### **Morning Session**

Chairperson Burgess opened the meeting at 9:35 a.m.

### Charge to the Streamlining Committee

Chairperson Burgess reviewed the charge to the Committee as follows:

- Review the number and purpose of legislative joint committees, commissions, and task forces;
- Study whether the original need for a joint committee, commission, or task force is no longer present;
- Determine whether the 24 joint committees, commissions, and task forces, which have a combined membership of 229, could be reduced or combined; and
- Review the value of "sunsetting" a joint committee, commission, or task force.

Staff reviewed charges to the committees, meeting days, and related information provided to the Committee and answered questions.

### **Conferee Testimony**

Doug Mays, former Speaker of the House, reviewed appointments to special committees and their purpose. He called on his experience as Speaker to provide insight into the process of selecting and discontinuing special committees, task forces, and interim committees. He noted that each joint committee should have a specified area to study. He stated that the appointed committees in the House and Senate should be reviewed periodically, perhaps every two or four years. Committee members asked questions on topics including teleconferencing, *pro forma* days, and ways to use session time more effectively.

#### **Committee Discussion**

Topics of Committee discussion included developing a set of guidelines to use to determine when a committee should be dissolved; streamlining the length of time specified for committee meetings; the Legislative Coordinating Council's process of creating committees; referral of discontinuance of special committees and task forces to the Office of the Repealer; asking staff to provide information on committees that have not met in the previous two years and make recommendations for discontinuing statutory entities; sunsetting; whether to review existing committees on two- or four-year cycles; compensation for legislators; video conferencing for conferees and legislators; implications on the Kansas Open Meetings Act of videoconferencing; removing language regarding discontinued committees and task forces from the statutes; asking the Revisor to make a yearly recommendation to remove unneeded language in the statutes regarding committees that no longer meet; and asking the Revisor to include a repeal date in each bill establishing a new joint committee or task force.

It was moved by Senator Kelly and seconded by Representative Dillmore that any joint committee, special committees, or task force that has not met in 2009 or 2010 be discontinued and their statutes repealed. <u>Motion carried</u>. It was suggested that a list of such statutory provisions be developed by the Office of the Revisor of Statutes and sent also to the Office of the Repealer.

It was moved by Senator Kelly and seconded by Senator Masterson to recommend review of statutory committees in the second year of each Senate term, to determine which, if any, should be abolished. <u>Motion carried</u>.

It was moved by Chairperson Burgess and seconded by Senator Kelly to recommend that any legislation to establish a joint committee, special committee, or task force include a sunset provision and that the requirement be added to joint rules. <u>Motion carried</u>.

It was moved by Senator Schmidt and seconded by Senator Emler to ask the Legislative Coordinating Council to review its policy denying compensation to committee members who participate using distance technology (e.g., telephone, videoconferencing), in light of the economic issues and technology availability. <u>Motion carried</u>.

### **Afternoon Session**

Chairperson Burgess reconvened the Committee at 1:30 p.m.

Don Heiman, Legislative Chief Information Technology Officer, reported on the advances made in video technology to permit a committee member or a conferee to participate in a legislative meeting from his or her home area without traveling to Topeka. He and Dave Larson, Director, Computer Services, outlined the technology being installed in the Capitol to allow video participation in meetings from remote locations. Mr. Heiman also discussed topics including the potential for national standards for "electronic democracy" and costs for equipment, staff, and maintenance. Committee members asked questions on topics including archive costs, the value of nonverbal communication in committee meetings, and security of video archives.

It was moved by Chairperson Burgess and seconded by Representative Bowers to recommend to the Legislative Coordinating Council a review of policy regarding video conferencing for interim committees only. <u>Motion carried</u>.

There was Committee discussion on reviewing criteria for selecting the number of committee members, the preferred composition of interim committees regarding representation from each house and from the two parties, and whether more than one committee is studying the same subject.

It was moved by Senator Kelly and seconded by Senator Masterson to set an upper limit of ten legislators appointed to any joint committee, special committee, or task force. <u>Motion carried</u>.

It was moved by Senator Masterson and seconded by Representative DeGraaf to recommend repeal of statutes establishing the Joint Committee on Arts and Cultural Resources. Senator Kelly, seconded by Senator Ostmeyer, offered a substitute motion: that the responsibilities of the Joint Committee on Arts and Cultural Resources be assigned to the Joint Committee on Economic Development and that statutes relating to the Joint Committee on Arts and Cultural Resources that become unnecessary be repealed. Motion carried.

It was moved by Senator Kelly and seconded by Representative DeGraaf that statutes establishing the Joint Committee on Children's Issues be repealed and its responsibilities delegated to subject-matter committees, such as health care committees. <u>Motion carried</u>.

