Introduction of Legislation

Senator Kultala moved to introduce legislation to establish the early high school graduation scholarship program (9rs1316). The motion was seconded by Senator Kelly. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Senator Vratil moved to introduce legislation concerning municipalities; concerning official newspapers and official municipality internet web sites (9rs1331). The motion was seconded by Senator Schodorf. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Senator Umbarger moved to introduce legislation regarding compensation for legislative officers (9rs1513). The motion was seconded by Senator Masterson. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Discussion and Action on SB 350 - Supplemental appropriations for FY 2010 for various state agencies.

Written testimony from the Stephen R. Weatherford, President, Kansas Housing Resources Corporation was distributed to the Committee (<u>Attachment 1</u>).

J. G. Scott, Legislative Research Department, presented information, as requested by the Committee at a prior meeting, on state agencies' budgets relating to the FY 2010 budget and **SB 350** (Attachment 2).

Michael Steiner, Legislative Research Department, presented updated information on the Economic Development Initiatives Fund (EDIF), FY 2009 - FY 2011 (<u>Attachment 3</u>). Responding to a question from the Committee, Mr. Steiner stated that the Department of Commerce's FY 2010 budget is funded from EDIF and federal funds. No SGF are appropriated in FY 2010.

Senator Vratil requested an amendment to <u>SB 350</u> which would establish the district magistrate judge supplemental compensation fund to allow counties to transfer funds to the state to be used to supplement the salaries of district magistrate judges (<u>Attachment 4</u>). The Committee voiced concern that this would have an impact on benefits paid by the state, such as unemployment and retirement benefits.

Jerry Sloan, Judicial Branch Budget and Fiscal Officer, addressed the amendment and indicated that he has requested additional information from the Kansas Public Employees Retirement System (KPERS); however, he has not received the information at this time. The Committee expressed concern and felt it could be addressed in legislation. After discussion, Senator Vratil withdrew his request for the amendment.

Senator Emler requested an amendment to <u>SB 350</u> to limit legislator's franking privileges or postage allotment to 50 percent of the budgeted amount for FY 2010 and FY 2011(<u>Attachment 5</u>). Senator Emler explained that if a legislator has already spent an amount larger than 50 percent of the allotment, they will not be penalized. It was noted that because this is an election year for House members, their allocation would cease after Sine Die; however, a senator's allotment would continue for the balance of the calendar year. It was also noted that even though <u>SB 350</u> only addresses the balance of FY 2010, postage allotments are based on the calendar year.

Senator Taddiken moved to accept the proviso to limit legislator's postage allotment to 50 percent of the budgeted amount for FY 2010 and FY 2011. The motion was seconded by Senator Schodorf. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Senator Vratil moved to add a conceptual amendment to **SB 350** to remove \$1.1 million from the expenditures of legislative agencies, including Legislative Coordinating Council (LCC), Legislative Research Department, Revisor of Statutes Office, Legislature and Legislative Division of Post Audit and authorize LCC to spread the reduction to the various entities based on determination of greatest need. The motion was seconded by Senator Lee, Motion carried on a 9-3 vote.

Senator McGinn moved to remove the contents of **HB 2222** and amend contents of **SB 350** as amended into **Senate Substitute for HB 2222.** The motion was seconded by Senator Schodorf. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Senator Schodorf moved to recommend **Senate Substitute for HB 2222** favorably for passage. The motion was seconded by Senator Masterson. Motion carried on a roll call vote of 11-2.

Adjournment

The next meeting is scheduled for January 21, 2010.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:50 a.m.

TESTIMONY REGARDING SB350 Senate Ways and Means Committee January 19, 2010

Stephen R Weatherford, President Kansas Housing Resources Corporation

Kansas Housing Resources Corporation (KHRC) is a quasi-governmental corporation established by Governor's Executive Reorganization Order (ERO) #30 and pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8904(v). KHRC serves as the primary administrator of federal housing programs on behalf of the State of Kansas. KHRC does not receive any operational revenue from the state but rather sustains itself through federal contracts for service and program administration fees.

