Introduction of Proposed Legislation

Senator McGinn moved to introduce legislation concerning Kansas Commission on Rural Policy (9rs0970). The motion was seconded by Senator Teichman. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Senator Kelly moved to introduce legislation concerning unemployment law compliance (9rs0977). The motion was seconded by Senator Lee. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Senator Emler moved to introduce legislation pertaining to school districts and the federal stimulus funds (SCR 1616). The motion was seconded by Senator Teichman. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Confirmation Hearing

Chairman Emler opened the confirmation hearings for reappointments of board members to the Kansas Health Policy Authority Board:

Joe Lee Tilghman, to serve a term of four years which shall expire March 15, 2012 (<u>Attachment 1</u>); Garen Lorimer Cox, to serve a term of four years which shall expire March 15, 2012 (<u>Attachment 2</u>); E. J. "Ned" Holland, Jr., to serve a term of four years which shall expire March 15, 2012 (<u>Attachment 3</u>).

Senator Schmidt moved to table the confirmations until March 18, 2009. The motion was seconded by Senator Vratil. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Hearing on HB 2222 - State agencies; collections of fee, licenses, taxes, surcharges, discounts.

Jill Wolters, Revisor, explained that <u>HB 2222</u>, as amended by House Committee, authorizes any state department, agency, commission or authority which is obligated by statute to collect any fees, to impose a surcharge or discount of not to exceed 5.0 percent of the amount of such fees in order to enhance the efficiency of the agency (<u>Attachment 4</u>).

Responding to a question from the Committee, Ms. Wolters stated that the legislation allows any agency to impose a surcharge and state how the increase will enhance their efficiency.

Daniel Yoza, Revisor, explained that the legislation is an attempt to provide a discount or incentive to encourage electronic filing and efficiencies within the agencies.

The hearing on HB 2222 was closed.

Hearing on SB 308 - State agencies; relating to the 20% administrative fee charged to agencies; cap increased from \$200,000 to \$350,000.

Jill Wolters, Revisor, explained that <u>SB 308</u> would increase the cap from \$200,000 to \$350,000 that state agencies pay into the state general fund (SGF) for administrative costs (<u>Attachment 5</u>). Under current law, certain state agencies pay 20.0 percent to the SGF to reimburse the SGF for accounting, auditing, budgeting, legal, payroll, personnel and purchasing services and any and all other state governmental services, which are performed on behalf of the state agency involved by other state agencies which receive appropriations from the SGF to provide such services. Ms. Wolters noted that the fiscal noted on <u>SB 308</u> indicates that the SGF would receive an additional \$1.352 million from 11 agencies in FY 2010.

Senator Masterson, Chair of the Subcommittee on Fee Boards, stated that the legislation was offered as a way to minimize the affect of the requested 10.0 percent reduction in agency budgets for FY 2010. Senator Masterson indicated that the \$200,000 cap has been in existence for approximately 40 years, noting that this action was an attempt for government to be more transparent.

Robert Waller, Executive Director, Board of Emergency Medical Services, provided testimony in a neutral position on <u>SB 308</u> (<u>Attachment 6</u>). Mr. Waller stated that the EMS Board would like to maintain current operations with no additional reductions to the FY 2010 budget if <u>SB 308</u> becomes law. Mr. Waller included an amendment to <u>SB 308</u> to ensure legislative intent as it applies to the Kansas Board of Emergency Medical Services operating fund.

Mary Blubaugh, Executive Administrator, State Board of Nursing, appeared before the Committee in opposition to <u>SB 308</u> (<u>Attachment 7</u>). Ms. Blubaugh stated that they are a fee-funded agency. It is projected, with enactment of <u>SB 308</u>, the balance in the agency's fee fund would be negative.

Sarah Tidwell, Kansas State Nurses Association, presented testimony in opposition to <u>SB 308</u> (<u>Attachment 8</u>). Ms. Tidwell stated that increasing the cap only affects those agencies with a large number of licensees with many of the fee funded agencies not reaching the current \$200,000 cap.

Jack Confer, Executive Director, Board of Healing Arts, presented testimony in opposition to <u>SB 308</u> (<u>Attachment 9</u>). Mr. Confer noted that the Board of Healing Arts has placed \$3,396,763 through sweeps and transfers into the SGF during the past 10 years. Legislation passed by the 2008 Legislature changed the way the Board of Healing Arts operates and mandated several changes. These changes have placed a financial burden on the agency. Mr. Confer noted that <u>SB 318</u> has been introduced to request an increase in fees.

Doug Wareham, Senior Vice President-Government Relations, Kansas Bankers Association, presented testimony in opposition to <u>SB 308</u> (<u>Attachment 10</u>). Mr. Wareham questioned the level of services the agencies gets with the \$200,000 provided annually to the SGF.

Jerry Slaughter, Kansas Medical Society, presented testimony in opposition to **SB 308**. Mr. Slaughter stated an interest to further examine the methodology of the funding of fee agencies in the overall state budget process.

