Layout of Kansas Juvenile Correctional Complex


Kansas Juvenile Correctional Complex

The House Appropriations Committee departed the Capitol Building at 8:15 a.m. to tour the Kansas Juvenile Correctional Complex and the Topeka Juvenile Correctional Facility (<u>Attachment 1</u>). Russell Jennings, Commissioner and Dennis Casarona, Deputy Commissioner of the Kansas Juvenile Justice Authority, welcomed the group and introduced staff. The group was given a tour of the Kansas Juvenile Correctional Complex and the Shawnee building on the Topeka Juvenile Correctional Facility campus.

Mr. Jennings stated that one of the main buildings on the Topeka Juvenile Correctional Facility campus will be renovated to provide space for the administrative offices of the Juvenile Justice Authority (JJA). Several of the other buildings are being used for industrial programs for the residents of the Complex. It is anticipated that at least two of the buildings will be razed. Several of the other buildings are being used for training facilities for correctional officers. Consideration is being given to renovating resident hall space to provide housing for trainees from other parts of the State or other juvenile correctional facilities while they are participating in training classes.

The group returned to the Capitol at 10:45 a.m. The next meeting of the Committee will be held on February 6, 2008.


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KANSAS JUVENILE CORRECTIONAL COMPLEX


