Bill Introduction:

HB 2049 - Hunter safety orientation programs in schools.

Proponent:

Jordan Austin, Kansas State Liaison, National Rifle Association, (<u>Attachment 2</u>) presented testimony in support of <u>HB 2049</u>, and noted that this legislation requires Hunter Education be offered as a two-week elective course, not mandatory, in grades 6-12, at no cost to the state.

Tom Krebs, Governmental Relations Specialist, Kansas Association of School Boards, (<u>Attachment 3</u>) stated that <u>HB 2049</u> does not mandate a school district teaching a hunter safety class and suggested revised language, "No district would be required to offer such a class."

Questions were asked and comments were made by members of the Committee.

Sue Storm, Legislative Coordinator, State Board of Education, (<u>Attachment 4</u>) reported that <u>HB 2049</u> would require the State Board of Education to develop both a hunter safety orientation program and a curriculum on hunter safety for grades 6-12.

The Kansas Corporation Commission would respectfully request the House Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee to introduce the following legislation. The proposal amends KSA 55-165 dealing with maintenance of information on wells. The proposed language would require operators to place identification on every well. The information on the identification tag would be the name of the well and its location. This is an important part of building a state-wide well inventory program. (Draft language attached)

Thomas A. Day Legislative Liaison KSA 55-165. Well identification and maintenance of information on wells. (a) Any person who operates or is responsible for the care and control of any oil, gas, injection, disposal, cathodic protection, natural gas storage injection or withdrawal or CO₂ injection or withdrawal well shall place a well identification sign on or near each well.

- (b) The state corporation commission shall adopt rules and regulations specifying the information to be contained on the well identification sign, and the size and location of such sign.
- <u>(c)</u> The state corporation commission shall create and maintain a data base of all oil and gas wells in existence in this state. The data base shall include the location of each well, name, address and other information relevant to the identity of the operator of the well.

House Bill 2049, introduced by this committee, will prove to be an enormous benefit to the people and the wildlife in Kansas. This legislation requires Hunter Education to be offered as a two-week elective component of the public school curriculum in grades 6-12. The National Rifle Association fully supports this legislation.

HB 2049 will encourage more of the state's children to preserve Kansas' rich sporting heritage. In particular, it will bring the benefits of hunting and firearms safety to teenagers in urban areas who otherwise might have never been exposed to proper safety procedures.

Over the last decade, the number of hunters in the Sunflower State has declined by 10 percent. Through their license fees and excise taxes paid on equipment, hunters pay the way for wildlife and habitat preservation. Regulated hunting has been responsible for flourishing populations of deer and wild turkey -- animals rarely seen in the state only a half-century ago. If hunting dies out, it is likely that wildlife will too.

Hunter Education in public schools will bring the students into the woods where they can learn about nature and engage in physical and mental exercise. They will earn a sense of accomplishment associated with providing nutritious food for themselves and their families. This taste of unadulterated pride will drive them to achieve in every other aspect of life.

Kansas' hunters generate \$607 million a year in economic activity and are responsible for maintaining 11,400 jobs throughout the state. Ensuring that there are future generations of hunters will keep this enormous economic engine steaming along in a state that cannot afford to see jobs lost.



Mr. Chair, Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on **HB 2049**. KASB is neutral on the bill, but there are few points we would like to be taken into consideration.

The bill does not mandate a school district teaching a hunter safety class, which is aligned with our long-standing policy of curriculum decisions being ones that lie with the local board.

It does, however, mandate, the Kansas State Department of Education to create one. KASB believes, given the adverse impact state budget cuts could have on the agency and its ability to meet current needs, it makes little sense to divert the agency from meeting its core mission of working with districts to improve student achievement.

It also contains ambiguous language that could create issues for the local board. The bill might be better with revised language that simply stated "No district would be required to offer such a class."

The State Board has not taken a position on this proposal, but likely will at the next Board meeting on February 10-11.

Developing a curriculum doesn't occur in a couple of afternoons with a member of KSDE staff and a representative from Wildlife and Parks brainstorming what could/should be included in such a course. It involves meeting with various groups in order to be sure the program is research-based, age appropriate, and effective.

Testimony on HB 2049 regarding Hunter Safety Orientation Programs in Schools To The House Committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources

HB 2049 seeks to create a new statute related to hunter education requirements. The provisions of the bill would be effective on publication in the statute book. **The Department supports the principles contained in HB 2049 but would suggest modifications to the language prior to passage of any bill**.

The Department currently has a Hunter Education Program developed for use in the school system, called appropriately "Hunter Education in Our Schools." Individual school districts or schools themselves participate in the program on a voluntary basis. The program includes firearms safety training as an element in the course, as well as a multitude of other topics such as first aid, home firearms safety, wildlife management, archery, ethics, water safety and game laws, just to name a few. The program is taught by instructors certified by the Department and the costs are one hundred percent reimbursable.

Rather than creating a new program under this bill, which creates unnecessary and duplicative bureaucracy, potentially jeopardizes the currently existing program and could change the federal aid issues related to reimbursement, the Department suggests that an opportunity to modify the language with the proponents and implement the currently existing program into the bill.

The Department appreciates the opportunity to address the bill.