Senate Bill 350 will transfer \$2 million from the Housing Trust Fund to the state general fund. This transfer represents a reversal of the funding provided to the Trust Fund to operate the Housing Development Grant Program, the purpose of which is to assist in the development of housing related infrastructure and the actual construction of housing when the construction is performed by a housing authority. KHRC has committed and contractually obligated all \$2 million of these funds as follows:

•	City of Neodesha	\$512,000

Currently the Trust Fund has just over \$1 million available for commitment. Further, KHRC will earn an additional \$1 million this year through administration of federal housing programs.

Just as in recent years, KHRC intended to transfer these earnings to the Housing Trust Fund.

Between these two sources, KHRC can transfer the required \$2 million to the state general fund.

Transfer of the funds will necessitate the suspension of two Trust Fund programs, the Kansas Accessibility Modification Program (KAMP) and the Emergency Repair Program (ERP). These programs for very-low income Kansans have been funded exclusively through the Housing Trust Fund since KHRC was established.

KTEC BUDGET SUMMARY

January 19, 2010

- Since the initial round of budget cuts in FY09, KTEC has been cut <u>43%</u> from \$12 million to \$6.9 million (prior to consideration of the current allotments).
- The Governor's proposed allotment, should it be approved by the legislature, would further reduce the KTEC budget by \$250,000, another 3.6%.
- The KTEC Board established a strategic task force, which has assessed all programs, refined focus and will continue to drive the vision of the organization on an ongoing basis.
- KTEC recently led development of a functional matrix that clarifies roles among practitioners of economic and business development programs and services in the state (including Dept of Commerce, KBA, KSBDC, Network Kansas and KTEC). This effort will serve to avoid duplication and increase collaboration among our economic development partners.
- The Special Committee on KTEC, led by Senator Wysong and Rep. Lana Gordon, gave a positive review of the organization. The full committee report was issued January 11, 2010.

TESTIMONY REGARDING SB350 Senate Ways and Means Committee January 19, 2010

Kansas Housing Resources Corporation (KHRC) is a quasi-governmental corporation established by Governor's Executive Reorganization Order (ERO) #30 and pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8904(v). KHRC serves as the primary administrator of federal housing programs on behalf of the State of Kansas. KHRC does not receive any operational revenue from the state but rather sustains itself through federal contracts for service and program administration fees.


Senate Bill 350 will transfer \$2 million from the Housing Trust Fund to the state general fund. This transfer represents a reversal of the funding provided to the Trust Fund to operate the Housing Development Grant Program, the purpose of which is to assist in the development of housing related infrastructure and the actual construction of housing when the construction is performed by a housing authority. KHRC has committed and contractually obligated all \$2 million of these funds as follows:

•	City of Cherryvale	\$430,000
•	City of Erie	\$754,000
•	City of Iola	\$219,000
•	City of Neodesha	\$512,000
•	Kiowa County	\$300,000

Currently the Trust Fund has just over \$1 million available for commitment. Further, KHRC will earn an additional \$1 million this year through administration of federal housing programs. Just as in recent years, KHRC intended to transfer these earnings to the Housing Trust Fund. Between these two sources, KHRC can transfer the required \$2 million to the state general fund.

Transfer of the funds will necessitate the suspension of two Trust Fund programs, the Kansas Accessibility Modification Program (KAMP) and the Emergency Repair Program (ERP). These programs for very-low income Kansans have been funded exclusively through the Housing Trust Fund since KHRC was established.

a Pursuant to 2008 Senate Sub. for HB 2946 the Dept. of Commerce was reimbursed through the EDIF; this reimbursement is reflected in Other Income.

Economic Development Initiatives Fund (EDIF) Overview

The statutes governing the EDIF provide that it shall be used to finance programs "... supporting and enhancing the existing economic foundation of the state and fostering growth ... to the state's economic foundation." With the exception of a statutory \$2.0 million transfer from the EDIF to the State Water Plan Fund, the Legislature annually appropriates the EDIF for individual projects and programs deemed to support and enhance the state's economic foundation.

