does not comply with the requirements of the Kansas expanded lottery act. Any video lottery terminal that the executive director determines has been modified or the design of which has been modified without the consent of the executive director may be removed from play, confiscated by the executive director and disposed of in any manner allowed by law.
 - (i) With regard to minutes and records of the commission:

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- (1) The Kansas lottery shall keep and maintain a list of all applicants for certification under the Kansas expanded lottery act, together with a record of all actions taken with respect to such applicants. A file and record of the Kansas lottery's actions shall be open to public inspection pursuant to the Kansas open records act, but the information regarding any applicant whose certificate has been denied, revoked or not renewed shall be removed from such list five years after the date certification was denied, revoked or not renewed.
- (2) All information and data required by the Kansas lottery to be furnished to it, or which may otherwise be obtained, relative to the finances, earnings or revenue, except the net video lottery terminal income, of any vendor shall be considered confidential and shall not be revealed in whole or in part without permission of the vendor, except in the course of the necessary administration of the Kansas expanded lottery act, or upon the lawful order of a court of competent jurisdiction, or with the approval of the attorney general, to a duly authorized law enforcement agency.
- (3) All information and data pertaining to an applicant's criminal record, family and background furnished to or obtained by the Kansas lottery from any source shall be considered confidential and shall not be revealed, in whole or part. Such information shall be released upon the lawful order of a court of competent jurisdiction or, with the approval of the attorney general, to a duly authorized law enforcement agency.
- (4) Notice of the contents of any information released, except to a duly authorized law enforcement agency pursuant to subsection (f), shall be given to any applicant, certificate holder or vendor in a manner prescribed by the rules and regulations adopted by the commission.
- New Sec. 28. (a) The executive director may issue, suspend, revoke and renew certificates for video lottery terminal manufacturers, video lottery terminals or video lottery parimutuel sales agents pursuant to rules and regulations adopted by the commission.
- (b) Any individual, firm. corporation or other legal entity seeking to obtain a certificate pursuant to rules and regulations adopted by the commission shall apply to the executive director for such certificate on forms provided by the executive director.
- (c) The executive director shall notify an applicant who is found, for any reason, to be unfit for certification, of the specific reasons therefor which constitute the basis for the finding.
- (d) No certificate issued pursuant to this section shall be assignable or transferable.
- (e) The executive director may examine any or all accounts, bank accounts, financial statements and records of the vendor in a vendor's possession or under its control in which it has an interest and the vendor

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- New Sec. 30. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b):
- (1) No video lottery terminals shall be operated at a parimutuel licensee location in Sedgwick county unless, during the first full calendar year and each year thereafter in which video lottery terminals are operated at such location, the parimutuel licensee conducts at such location at least 100 live greyhound races each calendar week for the number of weeks raced during calendar year 2003 with at least 13 live races conducted each day for not less than five days per week.
- (2) No video lottery terminals shall be operated at a parimutuel licensee location in Wyandotte county unless, during the first full calendar year and each year thereafter in which video lottery terminals are operated at such location, the parimutuel licensee conducts live horse racing programs for at least 60 days, with at least 10 live races conducted each program, and must offer and make a reasonable effort to conduct a minimum number of three live races restricted for quarter horses each day and seven live thoroughbred races each day, of which not less than two races each day shall be limited to registered Kansas-bred horses apportioned in the same ratio that live races are offered, except that the licensee shall not be required to conduct the second live race restricted to Kansasbred horses unless there are at least seven qualified entries for such race, and with at least 100 live greyhound races each calendar week for at least the same number of weeks raced during 2003, with at least 13 live races conducted each day for not less than five days per week.
- (3) No video lottery terminals shall be operated at a parimutuel licensee location in Crawford county unless, during the first full calendar year and each year thereafter in which video lottery terminals are operated at such location, the parimutuel licensee conducts at such location at least 85 live greyhound races each calendar week for the number of weeks raced during calendar year 2003 in Sedgwick county with at least 12 live races conducted each day for not less than five days per week.
- (4) If a parimutuel licensee has not held live races pursuant to a schedule approved by the Kansas racing and gaming commission in the preceding 12 months, the Kansas racing and gaming commission shall hold a hearing to determine the number of days of live racing required for the remaining days of the first calendar year of operation to qualify for operation of video lottery terminals. At such hearing, the commission shall receive testimony and evidence from affected breed groups, the licensee and others, as the Kansas racing and gaming commission deems appropriate concerning the schedule of live race days. The operation of video lottery terminals shall not commence more than 90 days prior to the start of live racing at such facility.
- (5) No video lottery terminals shall be operated at a parimutuel licensee location in Greenwood county at Eureka Downs unless, during

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the first full calendar year and each year thereafter in which video lottery terminals are operated, the parimutuel licensee conducts at least days of live horse racing.

- (6) No video lottery terminals shall be operated at a parimutuel licensee location in Harper county at Anthony Downs unless, during the first full calendar year and each year thereafter in which video lottery terminals are operated, the parimutuel licensee conducts at least to days of live horse racing.
- (7) The Greenwood County Fair Association and Anthony Fair Association shall qualify as fair associations pursuant to the provisions of this section and shall be required to comply with all provisions of K.S.A. 74-8814, and amendments thereto.
- (b) The Kansas racing and gaming commission may not grant exceptions to the requirements of subsection (a) for a parimutuel licensee conducting live racing unless such exception is in the form of an agreement which: (1) Is between the parimutuel licensee and the affected recognized greyhound or recognized horsemen's group, as defined in K.S.A. 74-8802, and amendments thereto; (2) has been approved by the appropriate official breed registering agencies; and (3) has been submitted to and approved by the commission. In the case of emergencies, weather related issues or immediate circumstances beyond the control of the licensee, the Kansas racing and gaming commission may grant an exception.
- (c) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsections (a) and (b) of K.S.A. 74-8836, and amendments thereto, the Kansas racing and gaming commission shall authorize simulcasting on any day the operation of video lottery terminals is authorized at the race track facility at Eureka Downs and the race track facility at Anthony Downs. Rules and regulations of the Kansas racing and gaming commission shall provide that the video lottery terminals shall not be operated at Eureka Downs or Anthony Downs on days when simulcasting signals are not available at the track.
- New Sec. 31. (a) Video lottery terminals shall not be offered for use or play in this state unless approved by the Kansas lottery. Video lottery terminals may only offer video lottery games authorized by the Kansas lottery.
 - (b) Video lottery terminals approved for use or play in this state shall:
- Be incapable of manipulation to effect the random probability of winning plays;
- (2) have one or more mechanisms that accept coins, tokens or other media approved by the Kansas lottery in exchange for game credits and a voucher evidencing said credits, or if approved by the Kansas lottery be capable of paying cash directly to the player, and such mechanisms shall be designed to prevent players from obtaining credits or cash by means of physical tampering;

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- (3) be capable of suspending play as a result of physical tampering until reset at the direction of the executive director or the executive director's designee;
- (4) be linked directly to a central lottery communications system to provide auditing and other program information as approved by the Kansas lottery and specified in the video lottery terminal management contract; and
- (5) be on-line and in constant communication with a central computer located at a location determined by the executive director pursuant to the video lottery terminal management contract.

New Sec. 32. (a) No person who has held an interest in or has been employed by a parimutuel licensee or a video lottery parimutuel sales agent shall be employed by the Kansas lottery for two years after the expiration of such interest or employment.

- (b) No person who holds an interest in or is employed by the video lottery terminal manufacturer's vendor shall be employed by the Kansas lottery.
- (c) No employee of the Kansas lottery shall play a video lottery terminal unless specifically authorized by the executive director or the executive director's designee for purposes of testing, auditing or other security reasons.
- (d) No person who was employed by the Kansas lottery shall hold an interest in or be employed by a parimutuel licensee, a video lottery terminal manufacturer's vendor or the central system provider for a period of two years after the termination of employment with the Kansas lottery.

