SB 9 - Appropriations for FY 2006 and FY 2007 for state agencies, prescribing reductions

The Chairman acknowledged Alan Conroy, Director, Kansas Legislative Research Department, who presented an overview of the following information:

- 2005 Special Session Senate Bill No. 9 (Attachment 1)
- Impact by Agency of Potential Across the Board Reductions to Approved FY 2006 State General Fund Expenditures (<u>Attachment 2</u>)

The Committee discussed the implications of including STAR Bonds in $\underline{\mathbf{SB}\,9}$ and decisions the Committee and the Legislature will need to consider.

Senator Morris moved, with a second by Senator Emler, that SB 9 be passed without recommendation. Chairman Umbarger encouraged State Agencies, if they will be impacted by this legislation, to get in touch with the Legislators. Motion carried on a roll call vote. Senator McGinn changed her vote from "Pass" to "Aye" and explained her vote because she felt it was very important to have the debate on the Senate floor, and that she is really not a "yes" vote, but it is necessary to look at a long term vision. Senator Betts changed his vote from "Pass" to "No". Senator Kelly changed her vote from "Pass" to "Aye". Senator Schmidt changed her vote from "Pass" to "No".

The Attorney General's Office came before the committee regarding different subject matter. The representative noted that \$320,000. has been allocated to the Board of Indigent's Defense Services fund and

\$80,000. earmarked in the Attorney General's budget for the BTK case. Senator Wysong requested allocating the \$200,000 to \$300,000 from the BTK case to the State General Fund toward other agency requests.

2005 SPECIAL SESSION SENATE BILL NO. 9

Senate Bill No. 9 makes adjustments to FY 2006 currently approved expenditures for all agencies funded from the State General Fund with the exception of the Department of Education. The bill also adjusts certain transfers impacting the State General Fund in FY 2006. The expenditure reduction and transfer adjustments are expected to generate savings totaling \$160.8 million in FY 2006.

In general, the bill imposes an 8.3 percent reduction on currently approved State General Fund expenditures for FY 2006. The reduction would apply to all State General Fund expenditures with the following exceptions:

- Expenditures for the State Department of Education, including expenditures for employer contributions for KPERS – school payments for eligible employers. These currently approved expenditures total \$2.438 billion.
- Expenditures totaling \$35.9 million for debt service payments pursuant to contractual bond obligations.
- Expenditures of \$704.6 million for consensus caseload estimates for the Department on Aging, the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services and the Department of Administration.

The expenditure reductions would reduce currently approved FY 2006 State General Fund expenditures from \$5.001 billion to \$4.850 billion (not including expenditures authorized by other bills during the 2005 Special Session). Although the overall reduction to approved expenditures is 3.0 percent, the exceptions noted above reduce the expenditures on which the reductions are based to \$1.822 billion, resulting in the 8.3 percent reduction for most agencies.

The bill also modifies four currently approved **State General Fund revenue transfers** by reducing them by 8.3 percent:

- The State General Fund transfer to the Special City-County Highway Fund, currently approved at \$10.1 million, is reduced to \$9.2 million.
- The transfer to the State Water Plan Fund (currently \$6.0 million) is reduced to \$5.5 million.
- The transfer to the **Board of Regents Faculty of Distinction Fund** is reduced from \$894,000 to \$819,762.
- The transfer to the **State Fair Capital Improvements Fund** is reduced from \$300,000 to \$275,088.

Finally, the bill transfers \$8.0 million from the **State Highway Fund** to the State General Fund. The transfer is designed to capture 8.3 percent of the estimated \$96.5 million sales tax transfer to the State Highway Fund.