The Subcommittee on the Fee Boards stated that representatives from all of the fee-funded agencies were invited to be present when the Subcommittee had hearings on their budgets and discussed the proposed legislation. At that time, none of the representatives of the fee boards spoke against raising the 20.0 cap on administrative costs from the current \$200,000 to \$350,000 in lieu of a 10.0 percent reduction in their budgets. The Subcommittee voiced concern that it now appears that the agencies do not want the cap raised or a 10.0 reduction in their budgets to comply with the direction of the Legislature in addressing the anticipated deficit in state revenues for FY2010.

The hearing on **SB 308** was closed.

<u>Discussion and Action on SB 196 - KPERS employment after retirement restrictions to apply to retirants employed by a third-party entity.</u>

Julian Efird, Legislative Research Department, explained that <u>SB 196</u> was passed out by the Committee on March 4, 2009; however, was re-referred back to the Committee for further deliberations and possible amendment (<u>Attachment 11</u>).

Gordon Self, Revisor, presented a balloon incorporating the proposed amendments to <u>SB 196</u> (<u>Attachment 12</u>).

Responding to questions from the Committee, Senator Vratil stated that the amendment is an effort to address problems with the original legislation concerning third party vendors, who are hiring retired teachers, contracting with school districts and avoiding the \$20,000 earnings limitation. This bill would eliminate the \$20,000 salary limit, would retain the requirement on a retiree 62 or older that the school district pays the contribution rate of 15.95 % and would treat retirees under age 62 differently by paying a contribution rate of 19.95 percent. Senator Vratil noted that the second part of the legislation concerns those school districts who are dependent upon hiring retired teachers through a third-party vendor when they are unable to find other available teachers.

Glenn Deck, Executive Director, Kansas Public Employees Retirement System (KPERS), stated that current statute will be continued for those retirees who were first employed by a different school district prior to July 1, 2006, in which no employer contribution rate is required.

Dale Dennis, Deputy Commissioner, Department of Education, responded to a question from the Committee, stating that the number of school districts who offer early retirement incentives is declining each year because of the financial aspect. Mr. Dennis noted that teachers can retire on May 31st after they have completed all of their duties for the year.

The Committee voiced support for providing incentives for school districts to discontinue early retirement incentive program because of the teacher shortage. Mr. Efird noted that there is another set of laws that address the early retirement incentive program and is not addressed in <u>SB 196</u>. The Committee also voiced concern on how to enforce provisions of the amendment.

Mr. Self stated that he will provide alternate language in the amendment to address the enforcement issue.

Adjournment

The next meeting is scheduled for March 18, 2009.





House Bill No. 2222, as amended by House Committee, authorizes any state department, agency, commission or authority which is obligated by statute to collect any fees to impose a surcharge or discount of not to exceed 5% of the amount of such fees in order to enhance the efficiency of such agency.

Any such agency which elects to do so, shall adopt rules and regulations:

- (1) To establish the specific surcharge or discount; and
- (2) to state the efficiency goals to be achieved, which may include, but are not limited to, insuring that the surcharge or discount has measured benefits of efficiency to the agency and customers.

The bill would take effect upon publication in the statute book.

Senate Bill No. 308 would increase the cap from \$200,000 to \$350,000 that state agencies pay into the state general fund for administrative costs.

Under current law, certain state agencies pay 20% to the state general fund to reimburse the state general fund for accounting, auditing, budgeting, legal, payroll, personnel and purchasing services, and any and all other state governmental services, which are performed on behalf of the state agency involved by other state agencies which receive appropriations from the state general fund to provide such services. The 20% is capped at \$200,000.

As technical clean-up matters, the following statutes were deleted from the statute:

K.S.A. 2-3506: not in print, the commission was abolished in 1994.

K.S.A. 16-609: repealed in 1999, ch. 166.

K.S.A. 17-5609: repealed in 1994, ch. 33.

 $K.S.A.\ 17-5612$: Expenses currently paid pursuant to $K.S.A.\ 9-1703$, which contains the 20% reference.

K.S.A. 65-4610: repealed in 2007, ch. 95.

K.S.A. 84-9-411: repealed in 2000, ch. 142.

K.S.A. 84-9-413: repealed in 2000, ch. 142.

Further, the following statutes were added, as they include the 20% language: K.S.A. 36-512, 65-1951, 65-6910, 65-7210, 74-6708 and 75-3170 and K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 65-4024b, 65-7309, 74-50,188 and 84-9-801.

The bill would take effect upon publication in the statute book.

Chairman Emler and members of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means, my name is Robert Waller. I am the Executive Director for the Kansas Board of Emergency Medical Services (KBEMS). I would like to provide testimony on 2009 Senate Bill 308.

The Board is neutral on the bill, due only to the decision by the Committee to forego the reduction of 10 to 18 percent in agency operations and grant funding for FY 2010. The Board understands the current economic outlook for the State and would like to maintain the current operations with no additional reduction to the request year (FY 2010) outside of those outlined in 2009 SB 308.

To ensure Legislative intent, the Board offers an amendment to complete the provisions contain within 2009 SB 308. Current law does not mandate that the provisions of K.S.A. 75-1514 (the 20 percent deposit of fee remittance to the State General Fund) apply to the Kansas Board of Emergency Medical Services operating fund. Therefore, the Board is moved to forward said information to the Committee to ensure that 2009 SB 308 in implemented if passed. The amendment is attached.