New Sec. 33. (a) Net video lottery terminal income shall be distributed as follows:

- (1) To the video lottery parimutuel sales agent, an amount equal to:
 (A) 25% of net video lottery terminal income as a management fee and net lease for facilities used for the operation of video lottery terminals at the parimutuel licensee location; plus (B) expenses of the video lottery parimutuel sales agent as provided in the video lottery terminal management contract, except that such expenses shall not include any payment for lease of facilities;
- (2) 7% of net video lottery terminal income shall be credited to the live horse racing purse supplement fund established by section 38, and amendments thereto;
- (3) 7% of net video lottery terminal income shall be credited to the live greyhound racing purse supplement fund established by section 38, and amendments thereto;
- (4) 1.5% of net video lottery terminal income shall be remitted to the county and 1.5% of net video lottery terminal income shall be remitted to the city, if any, where the parimutuel licensee location is located;

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- (5) 0.5% of net video lottery terminal income shall be credited to the problem gambling grant fund established by K.S.A. 79-4805, and amendments thereto;
- (6) amounts determined pursuant to the video lottery terminal management contract for direct expenses of the Kansas lottery attributable to implementation, administration and enforcement of the provisions of sections 24 through 46, and amendments thereto, and implementation, oversight and monitoring of video lottery pursuant to the provisions of such sections shall be credited to the video lottery oversight fund established by section 37, and amendments thereto; and
- (7) an amount determined by an agreement which is entered into by the video lottery parimutuel sales agent and the organization licensee at the parimutuel licensee location and which has been approved by the executive director.
- (b) A video lottery terminal management contract shall establish an accelerated video lottery net payment of \$15,000 per video lottery terminal installed at a parimutuel licensee location. Such payment shall be due and payable to the state treasurer on May 31, 2006, except that a video lottery parimutual sales agent may deduct from such payment the amount of the state's share of net video lottery terminal income paid to the state treasurer before that date. The balance due the state on that date, if any shall be recovered by the video lottery parimutual sales agent pursuant to the terms of the video lottery terminal management contract.

New Sec. 34. The Kansas lottery commission, upon the recommendation of the executive director, shall adopt rules and regulations necessary to carry out the purposes of this act. Temporary rules and regulations may be adopted by the commission without being subject to the provisions and requirements of K.S.A. 77-415 through 77-438, and amendments thereto, but shall be subject to approval by the attorney general as to legality and shall be filed with the secretary of state and published in the Kansas register.

New Sec. 35. (a) All video lottery terminals shall be leased or owned by the Kansas lottery or by an authorized video lottery parimutuel sales agent on behalf of the Kansas lottery pursuant to the terms of a video lottery terminal management contract and shall be obtained from video lottery terminal manufacturers certified pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act and the rules and regulations adopted by the commission.

(b) The executive director shall contract with an independent laboratory to test video lottery terminals and associated equipment on a periodic basis to ensure that the terminals and equipment comply with the requirements of the Kansas expanded lottery act and any other applicable standards and rules and regulations. The video lottery terminal manufacturer providing such terminals and equipment shall pay all costs associ-

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- (c) Each video lottery parimutuel sales agent shall hold the executive director, the commission, and this state harmless from and defend and pay for the defense of any and all claims which may be asserted against the executive director, the commission, the state or the employees thereof, arising from the participation in the video lottery system; specifically excluding, however, any claims arising from the negligence or willful misconduct of the executive director, the commission, the state or the employees thereof.
- (d) Each video lottery parimutuel sales agent shall provide access to all records of the video lottery parimutuel sales agent and the physical premises of the locations where the video lottery activities are conducted for the purpose of monitoring and inspecting the activities of the video lottery parimutuel sales agent and video lottery games, video lottery terminals and associated equipment.

New Sec. 36. (a) There is hereby established in the state treasury the video lottery revenues fund. Separate accounts shall be maintained in such fund for receipt of moneys from each video lottery parimutuel sales agent. All expenditures from the fund shall be made in accordance with appropriation acts upon warrants of the director of accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouchers approved by the executive director for the purposes set forth in this act.

- (b) All net video lottery terminal income shall be paid daily and electronically to the executive director. The executive director shall remit all moneys received therefrom to the state treasurer in accordance with K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto. Upon receipt of the remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state treasury and credit it to the respective account maintained for the video lottery parimutual sales agent in the video lottery revenues fund.
- (c) The executive director shall certify weekly to the director of accounts and reports the percentages or amounts to be transferred from each account maintained in the video lottery revenues fund to the video lottery oversight fund, the live horse racing supplement fund, the live greyhound racing purse supplement fund and the problem gambling grant fund, as provided by section 33, and amendments thereto. Upon receipt of the certification, the director of accounts and reports shall transfer amounts from each such account in accordance with the certification of the executive director. Once each week, the executive director shall cause amounts from each such account to be paid to cities, counties and video lottery parimutuel sales agents in accordance with section 33, and amendments thereto.
- (d) Amounts remaining in the video lottery revenues fund after transfers and payments pursuant to subsection (c) shall be transferred to the

New Sec. 37. (a) There is hereby created in the state treasury the video lottery oversight fund.

- (b) Moneys in the video lottery oversight fund shall be expended to pay for the expenses of the Kansas lottery attributable to implementation, administration and enforcement of the provisions of sections 24 through 46, and amendments thereto, and implementation, oversight and monitoring of operations of video lottery parimutuel sales agents pursuant to such sections.

New Sec. 38. (a) (1) There is hereby established in the state treasury the live horse racing purse supplement fund.

(2) Twenty-five percent of all moneys credited to the live horse racing purse supplement fund shall be transferred to the Kansas horse breeding development fund created pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8829, and amendments thereto. Two percent of the moneys credited to the live horse racing purse supplement fund shall be distributed to the official registering agency designated pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8830, and amendments thereto, to be used for horse registration, administration, development, representation and promotion of the Kansas horse racing and breeding industries. A complete financial accounting for the use of the funds received pursuant to this subsection shall be provided annually to the Kansas racing and gaming commission. Fifty percent of the moneys credited to the Kansas horse breeding development fund pursuant to this section shall be used as purse supplements for registered Kansas-bred foals and distributed based upon recommendation from the official horse breed registering agency and approval of the Kansas racing and gaming commission. The balance of funds credited to the Kansas horse breeding development fund pursuant to this section shall be used as breed awards for registered Kansas-bred broodmares and stallions. The Kansas racing and gaming commission shall distribute such moneys credited to the Kansas horse breededucation opportunity fund established pursuant to section 39

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ing development fund in accordance with K.S.A. 74-9829, and amendments thereto.

- (3) Based on the contribution to the Kansas horse racing and breeding industries in Kansas, the balance in the live horse race purse supplement fund shall be distributed in accordance with rules and regulations adopted by the Kansas racing and gaming commission with recommendations by the official registering agency designated pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8930, and amendments thereto.
- (b) There is hereby established in the state treasury the live greyhound racing purse supplement fund. Moneys available in such fund shall be paid to the parimutuel licensees for distribution as purse supplements in accordance with rules and regulations of the Kansas racing and gaming commission. Such rules and regulations shall provide that 25% of the total amount credited to such fund shall be transferred to the credit of the greyhound breeding development fund, created pursuant to K.S.A. 74-\$831, and amendments thereto. Funds transferred into the greyhound breeding development fund pursuant to this section shall be used to supplement special stake races and enhance the amount per point paid to the owners of Kansas-whelped greyhounds which win live races at Kansas greyhound tracks in accordance with Kansas racing and gaming commission rules and regulations. Upon the recommendation of the official grevhound breed registry, the Kansas racing and gaming commission may transfer funds from the Kansas greyhound breed development fund to the live greyhound racing purse supplement fund.
- (c) All purse supplements paid pursuant to this act shall be according to the point schedule in effect on January 1, 2003, at the respective parimutuel licensee locations. All purse supplements paid pursuant to this section shall be in addition to purses and supplements paid under K.S.A. 74-8801 et seq., and amendments thereto.
- New Sec. 39. (a) Wagers shall be received only from a person at the location where the video lottery game is authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act. No person present at such location shall place or attempt to place a wager on behalf of another person who is not present at such location.
- (b) No employee or contractor of a video lottery parimutuel sales agent shall loan money to or otherwise extend credit to patrons of the parimutuel licensee.
- (c) Violation of this section is a class A nonperson misdemeanor upon
 a conviction for a first offense. Violation of this section is a severity level
 9, nonperson felony upon conviction for a second or subsequent offense.

New Sec. 40. (a) A person less than 21 years of age shall not be permitted in in area where video lottery games are being conducted, except for a person at least 18 years of age who is an employee of the New Sec. 39. (a) There is hereby established int the state treasury the Kansas education opportunity fund. Amounts deposited in such fund shall be expended solely for the purpose of supplementing the state's obligation to fund preschool, kindergarten, elementary and postsecondary education programs. Expenditures from the Kansas education opportunity fund shall be made pursuant to appropriations acts.

(b) Such funding shall be supplemental to, and not in lieu of, any state revenues in existence as of the effective date of this act used to fund educational programs.

(c) Unless the payment or transfer has been authorized pursuant to a separate appropriations act which has been approved by 213 vote of the members of the house of representative and 213 vote of the members of the senate, the state treasurer shall not make transfers or payments pursuant to an appropriation for any purpose other than supplementing the funding of education programs as described in subsection (a). Such payment or transfer shall be made only upon certification of the governor that such payment meets the requirements of this section.

