Honorable members of the HOUSE AG AND NATURAL RESOURCES BUDGET COMMITTEE subcommittee on Sub. SB 453. Establishing the Kansas Commission on Rural Policy

I am disappointed I cannot be with you today as you consider this bill. I want to offer some quick thoughts to consider as you determine whether to invest additional state funds in creating another commission/agency/regional staff serving rural Kansas.

And I'd like to suggest that the funds to create this Commission and staff might be better used to fund real economic development and community development activity in rural communities. Perhaps the administration of these funds could be handled by the other regional staffs that have been charged over time with rural policy and program, including:

- Regional Small Business Development Centers (10 of these are now operational)
- In State Business Development offices (6 of these exist today)
- Workforce Centers (There are three of these)
- Kansas Entrepreneurial Center (Serves the state from WSU headquarters)
- Kansas Rural Development Council
- Kansas Rural Center
- Huck Boyd National Institute for Rural Development (Manhattan)
- USDA Rural Development (Regional and area offices statewide)
- And the newly formed "Offices of Rural Opportunity" (Four offices with staff)

With which other organizations will the Office of Rural Opportunity partner?

Because it is housed within the Kansas Department of Commerce, the Office of Rural Opportunity will have access to all of the Department's long-standing community and economic development services and resources. The Office will also partner with groups such as the Kansas Small Business Development Center, the Kansas Department of Agriculture and NetWork Kansas to provide comprehensive assistance to rural communities.

I live and work in rural Kansas, in housing and community development, through Homestead Affordable Housing and many existing organizations. We have assisted nearly 700 rural homebuyers in 155 rural Kansas communities in purchasing their first home. 129 of these communities had populations of less than 5,000.

I was a member of the Kansas Rural Life Task Force. Our members worked on many issues and ideas which became agency agenda, for existing programs with neither the funding or staff competency to make a difference. But the Task Force birthed the **Office of Rural Opportunity** model which is still being staffed; creating another layer of professionals to help rural communities without the resources to do so.

NRDP Structure

The National Rural Development Partnership (NRDP) works to strengthen rural America through collaboration and cooperation among its partners. The NRDP brings together partners from local, state, tribal, and federal governments, as well as from the for-profit and nonprofit private sector. The NRDP has three main components:



State Rural Development Councils

There are currently 37 <u>State Rural Development Councils</u> (SRDCs). The State Councils form the primary components of the Partnership and bring together key rural players in their states to address critical community concerns and to respond to fast-breaking opportunities. State Councils are responsible for creating their own mission, structure, operating guidelines, and action plan. Each Council hires a senior-level executive director who works with the Council leadership.

In addition to facilitating coordination and collaboration on a state level, SRDCs also work through a national network to affect major change on a regional, and oftentimes national level. SRDCs are a strong, vibrant connection between the government and the population and has been utilized to both spread new and updated information on government and private sector programs and opportunities. In addition to information dissemination, SRDCs through their success stories and other publications and work are also ideal vehicles for feedback to the national office. The Council provides:


- A framework for public and private resources to promote rural development;

Brief

Sub. for SB 453, with the Subcommittee's proposed amendments, would create the Kansas Commission on Rural Policy; however, the bill would not establish a Division of Rural Development or deputy secretary position within the Department of Commerce. The Commission would be advisory in nature and not administer any grant program. The Commission would be tasked with developing recommendations for rural economic development based on four pillars:

- Fostering leadership;
- Youth retention;
- Promote rural entrepreneurship through the coordination of existing programs; and
- Wealth retention and generation.

The Commission would have a Board of Directors consisting of nine voting members, subject to confirmation by the Senate, each of which would have outstanding knowledge and leadership in one of the following areas:

- Agriculture;
- Oil and gas;
- Aviation;
- Finance and banking;
- Tourism:
- Any other primary, job creating, value added business sector;
- Fostering leadership;
- Encouraging wealth retention and generation;
- Developing entrepreneurship;
- Retaining youth in rural communities; or
- Healthcare.

The Governor would appoint three members, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and President of the Senate would each appoint two members, and the minority leaders of the House and Senate would each appoint one member. Each member would serve a four-year term. The Secretary of Commerce, the Secretary of Agriculture and the President of Kansas, Inc. would serve as *ex officio* members of the Board.