The EDIF is funded through the State Gaming Revenues Fund (SGRF). A portion of state revenue from both the Lottery and parimutuel wagering is transferred to the SGRF. That fund is used essentially as a holding fund from which further transfers are made on a monthly basis. No more than \$50.0 million may be credited to the SGRF in any fiscal year. Amounts in excess of \$50.0 million are credited to the State General Fund.

The initial transfers from the State Gaming Revenue Fund, which began in 1986, were as follows:

- 1. County Reappraisal Fund (until June 30, 1989) 30.0%
- 2. Split between Juvenile Detention Facilities Fund and Correctional Institutions Building Fund (Actual amount to be determined by appropriations act) 10.0%
- 3. Economic Development Initiatives Fund (to be increased to 90.0% as of July 1, 1989) 60.0%

During the 1988 Session, the Legislature delayed the increase in the transfer to the EDIF until July 1, 1990.

During the 1994 Session, the Legislature changed the transfers as of July 1, 1995 to the following:

- 1. Correctional Institutions Building Fund 10.0%
- 2. Juvenile Detention Facilities Fund 5.0%
- 3. Economic Development Initiatives Fund 85.0%


During the 2000 Session, the Legislature changed the transfers to the following:

- 1. Economic Development Initiatives Fund—\$42,432,000;
- 2. Correctional Institutions Building Fund—\$4,992,000;
- 3. Juvenile Detention Facilities Fund—\$2,496,000; and
- 4. Problem Gambling Grant Fund—\$80,000.

During the 2009 Session, the Legislature changed the transfers to the following for FY 2009 and FY 2010

- 1. Economic Development Initiatives Fund \$40,782,869
- 2. Correction Institutions Building Fund \$4,797,985
- 3. Juvenile Detention Facilities Fund \$2,398,992
- 4. Problem Gambling Grant Fund \$80,000

On page 2, following line 20, by inserting the following:

"(b) There is appropriated for the above agency from the following special revenue fund or funds for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010, all moneys now or hereafter lawfully credited to and available in such fund or funds, except that expenditures other than refunds authorized by law shall not exceed the following:

District magistrate judge supplemental compensation fund No limit

Provided, That all moneys received by the judicial branch from the county or counties comprising a judicial district to supplement the salary of, or to pay any compensation to, any district magistrate judge of a judicial district pursuant to K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 75-3120k, and amendments thereto, shall be deposited in the state treasury in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto, and shall be credited to the district magistrate judge supplemental compensation fund: Provided further, That all moneys credited to the district magistrate judge supplemental compensation fund shall be paid to, or on behalf of, the district magistrate judge or district magistrate judges for whom such moneys were remitted by the county or counties: And provided further, That all expenditures from the district magistrate judge supplemental compensation fund for such purposes shall be made in the same manner and at the same times that biweekly compensation is payable for the biweekly pay periods ending on or after January 1, 2010, which are chargeable to fiscal year 2010, subject to the same conditions or restrictions imposed or prescribed by law as the salary or other compensation payable by law to such district magistrate judge or district magistrate judges, including any applicable withholding or other taxes, associated employer contributions and authorized deductions."

"(b) During the fiscal years ending June 30, 2010, and June 30, 2011, the aggregate amount of expenditures by the legislature from the state general fund and any special revenue fund or funds for the postage allotment for each member of the legislature, including the postage allotment provided for each committee chairperson, during calendar year 2010 as prescribed by the policy adopted by the legislative coordinating council, shall not exceed the amount equal to 50% of the postage allotment prescribed by such policy for such member of the legislature or chairperson: Provided, That, on and after the effective date of this act, if the aggregate amount of expenditures by the legislature from the state general fund and any special revenue fund or funds for the postage allotment for any member of the legislature or any committee chairperson during calendar year 2010 as prescribed by the policy adopted by the legislative coordinating council exceeds the amount equal to 50% of the postage allotment prescribed by such policy for such member of the legislature or chairperson, then no further expenditures shall be made by the legislature from the state general fund or any special revenue fund or funds for the postage allotment for any member of the legislature or any committee chairperson during calendar year 2010.";