- (b) No person under age 21 shall play or make a wager on a video lottery game.
- New Sec. 41. (a) Except as when authorized in accordance with subsection (c), it is unlawful for any video lottery parimutuel sales agent, or any employee or agent thereof, to allow any person to play video lottery games pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act, or share in winnings of such person, knowing such person to be:
 - (1) Less than 21 years of age;
- (2) the executive director, a member of the commission or an employee of the Kansas lottery;
- (3) an officer or employee of a vendor contracting with the Kansas lottery to supply gaming equipment or tickets to the Kansas lottery for use in the operation of any lottery conducted pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act;
- (4) a spouse, child, stepchild, brother, stepbrother, sister, stepsister, parent or stepparent of a person described by subsection (a)(2) or (a)(3); or
- (5) a person who resides in the same household as any person described by subsection (a)(2) or (a)(3).
- (b) Violation of subsection (a) is a class A nonperson misdemeanor upon conviction for a first offense. Violation of subsection (a) is a severity level 9, nonperson felony upon conviction for a second or subsequent offense.
- (c) The executive director may authorize in writing any employee of the Kansas lottery and any employee of a lottery vendor to play a video lottery game to verify the proper operation thereof with respect to security and contract compliance. Any prize awarded as a result of such ticket purchase shall become the property of the Kansas lottery and be added to the prize pools of subsequent video lottery games. No money or merchandise shall be awarded to any employee playing a video lottery game pursuant to this subsection.
- New Sec. 42. Except for persons acting in accordance with rules and regulations of the Kansas lottery in performing installation, maintenance and repair services, any person who, with the intent to manipulate the outcome, pay out or operation of a video lottery game, manipulates by physical, electrical or mechanical means the outcome, pay out or operation of such game shall be guilty of a severity level 8, nonperson felony.
- New Sec. 43. (a) It is a class A nonperson misdemeanor for the executive director, any member of the lottery commission or any employee of the Kansas lottery knowingly to:
 - (1) Participate in the operation of or have a financial interest in any

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business of a video lottery parimutuel sales agent or in any business which sells goods or services to a video lottery parimutuel sales agent;

- (2) participate directly or indirectly as an owner, operator, manager or consultant in electronic or other gaming operated pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act;
- (3) while in Kansas place a wager on or bet or play a video lottery game;
- (4) accept any compensation, gift, loan, entertainment, favor or service from any video lottery parimutuel sales agent except such suitable facilities and services within a parimutuel licensee location as may be required to facilitate the performance of the executive director's, member's or employee's official duties; or
- (5) enter into any business dealing, venture or contract with a video lottery parimutuel sales agent.
- (b) It is a severity level S, nonperson felony for any person playing or using any electronic gaming machine or video lottery terminal in Kansas knowingly to:
- (1) Use other than a lawful coin or legal tender of the United States of America, or to use coin not of the same denomination as the coin intended to be used in an electronic gaming machine or video lottery terminal, except that in the playing of any electronic gaming machine, video lottery terminal or similar gaming device, it shall be lawful for any person to use gaming billets, tokens or similar objects therein which are approved by the Kansas lottery;
- (2) possess or use, while on premises where video lottery games are authorized pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act, any cheating or thieving device, including, but not limited to, tools, wires, drills, coins attached to strings or wires or electronic or magnetic devices to facilitate removing from any electronic gaming machine or video lottery terminal any money or contents thereof, except that a duly authorized agent or employee of the Kansas lottery or video lottery parimutuel sales agent may possess and use any of the foregoing only in furtherance of the agent's or employee's employment at the parimutuel licensee location; or
- (3) possess or use while on the premises of any video lottery parimutuel sales agent any key or device designed for the purpose of or suitable for opening or entering any video lottery terminal or similar gaming device or drop box, except that a duly authorized agent or employee of the Kansas lottery or video lottery parimutuel sales agent may possess and use any of the foregoing only in furtherance of the agent's or employee's employment at the parimutuel licensee location.
- New Sec. 44. It shall be a severity level 9, nonperson felony for any individual, firm, corporation or other legal entity to place in operation or continue to have in place any gray machine for use by members of the

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public at any location in this state.

New Sec. 45. Each person subject to a background check pursuant to the Kansas expanded lottery act shall be subject to a state and national criminal history records check which conforms to applicable federal standards for the purpose of verifying the identity of the applicant and whether the person has been convicted of any crime that would disqualify the person from engaging in activities pursuant to this act. The executive director is authorized to use the information obtained from the national criminal history record check to determine the person's eligibility to engage in such activities.

New Sec. 46. (a) No taxes, fees, charges, transfers or distributions, other than those provided for in the Kansas expanded lottery act, shall be made or levied by any city, county or other municipality from or against net video lottery revenue.

- (b) All sales of games on video lottery terminals authorized by the Kansas expanded lottery act shall be exempt from sales taxes imposed pursuant to K.S.A. 12-187 et seq., and 79-3601 et seq., and amendments thereto.
- Sec. 47. K.S.A. 74-8705 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-8705. (a) Major procurement contracts shall be awarded in accordance with K.S.A. 75-3738 through 75-3744, and amendments thereto, or subsection (b), as determined by the *executive* director, except that:

Such procurements shall be open and competitive and shall consider relevant factors, including security, competence, experience,

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timely performance and maximization of net revenues to the state. If a procurement negotiating committee is utilized, the provisions of K.S.A. 75-3738 through 75-3744, and amendments thereto, shall not apply. Meetings conducted by the procurement negotiating committee shall be exempt from the provisions of the Kansas open meeting act, K.S.A. 75-4317 through 75-4320a, and amendments thereto.

(c) Before a major procurement contract is awarded, the executive director shall conduct a background investigation of: (1) The vendor to whom the contract is to be awarded; (2) all officers and directors of such vendor; (3) all persons who own a 5% or more interest in such vendor; (4) all persons who own a controlling interest in such vendor; and (5) any subsidiary or other business in which such vendor owns a controlling interest. The vendor shall submit appropriate investigation authorizations to facilitate such investigation. The executive director may require, in accordance with rules and regulations of the commission, that a vendor submit any additional information considered appropriate to preserve the integrity and security of the lottery. In addition, the executive director may conduct a background investigation of any person having a beneficial interest in a vendor. The secretary of revenue, securities commissioner, attorney general and director of the Kansas bureau of investigation shall assist in any investigation pursuant to this subsection upon request of the executive director. Whenever the secretary of revenue, securities commissioner, attorney general or director of the Kansas bureau of investigation assists in such an investigation and incurs costs in addition to those attributable to the operations of the office or bureau, such additional costs shall be paid by the Kansas lottery. The furnishing of assistance in such an investigation shall be a transaction between the Kansas lottery and the respective officer and shall be settled in accordance with K.S.A. 75-5516, and amendments thereto.

Upon the request of the chairperson, the Kansas bureau of investigation and other criminal justice agencies shall provide to the chairperson all background investigation information including criminal history record information, arrest and nonconviction data, criminal intelligence information and information relating to criminal and background investigations of a vendor to whom a major procurement contract is to be awarded. Such information, other than conviction data, shall be confidential and shall not be disclosed, except as provided in this section. In addition to any other penalty provided by law, disclosure of such information shall be grounds for removal from office or termination of employment.

- (d) All major procurement contracts shall be subject to approval of the commission.
- (e) (1) Except as provided by paragraph (2), the executive director shall not agree to any renewal or extension of a major procurement con-

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tract unless such extension or renewal is awarded in the manner provided by this section.

Testimony on House Bill 2338

Senate Ways and Means Committee

March 30, 2005

Thank you Mr. Chairman for the opportunity to discuss The World War II Veterans History Project.

Periodically we here stories of leaders using the lessons of history to guide their decisions. Nearly always they report the lessons were of tremendous benefit in making correct decisions in difficult circumstances. Likewise, we understand that properly recording and understanding our history helps us pass traditions and values on to our children and grandchildren.

House Bill 2338 presents an effort to record the experiences and systematically archive the stories of WWII veterans. The bill uses competition to help surface the best proposals to get this accomplished. In my view the best proposals will bring the most private resources to leverage our own. Perhaps most importantly, the best proposals will be the most innovative at getting local groups, such as boy scout troops, to actively seek out veterans and record their experiences.

We must do more than just record the experiences. We must archive the information to allow historians to access the records for future research. Memorabilia, photographs, and other records should also be documented to allow researchers to easily find the items in the future.

I believe that House Bill 2338 presents a solid approach to recording important experiences of some of the people Tom Brokaw referred to as "The Greatest Generation." Most importantly, it creates a mechanism to involve leaders and volunteers at the community level.