The Commission would be charged with developing recommendations for improving rural development efforts, but would not duplicate or compete with the functions of other state or federal agencies. The Commission would be authorized to hire an executive director if funding is derived from either a legislative appropriation or a grant from some other source. The agency would provide minimal assistance. During its first year, the Commission would:

 Develop a comprehensive plan for the Commission, which would include an evaluation of current programs, to be presented to the State Legislature during the 2009 Session; and

 Develop partnerships with federal, state, and private entities providing programs in rural areas.

The Commission also would be charged with:

- Developing and recommending a strategic mission for the Office of Rural Opportunity;
- <u>Being a centralized point of contact, connecting organizations and agencies with available resources; and</u>
- Reviewing existing programs and recommending improvements.

Background

The bill was introduced at the request of the Kansas Farm Bureau. At the hearing before the Senate Committee on Commerce, the bill was supported by Senate President Steve Morris and representatives from the Kansas Farm Bureau, the Pottawatomie County Economic Development Corporation, the Kansas Association of Counties, the Center for Rural Entrepreneurship, St. Francis Community Services, Sunflower Electric Power Corporation, the League of Kansas Municipalities, and the Western Kansas Rural Economic Development Alliance.

The bill was opposed in writing by the Department of Agriculture and the Kansas Downtown Development Association. The Kansas Small Business Development Center, Kansas Center for Entrepreneurship, Kansas Preservation Alliance, Northwest Kansas Planning and Development Commission, Kansas Small Business Business Development Center, and Kansas, Inc. submitted neutral testimony. The Department of Commerce also submitted neutral testimony and proposed amendments.

The bill, as introduced, would create the Kansas Commission on Rural Policy. The Senate Committee on Commerce adopted a substitute bill that would create the Commission with more detailed responsibilities, establish qualifications for membership on the Commission's Board of Directors, clarify reimbursement amounts for Board members attending meetings, and create the Division of Rural Development headed by the Deputy Secretary of Rural Development within the Department of Commerce.

The fiscal note prepared by the Division of Budget indicated the fiscal impact from the enactment of the introduced bill could not be determined because several factors, including the number of Board meetings, staff costs, and the amount of funds to finance the grant fund are still unknown.



- 13 (b) (1) The Kansas commission on rural policy shall be governed by a board of directors consisting of 12 members. 14
 - (2) Nine members of the board of directors shall be voting members appointed as follows: Three shall be appointed by the governor, two shall be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, two shall be appointed by the president of the senate, one shall be appointed by the minority leader of the house of representatives and one shall be appointed by the minority leader of the senate. Each member appointed to the board of directors shall be recognized for outstanding knowledge and leadership in one of the following business sectors or key areas:

 - oil and gas; (B)
- 25 (C)aviation;
- 26 (D)finance and banking; 27
 - (\mathbf{E}) tourism;
- 28 any other primary, job creating, value added business sector;

No such termination shall affect the validity of any action taken by such member of the board before such termination.
 - (4) The terms of the nine voting members first appointed to the board of directors shall be as follows: Four years for members appointed by the governor, three years for members appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives and the president of the senate and two years for mem-


bers appointed by the minority leader of the house of representatives and the minority leader of the senate. Members of the first board shall be appointed by September 1, 2008. Subsequent terms of all voting members appointed to the board shall be for four years.

- (5) The other three members of the board of directors shall serve ex officio: The secretary of commerce, the secretary of agriculture and the president of Kansas, Inc. Each ex officio member of the commission may designate an officer or employee of the state agency or organization of the ex officio member to serve on the commission in place of the ex officio member. The ex officio members of the commission, or their designees, shall be nonvoting members of the commission and shall provide information and advice to the commission.
- (c) The Kansas commission on rural policy board of directors shall elect annually from among its voting members a chairperson, vice-chairperson and secretary. Five voting members of the board shall constitute a quorum and the affirmative vote of five members shall be necessary for any action taken by the board. No vacancy in the membership of the board shall impair the right of a quorum to exercise all the rights and perform all the duties of the board.
- (d) Members of the commission attending any meeting of the commission or any subcommittee meeting authorized by the commission shall be paid amounts as provided in K.S.A. 75-3223, and amendments thereto.
- (e) All resolutions and orders of the Kansas commission on rural policy board of directors shall be recorded and authenticated by the signature of the secretary or a person designated by the secretary. The book of resolutions, orders, minutes of open meetings, annual reports and annual financial statements of the commission shall be public records as defined by K.S.A. 45-215 et seq., and amendments thereto. All public records shall be subject to regular audit as provided in K.S.A. 46-1106, and amendments thereto.
- Sec. 3. (a) The Kansas commission on rural policy shall develop recommendations for community-based programming and funding in the following key areas: Fostering leadership; encouraging wealth retention and generation; developing entrepreneurship and retaining youth in rural communities. The commission shall not compete with, duplicate or assume the responsibilities or functions of existing federal or state funded programs and organizations, in delivering services related to the above key areas, but will design, collaborate with and optimize the activities of such other agencies in a comprehensive effort.
 - (b) Prior to July 1, 2009, the commission shall perform the following:
- (1) Submit recommendations to the secretary of commerce regarding the appointment of the deputy secretary of rural development:
 - (2) hire such support staff as deemed necessary;

