## MINUTES OF THE JOINT HOUSE AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL RESOURCES AND SENATE AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Mark Taddiken at 7:30 a.m. on Thursday, February 1, 2007 in the Old Supreme Court Room (313-S) of the Capitol.

Chairman Taddiken introduced Congressman Jerry Moran.

Congressman Moran said he was in the state for sixty-nine (69) town hall meetings.

He mentioned that President Bush had introduced the federal farm bill yesterday. Congressman Moran stated that the farm bill is-significant to Kansas because the state's economy is significantly affected by agriculture. He also said the average age for a farmer in Kansas is 59 years old. He had a 45 minute briefing with Secretary Johannes regarding the proposed federal farm bill. The federal budget will be adopted in March or April. At that time it will be known if the necessary dollars are in the budget for the programs in the farm bill. The farm bill includes energy conservation, renewable fuels, CREP, cellulosic for biofuels and nutrition. Water usage for irrigation and ethanol production is included in the bill.

Another issue in the farm bill is the Arkansas River area in CREP which takes land out of production and uses for grassland.

Congressman Moran then took questions from the Committee.

Senator Taddiken noted that there was no mention of commodities in a presentation he heard. It was necessary to ask specifically about commodities.

Congressman Moran said that the U.S.A. meets 60% of the energy needs from unstable countries. There were questions from Committee members regarding CREP, rural economic development, crop insurance, increasing the demand for farm products and not being able to sell state inspected meat across state lines. The U.S.D.A. passes regulations which puts the small meat processors out of business and then complains about large locker plants.

Senator Pine thanked Congressman Moran for supporting the Practicality in Education Act. Congressman Moran expressed some concerns regarding the teacher shortage in Kansas. He also spoke regarding the No Child Left Behind Act.

A final question was asked regarding a ban on the slaughter of horses.

The meeting adjourned at 8:25 a.m.
