## MINUTES OF THE SENATE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Jean Schodorf at 1:35 p.m. on March 2, 2006, in Room 123-S of the Capitol.

Senator Schodorf explained that the Committee would be reviewing current school finance plans. She noted that the Senate Education Plan was recommended favorably for introduction earlier in the day in the Senate Ways and Means Committee. She announced that hearings on the Senate Education Plan would be held in the Senate Education Committee on March 6 and 7, and Senator Morris, Senate President, would describe how the plan was put together at that time. She explained that a bipartisan group, which included herself, Senator Lee, Senator Vratil, Senator Derek Schmidt, and Senator Hensley, worked together to formulate the plan and that it would be up to the Senate Education Committee to come up with the best plan for schools. She then called upon Theresa Kiernan, Revisor of Statutes Office, to review the Senate Education Plan, currently known as <u>5rs 2248</u> because it had not yet been introduced in the Senate and assigned a bill number.

Ms. Kiernan informed the Committee that <u>5rs 2248</u> had not been drafted in its final form. As she began her review, she called attention to the Department of Education's explanation of the Senate Education Plan (Attachment 1). As she discussed the provisions in <u>5rs 2248</u>, she referred to a handout which compared current law with the 2006 school finance bills <u>5rs 2248</u>, <u>SB 501</u> (introduced at the request of Senator Barnett), and <u>HB 2986</u> (by Select Committee on School Finance). (Attachment 2) Upon completion of the review of <u>5rs 2248</u>, she discussed the provisions in <u>SB 501</u> and <u>HB 2986</u> as shown in the handout and responded to questions from the Committee.

Val DeFever, Schools for Quality Education, presented a school finance funding plan for 2006-2007 developed on behalf of small schools. She discussed suggested increases for per student funding, at-risk funding, special education funding, bilingual education, and all-day kindergarten. (Attachment 3) She explained that the plan was recently developed at a meeting of the members of Schools for Quality Education and the Kansas Education Coalition. The groups did not vote on the plan but came to a consensus. She commented, "As every other plan, it's great for some districts, but not so great for others."

Senator Schodorf distributed copies of a school finance plan she developed at the beginning of legislative discussions on school finance. (Attachment 4) She noted that her plan needed a little tweaking, but it was another variable to consider. She commented, "I just thought I would throw this out to you. It's not for consideration. This is just another combination. I felt strongly about all-day kindergarten, and originally we had talked about high school reform. Probably it's a little much, but that would be in the form of grants to help increase achievement in high schools and decrease the gap."

Committee discussion followed regarding the funding for the proposed plans. Senator Schodorf stated, "We have enough money to pay for year one. And for year two, it would be tight, but there would be enough money in the general fund. It's year three that is the problem. We had the same problem last year, and that's why we backed off to a one-year plan. That was part of the reason. And then the economy improved. But there are no increase in taxes proposed in this plan, and that's as far as we've gotten." Senator Lee added, "We are all hoping for a miracle in terms of revenue growth. We've seen dramatic growth in the last year. That's part of the debate that will go on the rest of this year – how are we going to fund this. But the reason that I believe both the House and the Senate are looking at three-year plans is none of us believe that we can afford to do a four or five hundred million dollar plan in one year, and we are hoping that, with the bipartisan plan and support from the Governor, perhaps we can convince the Court to at least look at a multi-year plan and figure out a way to make that work over those years." Senator Ostmeyer commented, "I guess that was a concern I had. To me, it's disingenuous to have a superintendent plan that he's got a three-year plan, but

we're really only funding maybe two years, and it's going to depend on the economy to fund the third one." Senator Lee responded, "That's the way we always have done it." Senator Vratil commented, "We need to be honest with our constituents. This is a three-year plan, but there is no guarantee that we will do years two and three. We can change this plan next year or at any time we choose. So even though it is a three-year plan, let there be no mistake, we can change it whenever we want to." Senator Schodorf added, "It's ironic. Last year when we were talking about a three-year plan, the argument was the same about year three – will it go in the red. If we had passed that three-year plan last year, our projections for this year and the next two years would require no tax increase. We could not predict that third year, and the economy improved a lot. We cannot predict the third year now. Right now, the projections are poor for the third year. So I understand what Senator Ostmeyer is saying because it's the responsible thing to ask about that – how to pay for it."