The grants would be rewarded on a competitive basis for FY 2006 and FY2007, based on guidelines and criteria included in HB 2338, as well as criteria developed by the Executive Director of the Kansas State Historical Society. This bill appropriates \$10,000 from the State General Fund for Administrative Expenses and \$150,000 from State General Fund for the Grant awards in FY 2006.

I would like to thank Minority Leader Dennis McKinney for letting me participate in this worthy cause. It was his idea and he should be commended for his efforts.

Testimony Before the Senate Ways and Means Committee

Regarding HB 2338, An Act authorizing a competitive grant program for recording experiences of veterans of World War II

Jennie Chinn, Kansas State Historical Society March 30, 2005

Thank you for the opportunity to speak about HB 2338. This bill will establish a program to record, collect, and preserve the experiences of Kansas' World War II veterans. World War II was a transformative event in the history of our country and state. The United States emerged from the war a world leader. Kansas' economy was forever altered by the war with new industries providing balance to its agricultural base. The war itself had a deep personal impact on Kansans - for those who served in the armed forces and those who supported the war effort on the homefront.

While the Kansas State Historical Society maintains a collection of documentary materials related to WWII, thousands of Kansas' WWII veterans are not represented in our holdings. This bill will foster the collection of a wide range of materials related to the WWII experience - letters, diaries, photographs - as well as capture the personal stories of Kansas' veterans through oral history interviews. Oral history is especially important for gathering the stories of soldiers who did not record their experiences in writing. Without oral interviews, these often poignant and insightful stories will be lost forever to future generations. Approximately 1,000 World War II veterans are passing away each day across the country; thus, it is critical to document the experiences of these veterans as soon as possible.

The Kansas State Historical Society is committed to preserving and making available to the public the materials collected during this project. Many of the stories collected from Kansas veterans will be made available to a worldwide audience on the Internet. These stories will be used by a wide variety of audiences, from researchers to schoolchildren.

The Kansas State Historical Society enthusiastically supports this bill as long as the appropriations come with the program. We would be unable to carry out the project within existing agency funds.

In conclusion, Kansas' World War II veterans deserve to have their stories recorded, preserved, and made available to provide evidence of their sacrifices for our country.

TESTIMONY OF E.L. (TOM) FARR, VFW DISTRICT 1 COMMANDER

It is a pleasure and a privilege to be asked to give testimony in favor of House Bill 2338. It is time to get Kansas Veterans of World War II to get their stories printed for the next generation.

I was drafted in December 1942, discharged at Camp Chaffee on January 10, 1946. My service was in Kansas, Colorado, Florida, New Jersey, New York, and Arkansas. My 2 and one half years tour of duty took me to Scotland, England, France, and Germany.

Some of the highlights of my Air Corps service were:

Going overseas on the Queen Elizabeth. We shipped out of New York harbor in broad daylight. It took approximately as long to load and unload the ship as to sail across the ocean. The Queen took a zig-zag trail to outwit the German subs. The German Propaganda listed us as sunk the second day out. No problems. The small Air Corps personnel did not have to leave their state rooms. Other military personnel spent 12 hours in the state room and 12 hours on deck. We had two meals a day as the Queen was carrying a double load.

Our headquarters in England had a jeep, two staff cars, and occasionally a fourth vehicle.

Ten of the 12 boys in my 1940 graduating class went to military service. Today only four of us are still living.

I feel very fortunate to have no war injuries.

The closest shave I had was during the buzz-bom attacks. We had returned to London and were eating breakfast in Kensington Station when they hit the track we came in on.

I feel fortunate as I toured Warton Castle, Windsor Castle, and Stone Henge. We also had the judges stand on our property at Henley-on-Thames, when we had the boat race between Cambridge and Oxford.

My last assignment was platoon sergeant over 250 men, who were army of occupation for the Air Force. This was at Furstenfeldbruck, Germany. We were billeted in the SS troopers dormitory. You could walk inside for a whole. Nice marble floors, which required almost daily mopping.

HOUSE BILL No. 2338 TESTIMONY

On behalf of The American Legion Department of Kansas I wish to thank you for the opportunity to present written testimony in support of House Bill 2338. I would also like to thank the sponsors of HB 2338 for stepping forward to preserve a vital and valuable part of Kansas history.

Kansas' roll during World War II was unique in many aspects and vital to our nation's victory. Our citizens contributed to the war effort by the thousands and in hundreds of ways but perhaps most importantly, are the stories of those who volunteered for or were drafted into military service. Their experiences in and out of combat directly impacted the rest of their lives and in a very large sense shaped who and what we are today.

That is; veterans of the Second World War were themselves unique compared to their counterparts of other wars before or since. Having lived through the depression of the 1930's they were suddenly thus into the forefront of a life and death struggle against tyranny. They became "the Greatest Generation" as Tom Brokaw labeled them because they seized the opportunity to preserve freedom and democracy. After the war, thanks to the G.I. Bill of Rights written by fellow Kansan Harry Colmery, most seized the opportunity to enroll in college, buy homes, start businesses, and raise families, all of which raised the American standard of living to heights never before imagined.

During the past decade several school Districts in Kansas have conducted studies of World War II including requiring students to interview area veterans. Those studies have proven to be invaluable lessons for students who often learned previously unknown details about their grandparents and other family members. Unfortunately those studies have been confined to relatively small groups and the information gained, if preserved at all, has been kept locally. HB 2338 presents the opportunity for the State Historical Society to gather a statewide cross section of Kansas' World War II veterans' experiences that will be preserved in the manner it deserves.

The Preamble to the National Constitution of the Sons of The American Legion begins with the phrase, "Proud possessors of a priceless heritage." World War II veterans are our priceless heritage and we must preserve their stories and experiences before it is too late. Therefore I urge your support of HB 2338.

Testimony to Senate Ways and Means Committee House Bill 2338 Presented by Jim Bertoglio

Honorable members of the Senate Ways and Means committee my name is Jim Bertoglio and I am a resident of Medicine Lodge, Kansas. I am glad to be here in fact at my age I am glad to be anywhere.

I am honored to speak on the behalf of House Bill 2338 which will provide some much needed funds to record an event which has shaped the World we live in today.

During World War II, I was Sergeant Bertoglio and was documentary photographer in the 94th Fighter Squadron stationed in Italy 1944-45. The 94th Fighter Squadron was know as the "Hat in the Ring" gang. This is the fighter squadron made famous in World War I by Captain Eddie Rickenbacker.

With me today is a small portfolio of photographs to illustrate a day in the life of a squadron. I could have used hundreds of photographs but chose these photos which have been displayed by Wichita State University and Litwin Galleries..

However, my collection is just a small glimpse of all the activities that went into the effort to defeat Nazism and fascism. At the height of the war, there were over 5,000,000 soldiers on any one day doing his or her job to make the effort successful. Each one has a story to tell. Most also have photographs, souvenirs, and news clippings to help explain the story.

But there is a big problem now. We are losing the World War II participants at the rate of 30,000 a month. With nearly all leaving their stories either untold or in a box that will be discarded.

World War II lead to the establishment of many efforts that impact the way we do things in the world today – the creation of the U.N.; the establishment of the G.I. Bill that finally helps G.I.'s with their career, incorporating numerous treaties like NATO; and the implementation of the regional development programs like the Marshall Plan.

Therefore, I believe it is important to establish an archive to record the thoughts and feelings of those who sacrificed much to give us the freedom and security we enjoy today. Only by listening to their stories will we learn what it was really like.

Perhaps this will educate future generations on the consequences of war and which may indeed reduce chances for a repeat war.

In closing, I would like to quote a line from William Shakespeare's Henry V – "we few, we happy few, we band of brothers".

I urge the Kansas Legislature to pass House bill 2238 before we few are gone.

The 94th Fighter Squadron In World War II

A Fifty-Year Commemorative Portfolio 1944–1994 JIM BERTOGLIO'S WORLD WAR II PHOTOGRAPHS CELEBRATE THE 94TH
FIGHTER SQUADRON, the oldest active squadron in the United States Air Force. The portfolio of 10 photographs presented here was created from expertly restored vintage negatives under the supervision of the photographer himself, who was stationed with the 94th Fighter Squadron in Italy in 1944 and 1945.

These photographs record the men and machines that helped forge the world we live in today. They document the grace and speed of the Lockheed P-38 Lightning, a remarkable aircraft that fought for democracy in France, Italy, Austria, Germany, Romania, and in the Pacific theater. Bertoglio's images capture the fatigue of a bone-weary fighter pilot, the quiet reverie of a midnight poker game, and the solemnity of a mission briefing. The photographs also salute the unsung ground crews, individuals who played an integral part in freedom's ultimate victory. Finally, as a poignant reminder of the sacrifices demanded by war, one image takes us to the smoldering wreckage of a massive B-17 bomber, where an entire crew of seventeen men died in the fire of an attempted runway crash landing.

