#### MINUTES OF THE HOUSE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Clay Aurand at 9:15 A.M. on February 6, 2008 in Room 783 of the Docking State Office Building.

Chairman Aurand recognized Representative Phelps who requested a 'point of personal privilege'. Representative Phelps advised the surgery for Representative Crow had gone well and she would be at home recuperating for a short period of time.

Reginald L. Robinson, President & CEO, Kansas Board of Regents, gave a 2008 Legislative and Public Policy overview to Committee members. President Robinson also told Committee members that state university enrollment tops 90,000 students for the first time in the state's history. (Attachment 1)

A question and answer session occurred during and after the presentation.

Diane Lindeman, Director of Student Financial Assistance, Kansas Board of Regents, gave an overview of the state-funded student financial assistance program to Committee members. Special emphasis was made to the Kansas Teacher Service Scholarships program which legislators were instrumental in streamlining during last year's legislative session. (Attachment 2)

A question and answer session followed the presentation.

#### **Introduction of Bills:**

Representative Colloton introduced a bill to extend the coordinated school health program. The Committee agreed by consensus.

Representative Colloton introduced a redraft of a bill regarding excess Special Education costs. The Committee agreed by consensus.

Representative Craft introduced a bill to provide parity for school psychologists with a National Board for Professional Teaching Standards certification. The Committee agreed by consensus.

Representative Aurand introduced a bill to allow school districts to partner with universities to provide training for provisionally licensed teachers. The Committee agreed by consensus.

Representative Aurand introduced a bill to legitimatize the American Board for the Certification of Teaching Excellence (ABCTE). The Committee agreed by consensus.

Representative Aurand introduced a bill to stop 'course creep' in teacher education programs by capping the number of courses required. The Committee agreed by consensus.

The Chairman advised Committee members the Education Committee would be returning to their original meeting place of the Old Supreme Court Room, 313-S.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:55 AM. The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, February 12, 2008.





- Board's Adult Education Program receives competitive federal grant (\$500,000) to fund the "Ready For College: Adult Education Transitions Program" an adult education program that focuses on helping adult learners transition to postsecondary education programs.

- Thanks to funding made available by the Legislature, in FY07, the Board's Nursing Shortage Initiative facilitated the enrollment of 507 additional nursing students across the state, exceeding the Legislature's goal by 257 students or 103%.

  - ➤ Board approves \$20 million in no-interest loans for Washburn University, Community Colleges, & Technical Colleges (48 projects financed).

#### **TEACHER SHORTAGE:**

- The 2007 Legislature enacted a new Kansas Teacher Service Scholarship Program which streamlined four existing teacher scholarships into one comprehensive teacher scholarship program.
- The four previous scholarship programs, during Academic Year 2006-07, totaled \$777,744 and allowed 248 students to be awarded.
- Under the new program, a total of \$1.4 million in scholarship assistance was available. The Board received 815 applications for Academic Year 2007-08 and was able to award 463 students an 87% increase over last year.
- This merit-based, service obligation scholarship program provides financial assistance of up to \$2,500/semester to students and currently-licensed teachers pursuing bachelor's or master's degree programs. Students must pursue endorsement and/or licensure or master's degrees in hard-to-fill disciplines (special education, mathematics, science, music, foreign language, and English as a second language), or plan to teach in an identified underserved geographic area of the state of Kansas (USD 501 Topeka, USD 500 Kansas City, USD 259 Wichita, and State Board of Education District #5 the western 1/3 of Kansas).

# FY 2009 HIGHER EDUCATION BUDGET REQUEST






The Board's FY09 budget request contained four important components:

- 1) A Higher Education Price Index (HEPI) increase on the operating grant base to maintain the spending power of that base.
- 2) An increment above that HEPI-driven request intended to provide state universities with some of the resources necessary to close gaps that exist between them and their peers on faculty salaries, operating expenses, etc.
- Funding to support proposals that the Board embraced as compelling opportunities to invest in programs/initiatives that would produce meaningful benefits for the people of Kansas (Investment Package).
- 4) Important additional funding to build on the important Legislative commitment / down payment to help the state universities address critical deferred building maintenance needs.

#### **INVESTMENT PACKAGE\*:**

A \$20.1 million state priority "investment package" was included in the Board's FY 2009 budget request. Of the 11 projects contained in the package, one was included in the Governor's budget recommendations. If ultimately funded, the following projects would produce measurable outcomes and results for Kansas:

- Increase the Supply of Math & Science Teachers (ESU)
  - Create cooperative math & science programs with community colleges and develop a summer bioscience institute for math & science teachers.
- "U-Kan" Teach / Undergraduate Certificate Programs (KU)
  - Implement new pathways to teacher licensure to address critical teacher shortages in Kansas.



#### Create School of Construction (PSU)

- Address critical workforce shortages and increased demand for skilled graduates in this field.

#### Expand School of Pharmacy (KU)

- Address the state's looming pharmacist shortage by enhancing Wichita and Lawrence pharmacy programs (*Included in Governor's FY09 Budget Recommendations*).

#### Work-Based Learning (WSU)

- Double the number of students involved in work-based learning programs.

#### Workforce Development Shortages (KU)

- Increase graduate output in nursing, physical therapy, other allied health professions, business, engineering, and technology.



#### Current Workforce Needs (WSU)

- Significantly increase the number of graduates in the areas of accounting, engineering, nursing/other health professions, and teaching.

#### Create Professional Science Master's Degree Program (FHSU)

- Establish the first PSM program in Kansas and in the region.
