Hearing on: <u>HB 2498 - Resident and nonresident deer permit fees increased by \$1, increase goes to the feed the hungry fund.</u>

Ray Merrick, Representative, 27th District, spoke as a proponent of this bill (<u>Attachment 1</u>). Rep. Merrick supported a similar bill in 2001 and is in full support of this bill.

Tony DeRossett, proponent, explained how the average deer can generate 50 pounds of meat, if ground into quarter-pound portions, would equal 200 portions. In this manner, 592 deer could equal 115,000 quarter-pound meals (<u>Attachment 2</u>). Some Kansas farmers experience significant crop loss due to deer grazing. In a small way, this program will alleviate part of that damage.

Ronald W. Robinson, a proponent of this bill, is the coordinator of the Columbia Avenue Church of Christ Food Pantry in Newton, Kansas (no written testimony was submitted). Mr. Robinson related the fact that families receiving food from them receive only two cans of either tuna or chicken per week and that is the only protein they have in their diet. For the most part, they are very happy to receive the venison to increase the nutrition in their diets.

Kim Douglas, Community Service Coordinator, Mid-Kansas Community Action Program, Inc. Mrs. Douglas is a strong proponent of <u>HB 2498</u> (<u>Attachment 3</u>). This program is focused on helping low-income individuals & families with emergency assistance with utilities, housing, food, and much more.

Chris Tymeson, Chief Legal Counsel, Kansas Wildlife and Parks. The Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks is opposed to this bill (<u>Attachment 4</u>). Charging one additional dollar to those who buy a deer permit is placing the burden on a very small portion of society.

Chairman Powell closed the hearing on HB 2498 at 2:45 P.M..

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

Farmers and Hunters Feeding the Hungry have been helping fellow Kansans since enabling legislation was enacted in 2001. In the six years since FHFH have been active in Kansas, hundreds of thousands have been fed and the state has seen a consistent decline in deer/auto accidents. The Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks has supported FHFH with publicity but has not been a financial backer because of departmental budget cuts. For the past two years, the KDWP has been working with FHFH to find a funding source for this exceptional organization. FHFH services our states most vulnerable with resources that are often discarded.

One deer provides enough meat to feed as many as 200 men, women and children. In Johnson County alone, 33 deer, 1 elk and 2 bison were donated, feeding roughly 7,500 meals. FHFH has over forty receiving organizations across the state that disperse the meat to the impoverished. Last year, FHFH fed 130,000 people across the state. The numbers speak for themselves.

I sponsored enabling legislation for Farmer and Hunters Feeding the Hungry in 2001 and continue to stand behind this organization today. Maryland recently enacted legislation directing a dollar from the sale of each license be used to provide donated venison to the needy through programs like FHFH. The Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks is supportive of a similar measure here. The Kansas Insurance Commissioner and five of the ten largest insurance providers in Kansas have met with FHFH and expressed their support. Five of those insurance groups have donated financial support and also support further legislation enabling FHFH. 130,000 hungry Kansans received meals this year because of the efforts of Farmers and Hunters Feeding the Hungry. The extra dollar added to the price of deer permits will more than make itself up. The value of serving a brother in need far outweighs the fiscal impact of this bill. I urge your support of HB 2498.



Trend Analyses

The KDWP has conducted this survey over a number of years, and was interested in comparing the results of selected items to past results. An item of high interest is trends in deer damage. Figure 1 shows that since 1965, with the exception of around 1975, the percentage indicating deer damage to their property has increased. The data for 1996 and 2000 are essentially the same with about 60% of the landowners claiming some damage from deer.

Figures 2 and 3 represent the rating of deer damage severity among those who indicated deer damage had occurred to property they own or operate for the 1996 and the 2000 survey years, respectively. The largest single percentage (47%) of respondents in 1996 rated deer damage as "light," but the largest single percentage (39%) in 2000 rate deer damage as "moderate." In addition, in 1996 13% rated deer damage as substantial, and this increased to 17% in 2000. Thus, there is a trend of escalating deer damage, albeit, a trend from only two data points in time.



Landowner's Opinion on the Severity of Crop Damage Caused by Deer, 1996.



Landowner's Opinion on the Severity of Crop Damage Caused by Deer, 2000.



Testimony on HB 2498 regarding Mandatory Deer Permit Fees and the Feed the Hungry Fund

HB 2498 seeks to amend K.S.A. 32-988 and the provisions of the bill would be effective on publication in the statute book. **The Department opposes the provisions contained in HB 2498**.

HB 2498 would require that the fee for every deer permit, resident and nonresident, would be increased by one dollar and the funds deposited in the Feed the Hungry Fund. The bill would generate approximately \$110,000 for the fund annually.

The Department opposes the provisions contained in the bill for several reasons. First, it is a mandatory fee imposed on members of the public who hunt deer. Currently, the Feed the Hungry Fund is funded through voluntary donations. Second, the Feed the Hungry Fund supports just one organization, the Kansas Chapter of Farmers and Hunters Feeding the Hungry. There are several benevolent organizations in existence that provide similar programs for feeding the needy and this bill provides funding for just one organization. Third, because this is a mandatory dedicated fee, it reduces future availability of Department fee increases which may be needed to sustain Department operations and programs. And finally, there are many nonprofit organizations that support wildlife and Department programs. This bill unfairly singles out and rewards only one organization with a dedicated funding source.

In conclusion, the Department appreciates the opportunity to comment on the bill and the support of the committee in opposing passage of the bill.