Jim Bertoglio experienced first-hand the tumultuous events of the war years, recording the everyday life-anddeath struggles of the 94th Squadron with a sensitive eye that captured the essence of World War II aviation. His images convey a sense of quiet drama as air and ground crews steel themselves for the impending firestorms of close aerial combat. In Bertoglio's photographs these now-antique aircraft retain a distinct sense of timelessness. Icons of a force that changed human history, the tools of war captured in Bertoglio's lens still fly in the collective memory of our culture.

The 94th Fighter Squadron, the famous "Hat-in-the-Ring" squadron, is a unit with a long and proud history. First organized in 1917, the 94th was to go on to fight with distinction and honor in World War II. These photographs capture the preparation for missions, the longing for home, the horror and danger of battle, and the sacrifices made by Americans. I hope you will take a moment to reflect on the dedication of all of those Americans who gave so much to protect our way of life and restore liberty and freedom. We must never forget the sacrifices of these Americans, many of whom paid the ultimate price in service to our country.

Perhaps a most fitting tribute to these images comes from those whose lives they record: the heroes who maintained and flew these aircraft into history—

ENLISTED MEN ARE THE BACKBONE of every service, and the old 94th had plenty of backbone. We were tough, proud and second-to-none when it came to putting P-38s into the air. While our planes supported the Normandy invasion from air-fields on Corsica, our pup tents—pitched at runway's end—vibrated 24 hours a day. Three years with the 94th made us blood brothers. Jim Bertoglio captured our life on film. We loved those old P-38s. They had a look and a sound that stirred your blood, and we were proud to be the GIs that kept them flying.

—Tech. Sergeant George R. Scanlon Ground Crew Chief, 94th Fighter Squadron, 1st Fighter Group THE WAKE-UP CALL CAME AT 0500 on a warm summer morning. The tent occupants stirred, grumbled and slowly rolled out of their sleeping bags and into their flight suits. The background noise was the low rumble of powerful Allison engines. After the mission briefing each pilot was dropped off at his aircraft, which had been readied for the mission by the ground crew. No matter the pilot's rank, the crew chief was in charge here.

One by one the P-38s wheeled onto the taxiway and moved out for takeoff. We had one job: keep enemy fighters away from our bombers, protecting them through their bomb run and back to friendly territory. Landing at home base we reviewed the aircraft's performance with the crew chief, then it was off to a debriefing with the intelligence section.

The work for the day was complete; the next day would bring another mission to a different target. We may have lost a friend today, perhaps more than one. It may happen again tomorrow—but we'll go just the same.

To me, as a P-38 combat pilot for over four years flying almost every conceivable type of mission in two theaters of war, the real beauty of this series is the sleek, streamlined and chillingly beautiful display of raw power in the twin-engined, twin-boomed P-38 fighter! Truly a magnificent flying machine, it flew in all theaters in World War II. It was the most-feared and most-loved fighter—making a truly unusual contribution to the art and science of aerial warfare. It is properly considered a "classic" among World-War-II-era aircraft.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of House Bill 2301,
which would implement funding for certain agencies that help pregnant
women. My name is LaVeta Adams and I represent Family Life Services
of Arkansas City, Kansas. I have been a volunteer for this licensed
adoption agency and women's resource center since 1997. I have also
served on the Board of Directors since 1999. In addition, I am a student of
good standing in the Master's Social Work department of Newman
University in Wichita. The director of Family Life Services, Tim Durham,
is with me today and is available for any questions you may have
regarding our agency or any of the services we provide.

- Family Life Services is a non-profit agency which has been serving women in South Central Kansas for over twenty years.
- We are an adoption agency licensed by the state of Kansas.
- We were the only women's resource center in the state to receive funding through the PMI, obtaining results considered successful by all accounts.
- Through PMI we have been able to improve outcomes for over 300 pregnant women and their families.

- Our program is strictly voluntary. The women who are in our program have in many cases already decided to carry their child to term and do not want abortion services.
- We provide transportation to medical visits.
- We refer to local physicians, mental health providers, health
 departments, Red Cross, Salvation Army, Safe Homes, SRS, local
 hospitals and many other agencies. Doctors in particular appreciate
 that we offer education which they do not have time to provide.
- We provide classes for women and the families to learn Lamaze,
 First Aid, and infant CPR.
- We purchased and continue to use a state-of-the-art prenatal curriculum called "Earn While You Learn". This program teaches women about SIDS, Car Seat Safety, Fetal Alcohol Syndrome, baby care, what to expect during pregnancy, breast feeding, and how to care for your child up to one year of age.
- We also established a Mommy store where women can redeem their Mommy Money from attending sessions with a licensed social worker or registered nurse to purchase items they need for themselves and their baby.
- Items they have been able to purchase included baby cribs, car seats, maternity clothes, baby clothes, diapers, baby wipes, formula, and much more.

- We enjoy wide support from many community organizations.
 Many individuals who characterize themselves as "pro-choice" understand the need to help promote healthy pregnancies and support our effort. This program has brought the community together to work toward goals which we all affirm.
- We provided an accounting for the money spent to KDHE as per an approved budget and submitted quarterly reports during each grant period.

Our agency does not intimidate, pressure, or coerce women into having their babies. We do not use scare tactics or graphic videos/literature with our clients to dissuade them from submitting to an abortion. In fact, we tell clients we will endeavor to help them in whatever decision they choose for themselves and their baby. We do provide accurate information regarding abortion procedures and possible long-term effects, including the "If you are Pregnant" pamphlet provided by KDHE. We also provide support services to aid women who have experienced any pregnancy loss or abortion.

Since funding was unexpectedly and abruptly terminated, we have continued to administer the program, though many of the social services have been greatly reduced and we were required to terminate our professional associates. This highly successful program had been in full swing and so it was devastating to the target population when we were forced to drastically reconfigure how we could deliver our services. In spite of the withdrawal of funding, we have managed to keep the program in effect and are poised

to once again provide the full spectrum of services which were approved and implemented with the help of KDHE.

Opponents of this bill state that any woman who carries a baby to term is 10 times more likely to die than a woman who submits to an abortion. If their statistics are true, I would think they would be supportive of a bill that would provide prenatal services to these women who are, according to them, in such peril simply because they would like to have a baby. I implore you to please support House Bill 2301.

Testimony for Hearing on HB 2301 Wednesday, March 30, 2005 Sarah London, Lobbyist for Planned Parenthood of Kansas and Mid-Missouri Proponent

My name is Sarah London. I am the Kansas Public Policy Manager for Planned Parenthood of Kansas & Mid-Missouri. Thank you, Chairman Umbarger and members of this committee, for giving me the opportunity to discuss HB 2301 and our support of it, with exceptions.

Planned Parenthood operates three health centers in Kansas, in Wichita, Hays, and Lawrence. We also operate eight centers in Missouri. We are affiliated with Comprehensive Health of Planned Parenthood of Kansas & Mid-Missouri in Overland Park, an ambulatory surgical center licensed by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE). Comprehensive Health provides comprehensive reproductive health services, including abortion care. We also provide pregnancy counseling:

In 2004, Planned Parenthood provided family planning and related care to over 30,000 women and men.

In our philosophy, family planning assures that all individuals have the freedom to make reproductive decisions. In order to enable the individual to make and implement a responsible decision, there should be access to information and services related to sexuality, reproduction, methods of contraception, fertility control and parenthood. Furthermore, Comprehensive Health asserts that both parenthood and non-parenthood are valid personal decisions.

Therefore, we support the intent of HB 2301, which seeks to assist low-income women carry wanted pregnancies to term. However, we suggest making several small changes to ensure that this fund best serves women in crisis pregnancies.

Many women utilize county health clinics for prenatal care. Clinics often provide free or low-cost prenatal care and help women access resources for successful parenthood. I have submitted to the committee the Kansas Directory of Services available to pregnant women needing help. This directory is made available to all women who seek pregnancy counseling at Planned Parenthood, according to state law. We urge the committee to make the matching funds in HB 2301 available to these governmental agencies that serve many Kansas women in crisis.

Currently, HB 2301 excludes county health clinics from consideration in two ways. First, the bill limits the application process to non-profit organizations. We encourage the committee to expand the language to include "governmental entities" in addition to non-profits. Since this is a matching grant program, county health clinics could use local revenue, foundation dollars and/or private donations to gain access to the dollar for dollar match.