It was moved by Representative DeGraaf and seconded by Senator Kelly that the Legislative Coordinating Council study the possible consolidation of the Health Care Stabilization Fund Oversight Committee with the Joint Committee on Pensions, Investments, and Benefits, in light of the fiduciary responsibilities assigned to both. <u>Motion carried</u>.

It was moved by Representative DeGraaf and seconded by Representative Gatewood to study the potential consolidation of the Joint Committee on Home and Community Based Services Oversight with the Joint Committee on Health Policy Oversight. <u>Motion carried</u>.

The Committee discussed ways to provide committee oversight of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission, such as requiring regular reports to the Federal and State Affairs committees. No action was taken on that issue.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:30 p.m.

Mason's Legislative Manual, Section 645 (2010 Edition) provides guidance for determining the duration of a special committee, and is quoted below:

Discharge or Dissolution of Special Committees.

- When a special committee is appointed, it continues to exist until the purpose assigned to it has been fulfilled. A special committee ceases to exist:
  - (a) When its final report has been made;
  - (b) When the objective for which the committee was established has been accomplished;
  - (c) When the termination date established by the action creating the committee has arrived:
  - (d) When discharged; or
  - (e) At the end of the term of a legislative body.

When the final or complete report of a special committee has been received by the house, the committee is thereby dissolved or ceases to exist without any motion to that effect being made. When the report is only partial, the committee is not discharged until the final report is received.

If additional work is delegated to a special committee, the committee continues until the new assignment is completed.

- A special committee may be dissolved by discharging the committee or by 2. rescinding the order or motion providing for it.
- A special committee that has expired is revived by a vote or by the reference of 3. any matter to it.
- When a committee is discharged, the chair should promptly return to the chief 4. legislative officer all papers that have been entrusted to the committee.

No additional best practices have been developed for evaluating the continuance of special committees, according to a subject matter expert at the National Conference of State Legislatures, and *Mason's Manual* does not address dissolution of joint committees.

Some states with sunset reviews include sunset criteria applicable to committees. Those factors include whether there continues to be a public need for the entity's "product," whether the entity is effective, and whether the effort is duplicative. Following are examples of statutory language from four states:

- Arizona Revised Statutes, 41-2954. Committees of reference; membership; performance review reports; . . .D. The committee of reference shall consider but not be limited to the following factors in determining the need for continuation or termination of each agency: . . . 2. The effectiveness with which the agency has met its objective and purpose and the efficiency with which it has operated.
- Colorado Revised Statues, 2-3-1203. Sunset review of advisory committees. (1) (a) The general assembly hereby finds and declares that advisory committees are beneficial to government since they help involve private citizens in the daily operations of government and provide the government with a system for utilizing the expertise of its citizens. However, there has been no legislative supervision which would allow for the systematic review of such committees to ascertain which committees may have outlived their usefulness yet remain on the statutes through oversight or neglect and which committees may have failed to perform the functions for which they were created. . . . (b) (I) Each such advisory committee shall submit the following information . . .(D) A listing of all advisory proposals made by the advisory committee together with an indication as to whether or not each proposal has been acted on, implemented, or enacted into statute; . . .
- Maryland Annotated Code, State Government, §8–408. (c) A report on a governmental activity or unit designated for evaluation under § 8-404 of this subtitle, to the extent appropriate to the evaluation of that governmental activity or unit and consistent with the plan for evaluation, shall: (1) discuss the public purpose for which the governmental activity or unit was established and whether that purpose is still a public need; (2) discuss whether the purpose of the governmental activity or unit has changed and, if so, the consistency of changes with legislative intent and public need; (3) discuss whether the governmental activity or unit substantially duplicates other State, federal, or local governmental activities or programs or services in the private sector; . . .
- Texas Sunset Act, Chapter 325, Government Code, Section 325.011. Criteria for Review. The Commission and its staff shall consider the following criteria in determining whether a public need exists for the continuation of a state agency or its advisory committees or for the performance of the functions of the agency or its advisory committees: . . . (2)(B) the extent to which the mission, goals, and objectives have been achieved and the problem or need has been addressed; . . (6) the extent to which the jurisdiction of the agency and the programs administered by the agency overlap or duplicate those of other agencies, . . .

- b) LCC approval is required for meetings outside of Topeka. It no longer is to consider issues relating to school finance (2005 HB 2247).
- c) Members receive compensation, subsistence, and mileage for attendance at LCC approved meetings.
- d) The commission normally does not meet, nor does it conduct interim studies.
- e) LCC has authorized meetings 'as needed.' (LCC Minutes 5-19-98 and LCC Minutes 9-19-01)

### Membership of Selected Committees, Councils, and Commissions

- 1. **2010 Commission.** KSA 46-3401 *et seq.* established the 2010 Commission. The Commission is composed of 11 members as follows:
  - One member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives:
  - One member appointed by the President of the Senate;
  - One member appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives;
  - One member appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate;
  - The Chairperson of the House Education Committee:
  - The Chairperson of the Senate Education Committee;
  - One member appointed jointly by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, the President of the Senate, and the Minority Leader of the Senate;
  - Two members appointed by the Governor, of which one shall be a person licensed by the State Board of Education;
  - The Legislative Post Auditor, or the designee thereof; and
  - The Attorney General, or the designee thereof.