Conclusion

By no means, does the KBEMS Board welcome a reduction in funding to the EMS Operating Fund. The Board has been fiscally responsible in allocating funding provided by the Legislature in conducting both its statutory duties and operating three (3) grant program (Kansas Emergency Medical Information System (KEMIS), KBEMS Revolving and Assistance Fund (KRAF) grant program, and the Education Incentive Grant (EIG) program). Again, the Board understands the current fiscal status of the State and would hope that the passage of 2009 SB 308 marks the only reduction in funding for 2010 and would be accounted for and reviewed during future Legislative Budget cycles.

Thank you for allowing testimony on 2009 SB 308.

Chapter 75.--STATE DEPARTMENTS; PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES Article 15.--STATE FIRE MARSHAL

- 75-1514. Same; remittance and disposition of tax proceeds; fire marshal fee fund; emergency medical services board operating fund; fire service training program fund. (a) The commissioner of insurance shall remit all moneys received by the commissioner under subsection (a) of K.S.A. 75-1508, and amendments thereto, to the state treasurer in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto. Upon receipt of each such remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state treasury to the credit of the fire marshal fee fund for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2003, and June 30, 2004, and the state treasurer shall credit 20% of each such deposit to the state general fund and shall credit the remainder of each such deposit to the fire marshal fee fund for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2005, and ensuing fiscal years.
- (b) There is hereby created the fire marshal fee fund in the state treasury. All expenditures from the fire marshal fee fund shall be made in accordance with appropriations acts upon warrants of the director of accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouchers approved by the state fire marshal or a person or persons designated by the state fire marshal.
- (c) The commissioner of insurance shall remit all moneys received by the commissioner under subsection (b) of K.S.A. 75-1508, and amendments thereto, to the state treasurer in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto. Upon receipt of each such remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state treasury to the credit of the emergency medical services board operating fund.
- (d) The commissioner of insurance shall remit all moneys received by the commissioner under subsection (c) of K.S.A. 75-1508, and amendments thereto, to the state treasurer in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto. Upon receipt of each such remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state treasury to the credit of the fire service training program fund.

Testimony in Opposition of SB 308

Mary Blubaugh MSN, RN Executive Administrator

Good Morning Chairman Emler and Members of the Ways and Means Committee. My name is Mary Blubaugh, Executive Administrator for the Kansas State Board of Nursing. I am providing testimony on behalf of the Board Members to voice opposition to SB 308 which will increase the administrative fee cap charged to agencies from \$200,000 to \$350,000.

I have attached the 404 spreadsheet that was prepared by the Division of the Budget on 12/30/2008. The board of nursing fee fund at the end of fiscal year 08 was \$613,697. In FY 09 the report shows the fee fund at \$391,996. Since the report was completed the amount transferred to SGF was \$37,088, instead of \$55,647, which makes the balance \$410,555. Below is a table which estimates the fee fund balance of KSBN if the administrative fee is increased to \$350,000 and all revenues and expenditures remain the same as in the 404 dated 12/30/2008. At the end of FY 11 the agency will have less then \$40,000 as the balance; and it is projected that in FY 12 the agency will have a negative balance.

KSBN is at the statutory caps on all initial and renewal fees of licenses. The fees KSBN receives from initial and renewal are over 75% of the revenue. KSBN has introduced a bill twice asking that the caps be raised. The bills did not make it out of committee.

All state agencies have an administrative fee of 20% of revenue up to the cap of \$200,000 for services they receive. Although the agencies pay the administrative fee, they also pay many other fees to the state such as rent, security card reader, monumental building surcharge, printing, data connections, data center space, disc support, central mail

assessment, enterprise application, and FMS. Some of the fees that agencies pay are an assessment fee for using the services. I am sure I have not listed all the charges agencies are billed for. Below is a table that lists charges KSBN has paid for state services and an estimate for FY 11.

I have attached a copy of the budget cost indices that all state agencies use as a guideline to prepare their budget.

KSBN is in the process of installing new database software. The current system was installed in 1999 and we have not had support or maintenance on it for at least three years. The KSIP account was budgeted purchase a new back up system, firewalls, upgrade the image system, and the purchase of two new servers. These systems have, or will soon, come to end of life and we will have no maintenance on them. These are vital to the on line services that we provide. Approximately 65-70% of nurses renew their license on line and we currently have over 60 facilities who subscribe to the KANN Check system. Not only are the on-line services beneficial to our licensees and staff, they are also an important part of public safety for the citizens of Kansas. The KSIP account and capital outlay were the line items that the equipment and software were to be purchased from. Without the funds to purchase the software and hardware; these systems are at risk of failing. KSBN had also requested a supplement for FY 10 and FY 11 for \$18,260 for maintenance of the new software. Although the Board understands the state is facing fewer revenues and must cut spending, we ask that as a fee funded agency we

are appropriated the funds needed to purchase the equipment and the maintenance fee for the new software.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to share this information with you and we ask that the committee vote no on SB 308. Thank you for your time and consideration and I will stand for questions.