Second, the legislation specifies that no organization "promoting, referring for or educating in favor of abortion" may receive the funds, which disqualifies most County centers. Although they do not perform abortion services, many public health clinics that serve women in crisis will share with them the information provided in the "Women's Right to Know" Act. I have also provided copies of this information for the committee. This information outlines the risks associated with abortion and childbirth, as well as provides information about the father's responsibility and

Senate Ways and Means 3-30-05 Attachment 12 adoption services. By handing out this manual, which was developed by the State, the County clinics would be disqualified from competing for these funds.

We urge the committee to strike the words "promoting, referring for or educating in favor of abortion" from this bill to make the grant more inclusive to County health clinics, who provide critical pre- and post-natal services to many Kansas women, while also distributing Women's Right to Know information.

Planned Parenthood supports the work of County health clinics and frequently refers patients to them. Sadly, these clinics often under-funded, understaffed and under-resourced. We encourage the committee to expand the language in this bill to include these County health clinics that provide critical services to many pregnant women in our state.

Fetal Development

A pregnant woman may notice her first missed menstrual period at the end of the second week after conception, or ab four weeks after the first day of her last normal period. There are different kinds of tests for pregnancy. Some may not accurate for up to three weeks after conception, or five weeks after the first day of the last normal period.

The Week in the blue block beside each picture is the age from conception. The gestational age (in parenthesis) is usual figured from the first day of the last menstrual period.

Week2 –

(4 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

→ Implantation begins the first week and the embryo continues to grow. The embryo is about 1/100 of an inch long at this time.

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Week4



(6 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The embryo is about 1/6 inch long and has developed a head and a trunk.
- Structures that will become arms and legs, called limb buds, begin to appear.
- → Blood is beginning to be pumped through fetal circulation.
- → Heartbeat is visible by ultrasound.

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Week6



(8 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The embryo is about 1/2 inch and has a four chambered heart and nostrils.
- → Fingers and toes begin to form.
- → Reflex activity begins with the development of the brain and nervous system.

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Week8



(10 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus, until now called an embryo, is about 1-1/4 inches long (with the head making up about half this size) and weighs less than 1/2 ounce.
- → The beginnings of all key body parts are present, although they are not completely positioned in their final locations.
- → Structures that will form eyes, ears, arms and legs are identifiable.

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Week 10



(12 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 2-1/2 inches from head to rump, weighing about 1-1/2 ounces.
- → Fingers and toes are distinct and have nails.
- → The fetus begins small, random movements, too slight to be felt.
- → The fetal heartbeat can be detected with a doppler or heart monitor.

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Week 12



(14 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 3-1/2 inches from head to rump and weighs about 2 ounces.
- → The fetus begins to swallow, the kidneys make urine, and blood begins to form in the bone marrow.
- → Joints and muscles allow full body movement.

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Week 14 -



(16 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 4-3/4 inches from head to rump and weighs 4 ounces.
- → The head is erect and the arms and legs are developed.

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Week 16 -



(18 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 5 inches from head to rump and weighs about 6 ounces.
- → The skin is pink and transparent and the ears stick out from the head.

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Week 18 -



(20 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 6-1/4 inches from head to rump, weighing about 10 ounces.
- → All organs and structures have been formed, and a period of simple growth begins.
- → Respiratory movements occur, but the lungs have not developed enough to permit survival outside the uterus.
- → By this time the woman may feel the fetus moving.

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Week**20**



(22 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 7-1/2 inches from head to rump, has fingerprints and perhaps some head and body hair, weighing about one pound (16 ounces).
- → There is little chance before this time that a baby could survive outside the woman's body.
- → Fetal heartbeat can be heard with a stethoscope.

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Week**22**



(24 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 8-1/4 inches from head to rump and weighs about 1-1/4 pounds.
- → Changes are occurring in lung development so that some babies are able to survive (with intensive care services).
- Surviving babies may have disabilities and require long-term intensive care.

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Week24



(26 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 9 inches from head to rump and weighs about 2 pounds.
- → The fetus can respond to sound.
- → About 4 out of 10 babies born now may survive (with intensive care services).

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Week26



(28 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 10 inches from head to rump and weighs about 2-1/2 pounds.
- → The eyes are partially open and can perceive light.
- → About 9 out of 10 babies born now will survive (with intensive care services).

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Week28



(30 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 10-1/2 inches from head to rump and weighs almost 3 pounds.
- The fetus has lungs that are capable of breathing air, although medical help may be needed.
- → The fetus can open and close its eyes, suck its thumb and respond to sound.
- → Nearly all babies born now will survive (with intensive care services).

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Week30



(32 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 11 inches from head to rump and weighs more than 3 pounds.
- → Skin is thicker and more pink.
- → Almost all babies born now will live (with intensive care services).

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Week **32**



(34 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 11-3/4 inches from head to rump and weighs about 4-1/2 pounds.
- → Ears begin to hold shape.
- → Almost all babies born now will live (with intensive care services).

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Week34



(36 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 12-1/2 inches from head to rump and weighs about 5-1/2 pounds.
- → Scalp hair is silky and lays against the head.
- → Almost all babies born now will live.

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Week36



(38 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 13-1/2 inches from head to rump and weighs about 6-1/2 pounds.
- → Lungs are usually mature.
- → The fetus can grasp firmly.
- → Almost all babies born now will live.

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Week38



(40 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

- → The fetus is about 14 inches from head to rump, may be more than 20 inches overall, and may weigh from 6-1/2 to 10 pounds.
- → The baby is full-term and ready to be born.

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METHODS & MEDICAL RISKS

There are three ways a pregnancy can end: a woman can give birth, have a miscarriage or she can choose to have abortion. If you make an informed decision to have an abortion, you and your doctor will need to consider how long y have been pregnant before deciding which abortion method to use.

Based on data from the Centers from Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the risk of dying as a direct result of a legal induced abortion is less than one per 100,000.

FROM 2-12 WEEKS

(From 4-14 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

Abortion Methods: Early non-surgical abortion or Vacuum Aspiration

Early non-surgical abortion

- A drug is given to stop the development of the pregnancy.
- A second drug is given by mouth or placed in the vagina, causing the uterus to contract and expel the fetus ε placenta.

Vacuum Aspiration

- Local anesthetic is applied or injected into or near the cervix to prevent pain.
- Opening of the cervix is gradually stretched. This is done by the insertion of a series of dilators, each one thic
 than the previous one, into the opening of the cervix. The thickest dilator used is about the width of a fountain pen.
- After opening is stretched, a clear plastic tube is inserted into the uterus and attached to a suction system. The fe
 and placenta are then removed.
- After the tube has been removed, a spoon-like instrument, called a curette may be used to gently scrape the walls
 the uterus to be sure it has been completely emptied of the pregnancy.

Medical Risks

- Immediate medical risks may include the following, which are discussed on pages 16-17: blood clots in the uter heavy bleeding, cut or torn cervix, performation of the wall of the uterus, pelvic infection, incomplete abortianesthesia-related complications.
- Possible long-term medical risks are discussed on page 17.

FROM 13-21/22 WEEKS

(From 15-23/24 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

Abortion Methods: Dilatation and Evacuation (D&E) or Labor Induction

Dilatation and Evacuation (D&E)

- Sponge-like tapered pieces of absorbent material are placed into the cervix. This material becomes moist and slove opens the cervix.
- Sponge-like material will remain in place for several hours or overnight.
- A second or third application of the material may be necessary.
- Intravenous medications may be given to ease pain and prevent infection.
- After a local or general anesthetic is given, the fetus and placenta are removed from the uterus with medi instruments such as forceps and suction curettage. Occasionally for removal, it will be necessary to dismember fetus.

Medical Risks

- Immediate medical risks may include the following, which are discussed on pages 16-17: blood clots in the uter heavy bleeding, cut or torn cervix, performation of the wall of the uterus, pelvic infection, incomplete abortianesthesia-related complications.
- Possible long-term medical risks are discussed on page 17.

Labor Induction

- Labor induction may require a hospital stay.
- Medicine is given to start labor in one of three ways: medicine is placed in the cervix, directly into the woman's v
 or by inserting a needle through the mother's abdomen and into the amniotic sac (bag of waters).
- Labor will usually begin in 2-4 hours.
- If the afterbirth (placenta) is not completely removed during labor induction, the doctor must open the cervix and to suction curettage.

Medical Risks

- Labor induction abortion carries the highest risk for problems, such as infection and heavy bleeding.
- When medicines are used to start labor, there is a risk of rupture of the uterus.
- Other <u>immediate medical risks</u> may include the following, which are discussed on pages 16-17: blood clots in uterus, heavy bleeding, cut or torn cervix, performation of the wall of the uterus, pelvic infection, incomplete abort anesthesia-related complications.
- Possible long-term medical risks are discussed on page 17.

