Representative Powell moved to introduce legislation concerning the establishment of an upper Arkansas River Conservation Reserve enhancement program. The motion was seconded by Representative Gatewood. Motion carried.

Chair Schwartz recognized Patricia Scalia, Executive Director, Board of Indigents' Defense Services (BIDS), who presented an update on the implementation of <a href="HB 2576">HB 2576</a> (Jessica's Law) and the financial effect on the agency (<a href="Attachment 1">Attachment 1</a>). Ms. Scalia stated that the agency expects to see a sufficient increase in their caseload as a result of <a href="HB 2576">HB 2576</a> with a cost estimate of an additional \$2.6 million needed to provide defense in these cases. At this time, a Governor's Budget Amendment has not been requested. Ms. Scalia indicated that the agency did not have any carryover funds at the end of FY 2006.

The Chair recognized Robert Hecht, Shawnee County District Attorney, who presented testimony

on increased caseloads as a result of <u>HB 2576</u>. With reference to earlier testimony about the cost of obtaining data for trial, Mr. Hecht noted that during preparation for trial, all state written reports are available to a defendant. Mr. Hecht stated that <u>HB 2576</u> removes the ability of a judge to deter or decrease a sentence on a conviction from the sentencing guidelines and felt that there should be no modifications to the law because of increased caseloads or costs to the State.

Chair Schwartz recognized Helen Pedigo, Executive Director, Kansas Sentencing Commission, who presented an update on Adult Inmate Prison Population Projections (<u>Attachment 2</u>). Ms. Pedigo reported that the total prison population has decreased since FY 2004 with a population on January 1, 2007, of 8,833. Available prison capacity is 9,397 at this time. She indicated that the implementation of <u>HB 2576</u> is expected to cause an increase in prison population, with a projected capacity usage of prison space in FY 2009.

• The Committee requested additional information on the number of non-citizens who are incarcerated in the prison system at this time.

Chair Schwartz recognized Roger Werholtz, Secretary, Department of Corrections (DOC), who presented additional testimony on the Prison Population - Actual and Projected (<u>Attachment 3</u>). Mr. Werholtz stated that there are three items that drive prison population and projections at this time:

- Change in how parole violators are treated.
- New convictions under <u>HB 2576</u>.
- Probate/Post Release violators.

Secretary Werholtz noted that one issue which needs to be addressed by the 2007 Legislature is the direction or expectations for community corrections. Secretary Werholtz agreed that DOC expects to run out of prison space in FY 2009. Because of the time element for construction, the Secretary felt it is important to address the prison space issue in the near future. Secretary Werholtz noted that there are a number of renovations of existing facilities under way at this time for women's prison space that will add sufficient capacity for women for the next ten years.

Secretary Werholtz stated that options available to delay or reduce construction needs might include the possibility of cutting parole, probations and community corrections violations by 50 percent. The Secretary also noted that substance abuse treatment programs are needed by community corrections. The State is faced with building additional traditional space into the present system. The bonding authority in the Governor's budget proposal is for 4 maximum security cell houses at the El Dorado Correctional Facility which would house up to an additional 500 individuals. Secretary Werholtz felt it is important to look long-term and move the prison system toward more secure facilities for maximum security inmates.

Becky Krahl, Legislative Research Department, distributed and explained the deadline dates for House Budget Committees to report to the full Appropriations Committee on the various agency budgets (Attachment 4).

The meeting was adjourned at 10:55 a.m. The next meeting of the Committee will be held at 8:00 a.m. on January 19, 2007.

#### TESTIMONY BEFORE THE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE HB 2576 "Jessica's Law"

Madam Chairwoman and Members of the Committee.

Last session when HB 2576, more commonly known as "Jessica's Law" was introduced there was no request for a fiscal note from the State Board of Indigent's Defense Services. I expressed concern regarding that to the House Judiciary and our budget subcommittee chaired by Representative Light so some of you are already aware of this dilemma. We were asked to report back to you early this session with our projected defense cost.

"Jessica's Law" addresses sex crimes against children. Those crimes were previously sentenced as level 3, on up to level 1 for rape. Now all of these crimes become off-grid for sentencing if the child is under 14 years of age. And that sentencing is mandatory. Because of mandatory sentencing, there will be no plea agreements. Each and every one of these cases will proceed to trial.

Those trials will be difficult to defend. Expert witnesses must be hired to examine the child or the child's records and to examine the accused. Few public defenders have the necessary training and few have the requisite experience to try this level of case. More importantly, defending a person accused of committing a sex crime against a child takes a tremendous emotional toll on the public defender. Public defenders are parents too. Additional public defenders must be hired to defend the increased caseload statewide and those who take on the defense of these cases must be appropriately paid.

A review of the Sentencing Commissions Annual Report for 2005 shows that sentencing occurred as follows:

Agg Criminal Sodomy with a Child	62
Agg Indecent Liberties	310
Sexual Exploitation	26
Rape	127
Total	554

That number is not likely to decrease. Adding that number of cases to defend at trial will require an additional 7 public defenders, expert costs ranging from \$4,000 - \$8,000 per case and attorney training of \$14,000 annually.












### **New Court Commitments**












### **Projected Drug Inmate Prison Population**

## FY 2007 Actual and Projected Total Prison Population




### End-of-month Inmate Population: FY 2007 to Date\*


## Components of the End-of-month Population Under Post-incarceration Management: FY 2007 to Date\*
