(Attachment 2) This included what funds are utilized for, National and Kansas funding received each year, the funding allocation process, the distribution of funds, and regional projects.

Chairman Myers recognized Representative Goico who had two bill introductions for the Committee. The first is regarding emergency planning and communities right to know.

Representative Goico presented the next bill which is a reintroduction of <u>HB 2961</u> which would grant guard and security officers law enforcement authority.


Authority for extraordinary powers during disasters in Kansas:

State Declared Disasters

 Senior elected official at state & county level may exercise extraordinary powers granted by the electorate and codified in laws & statutes (e.g., KSA 48-924) during the emergency response phase

- Day-to-Day Operations

- Decentralized government policy decisions and operations among several agencies, boards and commissions.
- Includes programs that promote actions in the prevention/mitigation, preparedness and recovery phases



Day to Day Operations

- Homeland Security operations and programs are decentralized among several agencies
 - Require interagency cooperation and coordination:
 - Governor's Council on Emergency Preparedness and Response
 - · Kansas Hazard Mitigation Team
 - · Homeland Security Working Group
 - · Communications Interoperability Team
 - · Geospatial Steering Group
 - · Governor's Homeland Security Council

Brief Program Overview



- Funding for HSGP began in FFY 99: 8th year
- Purpose is to improve the state's ability to prevent, respond to and recover from an act of terrorism









Shift in Funding Distribution
