MINUTES OF THE HOUSE COMMERCE AND LABOR COMMITTEE

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Steve Brunk at 9:11 A.M. on February 21, 2007 in Room 231-N of the Capitol.

Representative Goico commented that we have been working on this for several years and the consumer is not protected at this time and suggests that we not table HB 2315 Home inspectors Competency and financial responsibility.

The Chairman said that yesterdays meeting did end with a motion to table this bill. He offered an explanation that the industry has been working on this bill for two or three years with the Realtors, professional engineers, home builders, manufacturers, housing industry and trial lawyers. He would like an up or down vote. There are questions that could be answered in the Senate. If it fails we would like to know what your concerns are about this bill so that the people in the industry can understand your concerns and address them in the next go around. This is a consumer protection bill.

Representative Grange withdrew his motion to table **HB 2315**.

Representative Goico said that \$10,000 was not enough to protect the public and made a motion to change the liability to \$250,000. The motion died for lack of a second.

Representative Humerickhouse made a motion to pass **HB 2315** favorably as amended, seconded by Representative Sharp.

Representative Grant asked if there was a similar Senate bill. The Chairman was not aware of any bill in the Senate. Representative Grant said he still thinks that it should not be sent out.

The question was called and votes were counted by raising hands. The yeas were 6 and nays were 9. The motion failed.

The Chairman opened the hearing on SB 83 Employment security law; contribution rates.

Jeff Glendening, Vice President of Political Affairs, The Kansas Chamber testified as a proponent of <u>SB 83</u> (Attachment 1).

Terry Leatherman, The Kansas Chamber explained the bill. Basically you have two bills before you. One a graduated bill and the other a 40% across the board reduction. This is kind of a marriage of the two. It creates a 100% reduction for Rate Groups 1 through 5, for Rate Groups 6 through 8 a tax reduction of 50% and a 40% reduction for Rate Groups 29 through 51. **SB 83** provides stability and eliminates the yo-yo effect. There would not be a shortage in the fund. We don't want to continue to bloat the fund. Meeting the deadline would allow the business community to take advantage of the reductions this year rather than waiting for next year.

The Chairman asked several groups present in the meeting if they were in agreement with this bill. The KCCI, the NFIB and Department of Labor were all in agreement.

Representative Pauls asked if everyone was on board with the amendments to <u>SB 83.</u> All the departments indicated that they were in agreement with the amendments.

Representative Teitze asked if the numbers were the same on the two bills. Terry indicated that the amounts in <u>SB 83</u> were a little higher.

Wayne Michael, Director of Unemployment Insurance, Department of Labor, explained that the Advisory Committee endorsed this bill and urged its quick passage so that they would have time to refigure the rates for 2007 and publish them to the employers by March 15 of this year.

Representative Pauls made a motion to work the bill today, seconded by Representative Goico. The motion passed by unanimous voice vote.

Representative Goico made a motion to amend the existing bill, seconded by Representative Grant. The motion passed by unanimous voice vote.

Representative Goico made a motion to pass the bill favorably as amended, seconded by Representative Gordon. The motion passed by unanimous voice vote.

The Chairman called attention to <u>HB 2379 Employee misconduct based upon absence or failure to notify of intent to be absent.</u>

Representative Pauls said that she did receive a copy of the court case and still believes that it makes a change in policy and not just a technical change. She made a motion to refer the bill to the council, seconded by Representative Garcia. There being no discussion the question was called and passed by voice vote.

The Chairman adjourned the meeting at 9:51 A.M.

The Kansas Employment Security Trust Fund balance is currently high, with over \$600 million. This bill will allow Unemployment Compensation Tax relief for positive balance employers without jeopardizing the integrity of the unemployment compensation trust fund, which is where unemployment compensation benefits are paid equal to qualified workers who lose their jobs through no fault of their own.

The 51.829 employers who contribute more to the fund than they are charged deserve this relief. It is also important to note that employers are the sole contributors to this fund.

Amended tax relief for specified rate groups is as follows:

Rate Group	<u>Tax Relief</u>
1,40 5	100%
6 2-25 28	50%
29 26-51	40%

As a measure of security for the employees of Kansas businesses, the tax will be reinstated if the fund falls below a threshold designed to provide a comfortable cushion against a worst case scenario of unemployment.

This tax relief will no doubt allow employers to invest in their businesses, creating new jobs and in the end, stimulate the Kansas economy.