Testimony Before the Ways and Means Committee SB 308

Chairman Emler and Committee Members:

My name is Sarah Tidwell and I represent the Kansas State Nurses Association (KSNA). KSNA is the professional organization for the more than 30,000 Registered Nurses in the State. I speak in opposition to SB 308, increasing the amount of money to be transferred to the State General Fund from the fee fund agencies.

The fee fund money is a charge for administrative services and I understand that the current cap has been in effect for many years. KSNA has monitored the functions of the KSBN over the years and have not seen a recent appreciable increase in the services that the KSBN utilizes from the State. What we have seen is fee fund money being transferred to the state general fund to provide additional money for non-revenue producing agencies. SB 304 currently includes the transfer of \$72,693 from the Board of Nursing fee fund to the State General Fund.

Increasing the capped dollar amount of the fee fund, but not the overall percentage amount, only affects those agencies with a large number of licensees. Many of the fee fund agencies do not meet the \$200,000 cap now; therefore will not be as adversely affected by this bill as others.

Currently, nursing licensure fees comprise 75% of the Board of Nursing's revenue. This session's budget decisions are affecting nurses in several ways:

- KSIP money frozen. Approximately 65-70% of nurses renew their licenses through the online system that was installed in 1999. Other systems allow agencies that employ nurses to check for current, unencumbered licenses, protecting the safety of the public. These systems have not had support or maintenance for at least three years. The Board was managing the KSIP account to purchase a new back up system, firewalls, and other upgrades for the systems.
- Supplement request not funded. The Board of Nursing's budget request included
 funding for the systems mentioned above and a supplement for FY10 and FY11 for
 maintenance of the new software. If these systems fail, nurses will lose the ability to
 renew their license in a timely and secure manner, and employers will lose the ability
 to check the status of licenses.

• Open professional positions. To meet current budgetary restrictions, the Board of Nursing has not filled two professional positions. Both affect the ability of the Board to answer questions from licensees and investigate complaints in a timely manner.

KSNA has previously opposed increases in the licensure fee cap based on the amount of money in the fee fund and the sweeping of the funds. With the projected increase from this bill, a request for fee increases will almost surely be proposed. Nurse's income has personally been affected by the state's economy, just as the state revenues have. Community hospitals and healthcare agencies are experiencing financial constraints. Registered nurses may not be losing their jobs, but their hours are being cut back and their paychecks adjusted downward. An increase in licensure fee will amplify the problem.

My testimony represents Registered Nurses, but there are approximately 8300 Licensed Practical Nurses and 184 Licensed Mental Health Technicians that would be affected the same. Asking licensees to accept an increase in money transferred into the state general fund while experiencing a decrease in services, or an increase in licensure fees, feels like the budget burden is being placed on nurses and those who pay licensure fees.

KSNA requests you vote no on advancing this bill further.



RE: Senate Bill 308

The Kansas State Board of Healing Arts is testifying in opposition to Senate Bill 308; a bill which will increase the administrative fee cap charged to agencies from \$200,000 to \$350,000.

Over the past 10 years, the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts has had \$3,396,763 taken through sweeps and State General Fund Transfers. Every year, for the past 10 years, the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts has had the maximum \$200,000 transferred from it. This equates to \$2 million in transfers and \$1.376 million in sweeps within a span of 10 years, all of which has seriously impacted our agency's daily operations.

The 2008 Legislature changed the way the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts operated with the passage of House Bill 2620. The bill carried with it several mandates that financially impact the agency, such as fingerprinting, background checks and greater transparency. Additionally, concerns were expressed by the Legislature and the general public regarding timeframes of investigations and the backlog of cases. It is paramount to this agency that we address all of the mandates and concerns in an



efficient and effective manner. To continue this, it is critical that we continue at the funding level we have planned for, with no increases to the state general fund transfer amount.

In 2008, the agency was approved for six temporary FTE positions to carryout the mandates of HB 2620. These positions were recently granted permanent status in 2009. Other items we are moving forward with include revamping our web site to have easier accessibility and better information for our consumers seeking to view medical professionals' licensing and disciplinary information.

Since receiving the additional funding for the FTE positions, we are seeing positive results.

Board Actions



While we fundamentally understand the fiscal problems and dilemmas facing the Legislature, we do not agree that licensing fees collected from self-supporting agencies should be used for any other reason other to be redirected back to their respective agencies.

Our agency is still trying to pay for these six new FTEs that we received last July. Earlier attempts to increase our fee ceilings have been unsuccessful. However, Senator Vicki Schmidt introduced Senate Bill 318 into this committee which would increase the ceilings, thus allowing us to pay for these positions.

In conclusion, Senate Bill 308 will be harmful to both the agency and to the safety, health and welfare of the general public. Therefore, the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts does not support Senate Bill 308.

Chairman Emler and members of the Senate Ways & Means Committee, I am Doug Wareham appearing on behalf of the Kansas Bankers Association (KBA). KBA's membership includes 327 Kansas banks, which operate more than 1,300 banking facilities in 440 towns and cities across the state.