If the labor induction method is used, there is a small chance that a baby could live for a short period of time. (See <u>"Wh. the fetus is determined to be viable?"</u>, page 15.)

FROM 22-38 WEEKS

(From 24-40 weeks after the first day of the last normal menstrual period)

Abortion Methods: Labor Induction or Hysterotomy

Labor Induction

(See <u>"What if the fetus is determined to be viable?"</u>, page 15.)

- Labor induction may require a hospital stay.
- Medicine is given to start labor in one of three ways: medicine is placed in the cervix, directly into the woman's veil
 by inserting a needle through the mother's abdomen and into the amniotic sac (bag of waters).
- If the afterbirth (placenta) is not completely removed during labor induction, the doctor must open the cervix and suction or instrumental curettage.
- Labor and delivery of the fetus during this period are similar to childbirth.
- The duration of labor depends on the size of the baby and the readiness of the uterus.

Medical Risks

- As with childbirth, possible complications of labor induction include infection and heavy bleeding.
- When medicines are used to start labor, there is a risk of rupture of the uterus.
- Other <u>immediate medical risks</u> may include the following, which are discussed on pages 16-17: blood clots in uterus, heavy bleeding, cut or torn cervix, performation of the wall of the uterus, pelvic infection, incomplete abort anesthesia-related complications.

Hysterotomy (similar to a Caesarean Section)

- This method requires that the woman be admitted into a hospital.
- A hysterotomy may be performed if labor cannot be started by inducing labor, or if the woman or her fetus is too to undergo labor.
- A hysterotomy is the removal of the fetus by surgically cutting open the abdomen and uterus. Anesthetic medicat
 given intravenously or into the woman's back, or by breathing the anesthetic, is administered so the woman will
 feel the pain of the surgery

Medical Risks

- Complications are similar to those seen with other abdominal surgeries and administration of anesthesia, such severe infection (sepsis); blood clots to the heart and brain (emboli); stomach contents breathed into the lu (aspiration pneumonia); severe bleeeding (hemorrhage); and injury to the urinary tract.
- Other possible immediate risks include: blood clots in the uterus, heavy bleeding, pelvic infection, retention of pie of the placenta, anesthesia-related complications.
- Possible long-term medical risks are discussed on page 17.

WHAT IF THE FETUS IS DETERMINED TO BE VIABLE?

- The chance of the fetus living outside the uterus (viability) improves as the gestational age increases. The dormust tell you the probable gestational age of the fetus at the time the abortion would be performed.
- No person shall perform or induce an abortion when the fetus is viable unless such a person is a physician and had documented referral.

The following steps must be taken:

1. The physician who performs or induces an abortion when the fetus is viable must have a referral from anol physician not financially associated with the physician performing or inducing the abortion.

2. Both physicians determine that the abortion is necessary to preserve the life of the pregnant woman or a continuar of the pregnancy will cause substantial and irreversible impairment of a major bodily function of the pregnant wom (K.S.A. 65-6703)

No person shall perform or induce a partial birth abortion on a viable fetus unless such a person is a physician and a documented referral.

The following steps must be taken:

1. The physician who performs or induces a partial birth abortion on a viable fetus must have a documented refe from another physician not legally or financially affiliated with the physician performing or inducing the abortion.

2. Both physicians determine that the abortion is necessary to preserve the life of the pregnant woman or a continuar of the pregnancy will cause a substantial and irreversible impairment of a major physical or mental function of pregnant woman (K.S.A. 65-6721).

• If the child is born alive, the attending physician has the legal obligation to take all reasonable steps necessar maintain the life and health of the child. (K.S.A. 65-6709 (a)(4))

Medical Emergencies

When a medical emergency requires the performance of an abortion, the physician shall tell the woman, before the abor if possible, of the medical indications supporting the physician's judgment that an abortion is necessary to prevent substar and permanent damage to any of the woman's major bodily functions.

In the case of a medical emergency, a physician also is not required to comply with any condition listed above which, in physician's medical judgment, he or she is prevented from satisfying because of the medical emergency.

MEDICAL RISKS OF ABORTION

Medical Risks

The risk of complications for the woman increases with advancing gestational age. (See the previous pages for a descrip of the abortion procedure that your doctor will be using and the specific risks listed in those pages.)

The following is a description of the risks cited in those pages:

Pelvic Infection (sepsis): Bacteria (germs) from the vagina or cervix may enter the uterus and cause an infect Antibiotics may clear up such an infection. In rare cases, a repeat suction, hospitalization or surgery may be need Infection rates are less than 1% for suction curettage, 1.5% for D&E, and 5% for labor induction.

Incomplete abortion: Fetal parts or other products of pregnancy may not be completely emptied from the uterus, required further medical procedures. Incomplete abortion may result in infection and bleeding. The reported rate of s complications is less than 1% after a D&E; whereas, following a labor induction procedure, the rate may be as high as 36°.

Blood clots in the uterus: Blood clots that cause severe cramping occur in about 1% of all abortions. The clots usually removed by a repeat suction curettage.

Heavy bleeding (hemorrhage): Some amount of bleeding is common following an abortion. Heavy bleed (hemorrhaging) is not common and may be treated by repeat suction, medication or, rarely, surgery. Ask the doctor explain heavy bleeding and what to do if it occurs.

Cut or torn cervix: The opening of the uterus (cervix) may be torn while it is being stretched open to allow medi instruments to pass through and into the uterus. This happens in less than 1% of first trimester abortions.

Perforation of the uterus wall: A medical instrument may go through the wall of the uterus. The reported rate is 1 out every 500 abortions. Depending on the severity, performation can lead to infection, heavy bleeding or both. Surgery may required to repair the uterine tissue, and in the most severe cases hysterectomy may be required.

Anesthesia-related complications: As with other surgical procedures, anesthesia increases the risk of complication associated with abortion. The reported risks of anesthesia-related complications is around 1 per 5,000 abortions.

Rh Immune Globulin Therapy: Protein material found on the surface of red blood cells is known as the Rh Factor. I woman and her fetus have different Rh factors, she must received medication to prevent the development of antibodies t would endanger future pregnancies (See page 18 for additional information on Rh Immune Globulin Therapy.)

LONG-TERM MEDICAL RISKS

Future childbearing: Early abortions that are not complicated by infection do not cause infertility or make it more difficulcarry a later pregnancy to term. Complications associated with an abortion may make it difficult to become pregnant in future or carry a pregnancy to term.

Cancer of the breast: Several studies have found no overall increase in risk of developing breast cancer after an induc abortion, while several studies do show an increase risk. There seems to be consensus that this issue needs further stu Women who have a strong family history of breast cancer or who have clinical findings of breast disease should se medical advice from their physician irrespective of their decision to become pregnant or have an abortion.

EMOTIONAL REACTIONS

Because every person is different, one woman's emotional reaction to an abortion may be different from another's. After abortion, a woman may have both positive and negative feelings, even at the same time. One woman may feel relief, be that the procedure is over and that she is no longer pregnant.

Another woman may feel sad that she was in a position where all of her choices were hard ones. She may feel sad abending the pregnancy. For a while after the abortion she also may feel a sense of emptiness or guilt, wondering whether not her decision was right.

Some women who describe these feelings find they go away with time. Others find them more difficult to overcome.

Certain factors can increase the chance that a woman may have a difficult adjustment to an abortion. One of these is having any counseling before consenting to an abortion. When help and support from family and friends are not available woman's adjustment to the decision may be more of a problem.

Other reasons why a woman's long-term response to an abortion can be poor may be related to past events in her life. I example, negative feelings could last longer if she has not had much practice making major life decisions or already h serious emotional problems.

Talking with a counselor or physician may help a woman to consider her decision fully before she takes any action.

MEDICAL RISKS OF CHILDBIRTH

Women who are more likely to experience problems during and after a pregnancy are those who did not obtain prenatal c early in the pregnancy and/or didn't continue with that care and those with generally poor health and life styles, ϵ smoking, alcohol and drug use. Continuing a pregnancy and delivering a baby is usually a safe, healthy process. Based data from the CDC, the risk of the woman dying as a direct result of pregnancy and childbirth is less than 10 in 100,000 births.

Continuing your pregnancy also includes a risk of experiencing complications that are not always life-threatening.

- Caesarean section (C/S) delivery. Occurs in 20 out of every 100 births.
- Infection. Approximately 4 out of every 100 women experience an infection after childbirth and are treated \(\circ\)
 antibiotics. Lack of treatment may lead to infertility or more serious infections.
- Bleeding. Heavy bleeding may occur as a result of clotting problems, tears in the placenta prior to delivery of pieces of the placenta remain in the uterus after delivery.