Senator Pine asked if there was data available on projected increases in state revenues. Senator Vratil noted that he had a copy of the projected budget outlook for FY 2005-FY 2009, which was prepared by the Kansas Legislative Research Department. He noted that the figures included \$75.0 million in unanticipated revenues between July 1 and November of 2005, \$125.0 million new money for K-12 schools in FY 2007, \$150.0 million in FY 2008, and \$150.0 million in FY 2009. He commented, "Keep in mind that the Senate Leadership Plan was \$200.0 million, but, when you subtract the \$75.0 million that's already in the Governor's budget, that gets you down to less than \$125.0 million. These budget projections show us finishing the 2007 fiscal year with an ending balance of 7.7 percent or \$420.0 million, which is healthy, but it shows us spending down those reserves to \$25.9 million in 2008 for a one-half percent ending balance. And in 2009, as the Chairman indicated, when the whole system crashes, it shows us going \$450.0 million in the red in the '09 fiscal year, which is a negative 7.4 percent ending balance." As requested by Committee members, copies of the projected budget outlook were distributed. (Attachment 5)

Senator Schodorf called attention to written testimony prepared by Kelli Allen and Karla Trotnic on behalf of SkillsUSA concerning support for technical education in Kansas. (Attachment 6) She explained that the students were from Labette, and they had testified in the subcommittee for the education budget on March 1 but were unable to testify in the Senate Education Committee because there was no meeting that day.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:20 p.m.

The next meeting is scheduled for March 6, 2006.

Proposed School Finance Plan by Selected Senators

Attached is a computer printout (SF6052) which provides increases in state aid within selected categorical programs. The 2.5 percent of the local option budget would be transferred to the general fund above the current budget limitations along with the difference in additional state aid the school district would receive from equalizing the 2.5 percent from 81.3 percent to 100 percent.

Listed below is a column explanation for your review as well as a table with the estimated cost of these increases.

#### **COLUMN EXPLANATION**

Column

- 1 -- September 20, 2005 FTE enrollment
- 2 -- 2006-07 Estimated \$50 increase in base state aid per pupil (\$4,257 to \$4,307)
- 3 -- 2006-07 Estimated increase in at-risk weighting from .193 to .268
- 4 -- 2006-07 Estimated high risk school districts—Adds 4.5 percent to at-risk weighting (Top five school districts in free meal percentages)
- 5 -- 2006-07 Estimated increase in special education aid to 92 percent of excess cost
- 6 -- 2006-07 Estimated mandatory 2.5 percent of local option budget required to be transferred to the general fund and is in addition to current general fund limitations
- 7 2006-07 Estimated additional local option budget state aid generated as result of equalizing 2.5 percent of local option budget which is mandatory from 81.3 percent to 100 percent
- 8 -- 2006-07 Estimated additional budget increase (Column 2 + 3 + 4 + 5 + 7)

NOTE: The mandatory LOB of 2.5 percent transferred to the General fund and the equalization aid from 81.3 percent to 100 percent are not included in computation of the LOB.

# Testimony of Kelli Allen and Karla Trotnic SkillsUSA State Officers in Recognition of Career and Technical Education In the Secondary Schools and for Career and Technical Student Organizations March 1, 2006 Topeka State Capital

Thank you for allowing us to be here with you today and tell our stories about our career and technical education in Kansas.

Our school, Labette County High School, in Southeast Kansas has had a strong tradition in training youth for the jobs and technical careers that are needed in our state as well as our nation. The mission of our school is to prepare students to become good community members and be productive members of society. When the first classes for auto mechanics were held under the tree that still stands on our campus it was the best training program available. Today our automotive technology department, although its mission is the same, continues to train students with the most current information and training available. Although the classes no longer meet under that shade tree the program continues to provide the training necessary for students to be competitive not only in the community but with global and national networking.

Good afternoon, I am Kelli Allen from Edna, Kansas. I'd like to relate my career and technical education story. I began to be interested in culinary arts when I was in eight grade. I went to a small grade school, and we did not have the opportunity to take the career and technical classes that most middle schools offer. When I entered high school, I jumped at the chance to take a culinary arts class as a freshman. As a part of the Family and Consumer Science Culinary Arts program I began to learn the proper way to cook. Not only did we learn how to cook, but we learned all aspects of running an industrial kitchen. The more I learned how to cook and bake the more I thought about being a chef when I got older. When I was a sophomore I had the opportunity to compete in culinary arts competitions through the organizations of SkillsUSA and FCCLA. SkillsUSA hosted the competitions and ran it remarkably close to how a real chef might run their kitchen. The competitions were hard and stressful. After my first competition, I realized that I love to cook for fun, but I decided I did not want to be a chef. This realization turned out to be a blessing. I had the opportunity, as a sophomore, to try out a career and see if I liked it. When I decided I did not like it well enough to be my career choice, I began to think about what I really wanted to do. I did not have to go to college and get a job to figure out that I did not like the career. Although I do not want to become a chef, I am still a part of culinary arts program and I still compete for fun and experience. These SkillsUSA competitions not only gave me a chance to review a career, but they have also taught me many employability skills. I have learned skills such as self discipline, dedication, and team work what will help me in any career that I choose. Also the training I have received in Culinary Arts is so good that if I do need a job, I am almost guaranteed a job in the food service industry. The career and technical departments at my school has served me in many different ways. It has helped me decide my future career,

it has taught me many different employability skills that will help me in the workplace, and it as given me training in an areas so that if I need a job I can get one.