While we are opposed to S.B. 308, I'd like to begin with a positive remark and will simply state that we appreciate the transparent nature of this bill. S.B. 308 is a straightforward proposal and while we oppose it for the reasons I'm about to share, we do appreciate the fact that the impact of this bill is easy to identify. Speaking as someone who is not a regular attendee of budget committee hearings, it is often difficult to ascertain the impact (direct or indirect) of proposals designed to cut and/or sweep fee agency funds.

I do want to thank you for the opportunity to share our concerns regarding Senate Bill 308, which proposes to raise the administrative fee cap for state agencies from a maximum of \$200,000 annually to \$350,000 annually. It is our understanding that current state law requires all state agencies to remit 20% of their annual fee income to the state general fund, but also caps the total amount that must be remitted at \$200,000. It is also our understanding that the purpose of the administrative fee is to reimburse the state general fund for accounting, auditing, budgeting, legal, payroll, personnel and purchasing services, and any other state governmental services which are performed on behalf of a state agency by other state agencies.

Naturally, our primary concern is how this bill will impact the Office of the State Bank Commissioner (OSBC), which is one of a handful of state agencies that would hit the proposed \$350,000 administrative fee cap. The question that initially comes to mind when reviewing S.B. 308 is:

If the annual administrative fee assessment is designed to cover administrative costs associated with services rendered by other state agencies for the OSBC, has there been a substantial change in services provided that warrants the 75% fee cap increase proposed in S.B. 308?

Following the introduction of this bill, we researched the Department of Administration's website and were able to find a Statewide Cost Allocation Plan (SWCAP) listing that identifies

and allocates costs the state incurs for "central services" provided by specific agencies or cost centers to other state agencies. According to the Department of Administration's website, the Office of the State Bank Commissioner received \$8,597 in central services in FY-2008 and \$12,395 in services during FY-2007. I have attached copies of the Department of Administration's listing to my testimony. As you can see, DOA provides a listing of "central service" costs for all state agencies. For the record, we are not asking that the administrative fee cap be reduced, but we do <u>not</u> believe the current level and amount of services provided to the OSBC warrants an additional \$150,000 transfer from the OSBC to the state's general fund.

The second concern we would like to raise is that larger agencies, such as the OSBC, are often required because of their size and scope to maintain personnel and internal staff resources to meet their department's needs for which smaller agencies might depend upon other state agencies. For example, where some smaller state departments might depend upon other agencies for legal, human resources and information technology needs, larger agencies, such as the OSBC maintain their own personnel to administer those duties. The OSBC has three personnel in budget/accounting, four in information technology and six in their legal section. We believe these positions are needed to fulfill the mission of the OSBC and we are not questioning the need or relevance for these positions. We have confidence in the Bank Commissioner, who is advised by bankers and at-large appointees serving on the State Banking Board to determine what personnel and staff resources are needed on-site at the Banking Department. Therefore, it appears the \$150,000 administrative fee increase that would be realized by the OSBC under S.B. 308 has little or no relationship to the actual costs being incurred for services rendered to the OSBC from other state agencies, and for that reason we oppose increasing the current \$200,000 cap threshold.

Bankers do have a sincere appreciation for the financial challenges facing the State and they contribute in many ways to the state general fund. What we do not want you to lose sight of is the fact that the OSBC is a totally fee funded agency. What we object to is that totally fee funded agencies have become a continual target for balancing the funding needs for non-fee funded state programs. We also believe it is important to remind this body that transfers of fee funded agencies are not simply a burden placed on the agency, but are always in the end an added burden, fee or tax on the entities that generate the fees – fees that are paid by the banking industry to the Commissioner to help ensure the safety and soundness of the banking industry in Kansas. If S.B. 308 is adopted, Kansas banks will foot the bill for the \$350,000 administrative fee. Coupled with the proposed 4% sweep (\$343,854) that was included in the Governor's Budget Proposal, the toll on state-chartered banks in Kansas could jump to nearly \$700,000 in FY-2010.

I also believe it is important for this committee to be aware of other forces that will soon be negatively impacting the banking industry in Kansas. Attached to my testimony is a comment letter that is being submitted today by KBA to the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation regarding the impact of recently proposed special assessments designed to re-build and maintain the FDIC insurance fund. The FDIC's proposed 10 to 20 basis point special assessment, which is expected to be finalized in early April, will have a \$40 to \$80 million impact on Kansas banks and in turn Kansas communities.

During the current economic crisis, the overwhelming majority of Kansas banks remain well-capitalized and strong and are continuing to meet the lending needs of the communities they serve. While the majority of Kansas banks remain strong, the impact of the FDIC assessments combined with any additional added cost will negatively impact the ability of banks to sustain economic growth in our state. While the \$150,000 annual administrative fee increase proposed in S.B. 308 might seem trivial to some, it is another straw on the backs of Kansas bankers already faced with significant financial burdens caused by forces and parties far removed from the Sunflower State.

We do appreciate the opportunity to share our concerns regarding Senate Bill 308 and we respectfully ask each of you to oppose this measure. I would be happy to stand for questions.