Need for Rh Immune Globulin: As part of prenatal care, the woman will have a blood test to find out her blood type. If pregnant woman is Rh negative and the father is Rh positive, she can make antibodies (sensitization) that can attack the blood cells of the fetus if the fetus is Rh positive. This sensitization can occur any time fetal blood mixes with the moth blood; during pregnancy or after an abortion, miscarriage, ectopic pregnancy, or amniocentesis.

To prevent the development of the antibodies the woman can receive shots (immunizations) of Rh immune globulin (rh one at 28 weeks of pregnancy and the other following a miscarriage or delivery of a baby. The only known side effect of immunization for the woman is soreness from the shot or a slight fever. There is no risk of infection with hun immunodeficiency virus (HIV) with the globulin. The approximate cost of the immunizations is fifty dollars (\$50).

If the woman who is Rh negative does not receive the Rh immune globulin, the fetus' red blood cells may be damag leading to anemia, serious illness or death of the fetus or newborn. (See page 17 for <u>additional information</u> on Rh Imma Globulin Therapy relating to an abortion.)

Causes of Complications in Pregnancy

- Severe bleeding
- Blood clots in the lungs
- High blood pressure
- Seizures, strokes
- Severe infection
- Abnormal functioning of the heart
- Anesthesia-related complications and death.

Altogether, these causes account for 80% of all deaths relating to pregnancy. Unknown or uncommon causes account the remaining 20% of deaths relating to pregnancy. Women who have chronic severe diseases are at greater risk of de than are healthy women.

PREGNANCY, CHILDBIRTH, AND NEWBORN

You may or may not qualify for financial help for prenatal (pregnancy), childbirth and neonatal (newborn) care, depending your income. If you qualify, programs such as the state's medical assistance program, called Medicaid, will pay or help the cost of doctor, clinic, hospital and other related medical expenses to help you with prenatal care, childbirth deliv services and care for your newborn baby.

A listing of agencies that are available to provide or assist you to access financial assistance or medical care is available calling toll free 1-888-744-4825.

WHAT ABOUT ADOPTION?

Women or couples facing an untimely pregnancy who choose not to take on the full responsibilities of parenthood has another option: adoption.

Making a plan for adoption is rarely an easy decision. Counseling and support services are a key part of adoption and available from a variety of adoption agencies and parent support groups across the state. A list of adoption agencies available by calling toll free 1-888-744-4825.

There are several ways to make a plan for adoption, including through a child placement agency or through a privattorney. Although fully anonymous adoptions are available, some degree of openness in adoption is more common, su as permitting the birth mother to choose the adoptive parents.

THE FATHER'S RESPONSIBILITY

The father of a child has a legal responsibility to provide for the support, educational, medical and other needs of that ch In Kansas that responsibility includes child support payments to the child's mother or legal guardian. A child has rights inheritance from their father and may be eligible through him for benefits such as life insurance, Social Security, pensiveteran's or disability benefits. Further, the child benefits from knowing the father's medical history and any potential hea problems that can be passed genetically.

Paternity can be established in Kansas by two methods:

- 1. The father and mother, at the time of birth, can sign forms provided by the hospital acknowledging paternity and father's name is added to the birth certificate.
- 2. A legal action can be brought in a court of law to determine paternity and establish a child support order.

Issues of paternity effect your legal rights and the rights of the child. More information concerning paternity establishment and child support may be obtained from any regional office of the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Servic Division of Child Support Enforcement.

INFORMATION DIRECTORY

The decision to have an abortion, have a baby or make an adoption plan, must be carefully considered. There are lists state, county and local health and social service agencies and organizations available to assist you. You are encouraged contact these groups if you need more information so you can make an informed decision.

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Testimony In Support Of HB2301

Chairman Umbarger and members of the committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of House Bill 2301, which would implement the Senator Stan Clark pregnancy maintenance initiative program. My name is Mike Farmer and I am the Executive Director of the Kansas Catholic Conference, the public policy office of the Catholic Church in Kansas.

I will be very brief with my comments here today since I know that everyone on this committee is familiar with what has come to be known as the Pregnancy Maintenance Initiative or PMI. I was still a member of the legislature when this program was begun and I have seen it offer services to women in crisis pregnancies over the years with great effectiveness and with tremendous outcomes. It has enjoyed the support of legislators from both parties and is one of the few if not the only program of its kind in the state that requires a dollar for dollar match.

On the other hand, Planned Parenthood, the largest abortion provider in this country continues to take in significant income from federal, state and local governments. According to their 2003-2004 annual report, tax dollars accounted for a record \$265.2 million – nearly 33 percent of its \$810 million total income this supposedly non-profit group made. For the 18th year in a row, they turned a net profit of \$35.2 million bringing its total profits over the 18 years to \$538 million.

I was very troubled last year when our Governor vetoed the PMI program. As you recall a veto override was successful in the House and was only a few votes short from being successful in the Senate. I am hopeful that the Governor will reconsider this program with the information that I and the Bishops of Kansas provided to her in a meeting on February 17th. I will make this same packet of information available to any of you who would like a copy.

In conclusion I would hope that you would give consideration to one of the last legislative acts that my friend Senator Stan Clark valiantly attempted on the floor of the Senate before his tragic death this last year. I'm sure Stan would also appreciate your vote in bringing this life giving program back into existence.

I ask that you please vote to recommend this bill favorable for passage.

Dear Chairman Umbarger,

My name is Julie Burkhart and I am the Executive Director of ProKanDo, a statewide pro-woman, reproductive rights organization. Thank you Chairman Umbarger for allowing me to address the committee regarding HB 2301.

Without a doubt, we unequivocally support the underlying premise of HB 2301. It is imperative that we assist organizations that help women, who have decided to have babies, to have the healthiest possible outcomes. We all know that proper pre and postnatal care is imperative to a child's start in the world.

Here in Kansas, there is a demonstrated need for pre and postnatal care. The latest Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) statistics from 2003 demonstrate that we have a need in this state for expanded services that will help those who are likely to fall between the cracks. For example, 9.4% of babies delivered were less that 37 weeks gestation, 7.4% of babies were of low birth weight, 11.7% of women began receiving prenatal care in their 2nd to 3rd trimesters of pregnancy, with 0.5% reporting they received no prenatal care at all and 26.9% of women reported that they received less than adequate to inadequate prenatal care. Additionally, 64,300 children between birth through 18 years of age, or 9.3%, were reported to be uninsured in 2003. These numbers clearly exemplify the need for greater service delivery to women who are in hardship during pregnancy and beyond.

In order to make this type of grant accessible to a wider range of potential grantees - so as to provide services from a broad array of agencies, we recommend striking certain language in lines 41-42, "promoting, referring for, or educating in favor of..." This type of language works to marginalize those who provide any information regarding the full range of reproductive health care. The committee might consider using more positive language such as "Organizations that provide the full range of reproductive health care education or reference to the full range of reproductive health care may not be excluded from the grant making process."

I would like to reiterate that we support the underlying premise of this bill – to ensure that women have healthy pregnancies and healthy babies; thus, giving our children the best start possible. I thank you for the opportunity to speak in favor of this bill and hope you will consider the recommendation that I have made so that more agencies can provide these needed services.

Dear Chairman Umbarger,

My name is Jana Mackey and I represent the National Organization for Women in Kansas. NOW is a nationwide organization aimed at bringing women into full and equal participation in society, and it has over 700 members in Kansas. NOW supports all reproductive rights, including the right to bear and raise children. We therefore support HB 2301 and its purpose of making it possible for women to exercise these rights in difficult times.

We would like to see this grant money reach as many women as possible throughout the state of Kansas. For this reason, I would like to suggest a minor change to the current language. In line 39 of HB 2301, "adoption services" are listed as an eligibility requirement. We believe that organizations which provide adoption referrals should be eligible as well. Currently, the only agencies that provide pregnancy maintenance services as well as adoption services are Catholic Charities, Lutheran Social Services, and Family Life Services of Arkansas City. There may be a couple that I am missing, but in general, adoption agencies typically operate independently of crisis pregnancy centers and vice versa.

While these agencies are certainly deserving of this grant money, there are literally hundreds of others throughout the state which should be able to benifit from it as well. Whereas the organizations that would benefit from the current form of HB 2301 are located in fewer than 10 cities, there are agencies which provide vital services to pregnant women (including adoption referrals and assistance) in cities and towns of all sizes throughout the state. Women in all parts of Kansas need these important services and should benefit from the grants authorized by HB 2301.

Thank you for the opportunity to speak in favor of this bill, and I hope that you will consider my suggestions for making this much-needed assistance available to more women throughout Kansas.
