AN ACT creating the Kansas national bio and agro defense facility interagency working group act.

41 42 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the Kansas national bio and agro defense facility interagency working group act. The purpose of this act is to create an interagency working group to support and assist the United States department of homeland security in the national environmental policy act process to conduct an environmental impact statement on any site in Kansas selected by the department of homeland security for the location of a national bio and agro defense facility and to coordinate efforts among all affected state, county and local agencies to further the state's interest in the siting of a national bio and agro defense facility in Kansas.

Sec. 2. (a) There is hereby established the Kansas national bio and agro defense facility interagency working group.

(b) The working group shall consist of the following members ex officio: The secretary of health and environment, the secretary of commerce or designee, the secretary of administration or designee, the secretary of agriculture or designee, the secretary of revenue or designee, the attorney general or designee, the state board of regents or designee, the mayor of the city of Manhattan or designee, the chairperson of the Leavenworth county board of commissioners or designee and the superintendent of the Kansas highway patrol or designee.

(c) The secretary of health and environment shall serve as chairperson of the working group, and the working group may elect a vice-chairperson from among the members of the working group.

(d) All appointments of designees must be made and submitted to the Kansas bioscience authority no more than 30 days after enactment of this act.

Sec. 3. (a) The department of health and environment shall coordinate all acts performed by the members of the working group.

(b) The working group shall:

(1) Establish a support network among the members of the working group to facilitate the efficient and timely completion of all acts to be

Dear Madam Chair:

I appreciated the opportunity to meet with you and Representative Tafanelli last week to brief you on KPERS funding status and the proposed plan design for future employees.

During our meeting, we briefly discussed SB 30 and the impact of the amendments to this bill that provide for earlier debt payments on the pension obligation bonds. As part of that discussion, you requested that we model two alternatives of one-time State employer contributions to KPERS to assist toward the funding of the KPERS School unfunded liability. These alternatives were a one-time contribution of \$50 million and a one-time contribution of \$80 million in FY 2008.

Attached is a summary of the projected impact of these accelerated employer contribution alternatives. This level of one-time contributions only modestly improves the date at which the School group is projected to reach the actuarially-required-contribution(ARC) rate. However, over the remaining funding period, they both result in substantial projected savings in State employer contributions. The \$50 million contribution is projected to save \$218 million in future employer contributions and the \$80 million alternative is projected to save \$343 million.
