#### MINUTES OF THE HOUSE TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Gary Hayzlett at 1:30 p.m. on February 16, 2010, in Room 783 of the Docking State Office Building.

Chairman Hayzlett called the meeting to order. The Chairman said there would be no hearings today but the Committee would work some bills.

## HB 2439 - Prohibiting sending, reading or writing text messages

Chairman Hayzlett opened <u>HB 2439</u> to the Committee for discussion, comments or motions. This bill would prohibit a person who is operating a motor vehicle on a public road or highway from texting, using a wireless communication device to write, send, or read a written communication. Staff briefed the Committee on this bill and on two balloon amendments (<u>Attachment #1</u> and <u>Attachment #2</u>) After some discussion the proposed amendment specified that a "wireless communication device" does not include a voice-operated device, and to specify that the bill's provisions would not apply to law enforcement officers and emergency service personnel acting within the course and scope. <u>Representative Swanson made a motion to adopt the amendments</u>, seconded by Representative Rardin and the motion carried. Representative King made a motion to favorably pass **HB 2439**, as amended, seconded by Representative Ballard and the motion carried.

#### HB 2552 - Midwest interstate passenger rail compact

The Chairman opened <u>HB 2552</u> to the Committee for discussion, comments or motions. This bill would enact the Midwest Interstate Passenger Rail Compact. <u>Representative Wetta made a motion to favorably pass HB</u> 2552, seconded by Representative Worley and the motion carried.

## HB 2660 - Recreational off-highway vehicles, regulation thereof

Chairman Hayzlett opened <u>HB 2660</u> to the Committee for discussion, comments or motions. This bill concerns recreational off-highway vehicles. Staff had an amendment. On Page 13, section (C)(k) "Any person who, on July 1, 2010, is the owner of a recreational off-highway vehicle, as defined in K.S.A. 8-126, and amendments thereto, shall not be required to file an application for a nonhighway certificate of title under the provisions of this section for such recreational off-highway vehicle, unless the person transfers an interest in such recreational off-highway vehicle." Representative Kleeb made a motion to adopt this amendment, seconded by Representative Maloney and the motion carried. Representative Swanson made a motion to favorable pass HB 2660, as amended, seconded by Representative Wolf and the motion carried.

## HB 2680 - Regulating traffic; impeding traffic

The Chairman opened <u>HB 2680</u> to the Committee for discussion, comments or motions. After discussions the Committee decided to not pass <u>HB 2680</u> out of Committee.

- (3) relay information between transit or for-hire operator and the operator's dispatcher, in which the device is permanently affixed to the motor vehicle.

"Wireless communication device" does not include a device which is voice-operated and which allows the user to send or receive a text based communication without the use of either hand, except to activate or deactivate a feature or function.