The Statewide Cost Allocation Plan (SWCAP) identifies and allocates costs the state incurs for "central services" provided by specific agencies or cost centers to other state agencies.

The SWCAP process falls under the federal guidelines contained in the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-87 - Cost Principles for State, Local, and Tribal Governments. OMB A-87 establishes principles and standards for determining costs for Federal awards carried out through grants, cost reimbursement contracts and other agreements with the State. This document can be found on the internet at: http://www.whitehouse.gov/omb/circulars/a087/a087-all.html

The guidelines found in OMB A-87 define the allowable and unallowable central service costs. For Kansas, the allowed central service costs are from programs and/or activity within the Department of Administration and the State Treasurer. The Kansas central service costs are categorized into two components or sections (Section I and Section II). Section I is the allocation of non-billed allowable indirect costs. Section II is the documentation of direct billed services' costs. OMB A-87 guidelines also require the preparation of formal GAAP-based financial statements for Section II (direct billed) cost centers. These are prepared annually and are audited and approved through the formal audit process conducted by Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

Dear Mr. Feldman:

The Kansas Bankers Association appreciates the opportunity to comment on the FDIC's interim rule that would impose a special assessment of 10 or 20 basis points on the banking industry. The KBA is a non-profit trade association that is fortunate to have 327 of the 329 banks in Kansas as members.

While we have serious concerns about this proposal, we first want to emphasize that the banking industry in Kansas is fully committed to re-building and maintaining the FDIC fund. We also fully support the view of the FDIC that we need a strong, financially secure fund in order to maintain the confidence of depositors in the system. Most banks in Kansas were never involved in subprime lending and have served their communities in a responsible way for years and years and are now being unfairly penalized.

That being said, we feel that this is the wrong time to take this huge amount of money out of the Kansas economy. We are already dealing with a deepening recession, accounting rules that overstate economic losses and unfairly reduce capital, regulatory pressure to classify assets that continue to perform, and a significant increase in regular quarterly FDIC premiums.

The following demonstrates that the special assessment would have a big impact on the earnings and capital of the banks of Kansas. If the special assessment were 20 basis points, the total dollars taken out of the Kansas economy would be \$80 million. That figure represents about 14% of the total pre-tax earnings of Kansas banks for 2008. We believe those dollars are far better off staying in the local economy, helping our state and country to come out of the current economic recession. In addition, the reduction in earnings will make it more difficult to build capital when it is needed the most.

There are several things that can be done to alleviate this situation; we will discuss 2 of those items:

- 1) We would urge you to look for and if necessary advocate for ways to improve the projections for bank failures.
 - In our opinion, mark-to-market accounting is the principle reason that our financial system is in a meltdown. The destructiveness of mark-to-market -- which was in force before the Great Depression -- led FDR to suspend it in 1938. He understood that it was unnecessarily destroying banks. We do not believe the timing of the re-implementation of mark-to-market in the fall of 2007 and the current economic crisis are coincidence.
 - The concept of a "bad bank", or the ability to separate the bad assets from the good ones would seem to have merit and would allow problem assets to be dealt with separately and systematically, while other banking operations could continue under a transparent, focused framework.
- 2) We would urge you to seek ways to "smooth out" the assessment collection process. Again, we know the Fund needs to build up to statutory levels, but, as we stated earlier, collecting a large portion, all at once, is very harmful to the Kansas economy.

We thank you for your consideration of lowering the special assessment if Congress increases the line-of-credit utilized by the FDIC. This is one way to spread the collection of assessments over time. We understand the stated reluctance to utilize the line of credit because of the appearance of tax-payer money being used to "bail-out" the fund. However, we would argue that extraordinary times such as these are exactly for what the line of credit was designed. The line of credit is a type of loan that is utilized by businesses all over the country to help with unexpected cash flow deficiencies. Utilization of the line of credit would not nullify the use of bank funds to re-capitalize the Fund. Rather, it would be a loan that the banking industry would re-pay, and could be a tool that would help "smooth out" the funding process.

We would also urge you to look at other possible ways to "smooth out" the funding process:

- Use some sort of dept option: either a "FICO" like offering, similar to what was used to
 alleviate the FSLIC funding crisis or possibly a convertible debt option, whereby the FDIC
 could convert debt borrowed from the banking industry into capital to offset losses if it
 needs the funds. This would allow banks to write off the expense only when the funds
 are actually needed;
- Use the revenue that the FDIC is collecting from the Temporary Liquidity Guarantee Program. There is considerable revenue being collected from those banks that are issuing guaranteed debt which would help support the FDIC at this critical time.
- If smoothing out of the actual special assessment is not possible, we urge you to look for ways to allow banks to amortize the special assessment, for accounting purposes, on their books.

It is our understanding that many of the suggestions for smoothing out the funding process are hampered by current accounting rules. Why should onerous mark-to-market accounting rules and the road blocks put before us for recapitalizing the Fund hold the industry hostage? There must be a way to prudently suspend these accounting rules on a temporary basis so as not to be a major burden to the recovery of the banking industry.