The Legislative Post Auditor and the Attorney General serve as *ex officio* and nonvoting members. Those appointed to the Commission do not have to be legislators. At least one member must be from the professional and business sector who is recognized for leadership and expertise in his or her field. One member must be a certified public accountant who is recognized for expertise in the area of school district financial operations and who regularly conducts or has regularly conducted audits of school districts.

Members appointed by the Speaker or Minority Leader of the House, one of the members appointed by the Governor, and the professional member serve terms of two years and until a successor is appointed and qualified. A member appointed by the President or Minority Leader of the Senate and one member appointed by the Governor serve terms of four years and until a successor is appointed and qualified. Terms of members of the Legislature appointed to the Commission will expire at the expiration of the legislative term for which such legislator was elected. Except for vacancies created by the expiration of a legislative term, a vacancy shall be filled for the unexpired term by appointment in the manner of original appointment.

Members attending authorized meetings are compensated for expenses, mileage, and subsistence as provided in subsection (e) of KSA 75-3223. Expenses for the Commission are part of the budget of the Legislative Coordinating Council and are subject to the

Background Information on the Kansas Sunset Law

### The Original Kansas Sunset Law

The Kansas Sunset Law (1978-1992) was set up dates to <u>abolish</u> selected State agencies, boards, or commissions unless the Legislature acted to retain them. Kansas was the 26<sup>th</sup> state to adopt a sunset law and 35 states had adopted sunset provisions by 1985. The initial thrust of most sunset legislation was on <u>regulatory agencies and boards</u>, but was subsequently expanded.

The Kansas Sunset Law required a performance audit of each agency, followed by public legislative hearings in both chambers. It identified 37 agencies to be abolished (all but two—SRS and KDHE—were regulatory in nature), and provided for a one-year "wind-up" period for abolished agencies. Retained agencies were continued for a maximum of six years.

### Extension of the Kansas Sunset Law

The Kansas Sunset Law was originally set to expire in 1981. The law was re-established and amended with the following changes:

- The focused shifted from regulatory activities to broad, general areas of government. More than 20 regulatory boards and commissions were removed, and larger agencies were added (Revenue, Corrections, Transportation, KCC, Human Resources, State Treasurer, Office and Commissioner of Insurance, etc.)
- The performance audits of each agency became <u>optional</u> at the direction of the Post Audit Committee. The final sunset audit was conducted in 1983.
- The review cycle for agencies was extended from six to eight years.
- The law was extended until July 1, 1984. In 1984, it was extended on final time (until 1992).

### Results of the Sunset Audits in Kansas

Legislative Post Audit conducted sunset audits of 37 agencies or programs between 1978 and 1983. Of those:

• <u>Five agencies or boards were abolished</u>. Those agencies were the Athletic Commission, Mobile Home and Recreational Vehicle Commission, Council of Advisors on Consumer Credit, Accountancy Advisory Council, and Kansas Energy Office.

## Nevada Proposal

### Membership and Voting Options—Joint Interim Committees

The following would apply to certain policy committees meeting during the interim and staffed by the Legislative Counsel Bureau. This proposal does <u>NOT</u> include the Interim Finance Committee, the Economic Forum, the Legislative Commission, and all the statutory committees and subcommittees affiliated with those entities:

- With the exceptions noted above, abolish all statutory committees and replace with Joint Interim Committees that parallel the jurisdiction of the session standing committees.
- Topics (established through legislation) would be assigned to those committees to handle as a whole or through a subcommittee during the interim.
- In some cases (e.g., Health Care and Education), duties of the existing statutory committees could be assigned all or in part to the new joint committees.

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

Each Joint Interim Committee would consist of 8 members appointed by the Legislative Commission and drawn from the parallel session standing committees—5 Assembly members and 3 Senate members. The Commission could also consider appointing members serving on topic-related subcommittees of the two budget committees. Alternates may be appointed and would be selected in the same manner. The Commission selects the Chair and Vice Chair, and these positions alternate between the houses each biennium.

### **QUORUM AND VOTING**

Five members of a Joint Interim Committee constitute a quorum, and any recommended legislation must be approved by a majority of the Senate members and a majority of the Assembly members (2 Senators, 3 Assemblymen). Other actions may be taken by a majority present.

#### ASSUMPTIONS AND COST ESTIMATE

This model assumes 9 committees conducting 5 meetings, with Natural Resources also having two permanent subcommittees (Public Lands and Tahoe/Marlette, meeting with 6 members, 4 times each, in addition to the 5 given to Natural Resources).
