MINUTES OF THE HOUSE AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL RESOURCES COMMITTEE

The meeting was called to order by Chairman John Faber at 3:30 P.M. on February 5, 2007, in Room 423-S of the Capitol.

The Chairman opened the hearing on **HB 2208** - **Cloud County Fair Board**.

Danny McReynolds, a board member for the Cloud County Fair, spoke as a proponent of the bill saying that because of changes in districts, the original statute (**K.S.A. 19-2699**) has become obsolete; he noted that the bill recommends board members be appointed by the county commissioners. (<u>Attachment 1</u>). He also suggested that the term limit for board members be deleted, since obtaining board members had become increasingly difficult.

The Chairman closed the hearing on <u>HB 2208</u> and opened the hearing on <u>HB 2234</u> - <u>creating the Kansas Hunting Heritage Protection Act</u>. Chris Tymeson, Chief Attorney for the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks (KDWP), spoke in favor of the bill as "no net loss" legislation which would require that department management decisions do not result in a net loss of hunting opportunities on department-managed lands. He recommended amendments in the language so that leased lands and deed restrictions do not impede the intent of the bill. He further commented that the bill addresses only one aspect of KDWP—that of wildlife management. Since KDWP also provides park recreation, the bill should exempt park lands from the provisions of the act.

Mr. Tymeson responded to members' questions regarding the bill.

There were no opponents to the bill.

The Chairman closed the hearing on **HB 2234.**

The Chairman opened further discussion on <u>HB 2208</u>. <u>A motion was made and seconded to recommend HB 2208 as favorable for passage</u> (Motion, Representative Bowers; second, Representative Gatewood). After brief discussion, <u>the motion passed</u>. <u>A further motion was seconded and passed to place the bill on the House Consent Calendar</u> (Motion, Representative Bowers; second, Representative Gatewood).

The meeting was adjourned at 4:05 p.m. The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, February 6.

Testimony on HB 2234 regarding
Creating the Kansas Hunting Heritage Protection Act

HB 2234 seeks to create the Kansas Hunting Heritage Protection Act. The provision of the bill would be effective on publication in the statute book. The Department generally supports the provisions contained in HB 2234 but has some concerns with the language.

The Kansas Hunting Heritage Protection Act would require that department management decisions and actions not result in any net loss of hunting opportunities on department managed lands. The bill would also require a report to the Legislature on or before January 1 annually detailing this information. This bill is commonly known as "No Net Loss" legislation.

Generally, the Department owns lands and leases lands. Lands are leased from both private individuals (WIHA) and public entities. Those leased lands change annually, have some restrictions in the leases and are subject to the appropriation process. Also, some of the owned lands contain deed restrictions that could impede that which the bill seeks. The language of the bill should be amended to remove the language regarding leased lands to reflect those concerns.

In addition, the Department is a state agency serving dual purposes, that of fish and wildlife management and that of park recreation. The bill does not reflect that second purpose and therefore there should be an exemption for park lands from the provisions of the act.

In conclusion, the Department appreciates the opportunity to comment on the bill and would appreciate the opportunity to work with the proponent of the bill to modify language to address the concerns raised.