Making these modifications will ensure that the fund remains secure and will allow Kansas banks to continue to lend in our communities. Thank you for allowing the KBA to express its concerns and to make suggestions. We know you will keep these things in mind when the Board meets in April to finalize the special assessment rule.

Amendments to SB 196

- Increase the break in service requirement from 30 to 60 days after retirement for **all** KPERS retirees (including members of the state, school and local groups) before returning to work for any KPERS participating employer.
- Eliminate the current statutory \$20,000 earnings limitation for licensed public school employees (teachers and administrators) of the KPERS school group who return to work for the KPERS participating employer from which they retired.
- Require all public school employers who employ a licensed KPERS school group retiree to pay an employer contribution rate as follows:
 - If the retiree is age 62 or over: the employer actuarial rate plus the 4% statutory employee rate. (For FY 2009 this would be 15.95%)
 - If the retiree is under age 62: the employer actuarial rate plus the 4% statutory employee rate plus an additional 4%. (For FY 2009 this would be 19.95%)
- The employer contribution rate would apply for retirees returning to work for both the same school district or a different school district, except for those retirees who were first employed by a different school district prior to July 1, 2006, and who will be grandfathered with no employer contribution required.
- School employers cannot hire licensed KPERS school group retirees who takes early retirement until they reach age 62.
- The new provisions will apply to school district contracts entered into on or after July 1, 2009.
- The new provisions (except the 60 day waiting period) will sunset after three years, unless continued by the Legislature. There is a requirement for KPERS with the assistance of its actuary to report on the actuarial experience of these provisions to Joint Committee on Pensions, Investments and Benefits on or before June 30, 2012.

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SENATE BILL No. 196

AN ACT concerning retirement and pensions; relating to employment after retirement; retirants employed by third-party entities; amending K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-4914 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-4914 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-4914. (1) The normal retirement date for a member of the system shall be the first day of the month coinciding with or following termination of employment with any participating employer not followed by employment with any participating employer within 30 days and the attainment of age 65 or, commencing July 1, 1993, age 62 with the completion of 10 years of credited service or the first day of the month coinciding with or following the date that the total of the number of years of credited service and the number of years of attained age of the member is equal to or more than 85. In no event shall a normal retirement date for a member be before six months after the entry date of the participating employer by whom such member is employed. A member may retire on the normal retirement date or on the first day of any month thereafter upon the filing with the office of the retirement system of an application in such form and manner as the board shall prescribe. Nothing herein shall prevent any person, member or retirant from being employed, appointed or elected as an employee, appointee, officer or member of the legislature. Elected officers may retire from the system on any date on or after the attainment of the normal retirement date, but no retirement benefits payable under this act shall be paid until the member has terminated such member's office.

- (2) No retirant shall make contributions to the system or receive service credit for any service after the date of retirement.
- (3) Any member who is an employee of an affiliating employer pursuant to K.S.A. 74-4954b and amendments thereto and has not withdrawn such member's accumulated contributions from the Kansas police and firemen's retirement system may retire before such members normal retirement date on the first day of any month coinciding with or following the attainment of age 55.

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(5) On or after July 1, 2006, for any retirant who is first employed or appointed in or to any position or office by a participating employer other than a participating employer for which such retirant was employed or appointed during the final two years of such retirant's participation, and, on or after July 1, 2009, for any retirant who is employed by a thirdparty entity who contracts services with a participating employer other than a participating employer for which such retirant was employed or appointed during the final two years of such retirant's participation to fill a position covered under subsection (a) of K.S.A. 72-5410, and amendments thereto, with such retirant, such participating employer shall pay to the system the actuarially determined employer contribution and the statutorily prescribed employee contribution based on the retirant's compensation during any such period of employment or appointment. If a retirant who retired on or after July 1, 1988, is employed or appointed in or to any position or office for which compensation for service is paid in an amount equal to \$15,000 or more, or commencing in calendar year 2006, and all calendar years thereafter, \$20,000 or more in any one such calendar year, by any participating employer for which such retirant was employed or appointed during the final two years of such retirant's participation, and, on or after July 1, 2009, by any third-party entity who contracts services to fill a position covered under subsection (a) of K.S.A. 72-5410, and amendments thereto, with such retirant with a participating employer for which such retirant was employed or appointed during the final two years of such retirant's participation, such retirant shall not receive any retirement benefit for any month for which such retirant serves in such position or office. The participating employer who employs such retirant whether by contract directly with the retirant or through an arrangement with a third-party entity shall report to the system within 30 days of when the compensation paid to the retirant is equal to or exceeds any limitation provided by this section. Any participating employer who contracts services with any such third-party entity to fill a position covered under subsection (a) of K.S.A. 72-5410, and amendments thereto, shall include in such contract a provision or condition which requires the third-party entity to provide the participating employer with the necessary compensation paid infor-