- (f) The commission is hereby authorized to engage legal counsel, expert advisers or executive staff to carry out the duties of the commission. Compensation for such counsel, advisers or staff shall be determined by the commission within the limits of available funds.
- (g) The commission is hereby authorized to accept grants, gifts, bequests and other financial or in-kind contributions.
- (h) To facilitate the organization and start-up of the commission, Kansas, Inc. shall provide administrative assistance until such time as the commission has resources to provide staffing on its own. In no event shall such assistance continue beyond September 1, 2010.

- (d) The commission shall adopt policies and procedures regarding the application procedure, grant periods, grant evaluation and reporting criteria, the filing of forms that support the request for grant awards, the method and manner of payment of grant funds and any other matter necessary to carry out the provisions of this act.
- (e) For the purposes of this section and section 5, and amendments thereto, the term "rural community development activities" means those activities and programs that focus on fostering leadership, encouraging wealth retention and generation, developing entrepreneurship and attracting and retaining youth in rural communities.
- Sec. 5. (a) Each recipient of grant funds pursuant to this act shall submit to the Kansas commission on rural policy, at a time determined by the commission, a performance and evaluation report concerning the use of grant funds made available under section 4, and amendments thereto, together with an assessment by the recipient of the relationship of such use to the rural community development activities identified in the recipient's statement under subsection (b) of section 4, and amendments thereto. The recipient's report shall indicate an evaluation of the rural community development activities, the nature of and reasons for any changes in such activities and an evaluation of the use of the grant funds for such activities. The commission shall, at least on an annual basis, make such reviews and audits as may be necessary or appropriate to determine:
- (1) Whether the recipient has carried out its rural community development activities in a timely manner;
- (2) whether the recipient has carried out those activities and its certifications in accordance with the requirements of sections 4 and 5, and amendments thereto; and
- (3) whether the recipient has a continuing capacity to carry out those activities in a timely manner.
- (b) Insofar as they relate to grant funds provided under section 4, and amendments thereto, the financial transactions of recipients may be audited under such policies and procedures as may be adopted by the commission. The commission shall report the final results of any audits

conducted pursuant to this section to the state legislature during the legislative session immediately following the audit.

Sec. 6. (a) There is hereby established in the state treasury the rural community development grant program fund. All moneys credited to such fund shall be used only for the awarding of grants pursuant to seetions 4 and 5, and amendments thereto. Such fund shall be administered in accordance with the provisions of sections 4 and 5, and amendments thereto, and the provisions of appropriation acts.

- (b) All expenditures from the rural community development grant program fund shall be made in accordance with appropriation acts upon warrants of the director of accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouchers approved by the executive director of the Kansas commission on rural policy.
- (e) On or before the 10th of each month, the director of accounts and reports shall transfer from the state general fund to the rural community development grant program fund interest earnings on:

- (2) the net earnings rate for the pooled money investment portfolio for the preceding month.
- See. 7. (a) There is hereby established within and as a part of the department of commerce a division of rural development, the head of which shall be the deputy secretary of rural development. Under the supervision of the secretary of commerce, the deputy secretary of rural development shall administer the division of rural development. The seeretary of commerce shall appoint the deputy secretary of rural development and the deputy secretary shall serve at the pleasure of the secretary. The deputy secretary of rural development shall be in the unclassified service under the Kansas civil service act and shall receive an annual salary fixed by the secretary of commerce and approved by the governor.
- (b) Prior to appointing the deputy secretary of rural development pursuant to subsection (a), or any successor deputy secretary of rural development, the secretary of commerce shall consider any recommendations regarding appointments to such office that may be submitted to the secretary by the Kansas commission on rural policy established by section 2, and amendments thereto.
- (e) As part of the duties and responsibilities of the office, the deputy secretary of rural development shall oversee and direct the operations of the office of rural opportunity.
