



### K.S.A. 66-2005(q)(1)(C) states:

In any exchange in which there are fewer than 75,000 local exchange access lines served by all providers, the commission shall price deregulate all business telecommunication services upon a demonstration by the requesting local telecommunications carrier that there are two or more nonaffiliated telecommunications carriers or other entities, that are nonaffiliated with the local exchange carrier, providing local telecommunications service to business customers, regardless of whether the entity provides local service in conjunction with other services in that exchange area. One of such nonaffiliated carriers or entities shall be required to be a facilities-based carrier or entity and not more than one of such nonaffiliated carriers or entities shall be a provider of commercial mobile radio services in that exchange. A requesting local telecommunications carrier shall not be required to demonstrate that the nonaffiliated commercial mobile radio services provider provides service to business customers specifically, a demonstration that the commercial mobile radio services provider provides local telecommunications service to customers in the exchange area is sufficient.

### K.S.A. 66-2005(q)(1)(D) states:

In any exchange in which there are fewer than 75,000 local exchange access lines served by all providers, the commission shall price deregulate all residential telecommunication services upon a demonstration by the requesting local telecommunications carrier that there are two or more nonaffiliated telecommunications carriers or other entities, that are nonaffiliated with the local exchange carrier, providing local telecommunications service to residential customers, regardless of whether the entity provides local service in conjunction with other services in that exchange area. One of such nonaffiliated carriers or entities shall be required to be a facilities-based carrier or entity and not more than one of such nonaffiliated carriers or entities shall be a provider of commercial mobile radio services in that exchange. A requesting local telecommunications carrier shall not be required to demonstrate that the nonaffiliated commercial mobile radio services provides service to residential customers specifically, a demonstration that the commercial mobile radio services provider provides local telecommunications service to customers in the exchange area is sufficient.

## **Telecommunications Basics**

- o Rate-of-Return Regulation
  - There are two steps to implementing rate of return regulation:
    - First, determine the economically appropriate revenue requirement. This is based on prudently incurred expenses and a "fair" return on invested capital, and
    - Second, set prices for individual services so revenue earned from all the regulated services is not greater than the revenue requirement.
  - The revenue requirement is generally calculated using the following formula:

Revenue Requirement = Operating Expenses + Depreciation + Taxes +

(Net Book Value \* Rate of Return)



- Price-cap Regulation
  - Prices are adjusted using an index rather than through an examination of cost of service.
    - In most instances, price-cap regulation begins after a traditional rate of return review of the cost of providing service.
    - In some applications, there are periodic rate of return reviews to rebase the rates to match the cost of providing service if necessary.