mation related to any such position filled by the third-party entity with a retirant to enable the participating employer to comply with provisions of this subsection relating to the payment of contributions and reporting requirements. Any retirant employed by a participating employer or a third-party entity as provided in this subsection shall not make contributions nor receive additional credit under such system for such service except as provided by this section. Upon request of the executive director of the system, the secretary of revenue shall provide such information as may be needed by the executive director to carry out the provisions of this act. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to retirants employed as substitute teachers or officers, employees or appointees of the legislature. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to members of the legislature prior to January 8, 2000. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to any other elected officials prior to the term of office of such elected official which commences on or after July 1, 2000. The provisions of this subsection shall apply to any other elected official on and after the term of office of such other elected official which commences on or after July 1, 2000. Except as otherwise provided, commencing January 8, 2001, the provisions of this subsection shall apply to members of the legislature. For determination of the amount of compensation paid pursuant to this subsection, for members of the legislature, compensation shall include any amount paid as provided pursuant to subsections (a), (b), (c) and (d) of K.S.A. 46-137a, and amendments thereto, or pursuant to K.S.A. 46-137b, and amendments thereto. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, when a member of the legislature is paid an amount of compensation of \$15,000 or more, or commencing in calendar year 2006, and all calendar years thereafter, \$20,000 or more in any one calendar year, the member may continue to receive any amount provided in subsections (b) and (d) of K.S.A. 46-137a, and amendments thereto, and still be entitled to receive such member's retirement benefit. Commencing July 1, 2005, the provisions of this subsection shall not apply to retirants who either retired under the provisions of subsection (1), or, if they retired under the provisions of subsection (4), were retired more than 30 days prior to the effective date of this act and are licensed professional nurses or licensed practical nurses employed by the state of Kansas in an institution as defined in subsection (b) of K.S.A. 76-12a01 or subsection (f) of K.S.A. 38-2302, and amendments thereto, the Kansas soldiers' home or the Kansas veterans' home. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to create any right, or to authorize the creation of any right, which is not subject to amendment or nullification by act of the legislature. The participating employer of such retirant shall pay to the system the actuarially determined employer contribution based on the retirant's compensation dur-

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ing any such period of employment.

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(6) For purposes of this section, any employee of a local governmental unit which has its own pension plan who becomes an employee of a participating employer as a result of a merger or consolidation of services provided by local governmental units, which occurred on January 1, 1994, may count service with such local governmental unit in determining whether such employee has met the years of credited service requirements contained in this section.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74 4914 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book. Kansas register

Commencing July 1, 2009, the provisions of subsection (5) shall not apply to retirants who either retired under the provisions of subsection (I), or, if they retired under the provisions of subsection (4), were retired more than 60 days prior to the effective date of this act, and are subsequently hired in a position that requires a license under K.S.A. 72-1388 and K.A.R. 91-1-203, and amendments thereto. The provisions of this subsection do not apply to retirees who retired under subsection (4) prior to age 62. The participating employer of such retirant shall pay to the system the actuarially determined employer contribution based on the retirant's compensation during any such period of employment plus 4% if the retiree is age 62 or over at the time of employment, or plus 8% if the retiree is under age 62. On the January 1 following the retiree's attainment of age 62, the employer shall begin paying the employer's actuarial rate plus 4%. Licensed school employees who were retired and subsequently hired by a school district other than the school district the employee retired from prior to July 1, 2006, are not covered under this subsection. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to create any right, or to authorize the creation of any right, which is not subject to amendment or nullification by act of the legislature. The provisions of this subsection shall remain in effect through July 1, 2012, after which, the Kansas public employees retirement system and its actuary shall report the experience to the joint committee on pensions, investments and benefits.

Sec. 3. K.S.A. 74-4937 and K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-4914 are hereby repealed.

- Sec. 2. K.S.A. 74-4937 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-4937. (1) The normal retirement date of a member of the system who is in school employment and who is subject to K.S.A. 74-4940 and amendments thereto shall be the first day of the month coinciding with or following termination of employment not followed by employment with any participating employer within 30 60 days and the end of the school fiscal year in which the member attains age 65 or, commencing July 1, 1986, age 65 or age 60 with the completion of 35 years of credited service or at any age with the completion of 40 years of credited service, or commencing July 1, 1993, any alternative normal retirement date already prescribed by law or age 62 with the completion of 10 years of credited service or the first day of the month coinciding with or following the date that the total of the number of years of credited service and the number of years of attained age of the member is equal to or more than 85. Each member upon giving prior notice to the appointing authority and the retirement system may retire on the normal retirement date or the first day of any month thereafter.
- (2) Any member who is in school employment and who is subject to K.S.A. 74-4940 and amendments thereto may retire before such member's normal retirement date on the first day of the month coinciding with or following termination of employment not followed by employment with any participating employer within 30 60 days and the completion of the school fiscal year in which such member attained age 55 with the completion of 10 years of credited service, upon the filing with the office of the retirement system of an application for retirement in such form and manner as the board shall prescribe.
- (3) No member who begins a year of school employment and who is subject to K.S.A. 74-4940 and amendments thereto may retire until the first day of the month coinciding with or following the end of the current school fiscal year unless good cause is shown and such retirement is agreed to by the participating employer and the board.
- (4) As used in this section "school fiscal year" means the twelve-month period beginning July 1 and ending June 30.