Career and Technical education is no longer a local educational system, it fills a globacal need for people my age. We know that our instructors have long fought the battle of whether career and technical education should continue to be funded at the secondary level. Should the 1.5 funding be continued for the career and technical classes? If our Family and Consumer Science department had not existed I would not have had the In 1945 when the opportunity to experience the classroom training in culinary arts. domestic sciences were funded separately from other education through land grant It played an important part of colleges, as was agriculture, there was a reason. preparation of young people. In later years it became home economics and with that change the technical skills needed in our country were met with a more advanced and It expanded beyond the kitchen and nursery-as did auto updated curriculum. technology. Today Family and Consumer Science students are trained to enter the would of work learning updated information to assist in stronger families and more diverse training which meets the needs of our society. The culinary arts which I learned are not the same of those taught by earlier teachers. It is about allowing youth to experience career tracks at a young enough age that they can make valuable decisions about the direction they want to head at the post secondary level of educations while learning entry level skills that they will always have to help support their college educations ad perhaps skills that they can fall back on if faced with a difficult period in their lifetime.

Hello, I am Karla Trotnic of Parsons, Kansas. I'd like to tell you my story:

I've always wanted to work with children, and to play an important role in their life, but I didn't know exactly what I wanted to do. My 7th grade summer I started working in a local daycare, and I really enjoyed it. I continued to work there throughout the past several summers. Through working for the daycare provider, I decided that's what I wanted to do for my career. When I entered high school I immediately enrolled in the Power FACS class, knowing this would help me with my career decision. My sophomore year, I again ventured into the Early Childhood classes. However, my freshman and sophomore year my teacher wasn't really involved outside the classroom, so I didn't really know what else was out there. My junior year I again took the Early Childhood course offered that year, but this time I had a different teacher. She encouraged us to join SkillsUSA and FCCLA, which are both Career and Technical Student Organizations. I become really involved in both organizations, and being a member of these allowed me to compete in the area of my interest. The competitions were a lot of fun, and I felt like they prepared me for things I would be doing within my future career, beyond what I was learning in the classroom. I was glad for these experiences early to help me decide if this is really what I wanted to do the rest of my life. It definitely reinforced the fact that I do want to work with children the rest of my life, and I feel better prepared by being involved as a member of these CTSO's.

Although Kelli and I are both competent students the career and technical skills were not the only aspect of our program of work that has shaped our decision in career choices.

The career and technical student organization pieces has assisted us in gaining the leadership and communication skills that will continue to assist us in both our future education and our future careers. The leadership skills are extremely important for the secondary student. It trains them with organizational skills, teamwork skills, and the skill to focus on a goal, prioritize goals and form networks of support. The 1.5 funding that legislators such as yourselves have graciously continues need to know that it does make a difference. Without this funding the CTSO pieces could possibly go way, which world b tragic for all students.

In summary we'd like to share a short story of American history:

In 1803 George Rapp came to America in search of religious freedom. In 1814 he selected bottomland forest along the Wabash River as the future site of his community. He carved out a utopian niche in the wilderness. Their exacting nature produced and efficient and tidy settlement - New Harmony. New Harmony was one of the earliest planned communities in America and for a decade its balanced activities in agriculture, manufacturing and commerce met with much economic success. After a decade the swamps of the Wabash prompted Rapp to sell New Harmony to another utopian reformist, Robert Owen. Owens's had led a large labor reform in Scotland and felt that what was really needed was a place where all the great masters of educational theory and scientific discovery, a place where the "educated" could concentrate on using their advanced intelligence in math, history, chemistry and the sciences could come together to make a large contribution to making the world a better place was needed. So he invited all the scholars and intellectuals to New Harmony to further cultural advancements. His attempt to establish a utopian community failed in less than two years. What he had forgotten was that the intellectuals, those who were busy thinking about how to better the world, were good at the thinking but there was no one to do the work. They did not know how to farm, to make furniture nor build buildings or preserve food for survival. A community without a balance of thinkers and workers can not survive.

That's what career and technical education does for our state. It balances trade and industry, service and application with theory and study. There has to be a blend of the new and the old, a mix of those that follow the academic world and dream toward the next horizon and those new and emerging service and trade areas which support those new ideas and needs.

Continuing to support career and technical education at the secondary level will continue to benefit our state and country. 1.5 funding will preserve all our Career and Technical Student organizations, allowing their continued existence and prepare students like ourselves for the new and emerging needs of our state and our country.

Thank you for allowing us to share our stories and thank you for your understanding and support for career and technical education as well as the CTSO's which benefit us as citizens by balancing our community involvement and producing productive citizens trained for global cal workers.
