Hearing on SB 191 - Amending the water rights conservation program.

Chair Schwartz explained that the proposed language being considered is contained in the Omnibus bill. However, in lieu of the Omnibus bill not passing in the Legislature, it is proposed that the language be inserted into <u>SB 191</u> for action by the Committee. The Chair further explained that the original language of <u>SB 191</u> was incorporated into <u>SB 124</u> leaving <u>SB 191</u> as a "shell" at this time.

Tamara Lawrence, Office of Revisor of Statutes, explained that the substitute language would be an appropriations bill and would be an appropriation of moneys to the laboratory testing services fee fund for the Department of Agriculture, to allow the department to authorize testing upon request (<u>Attachment 1</u>). The proposal would authorize the testing for FY 2012 only and be in effect upon publication in the Kansas register. Ms. Lawrence noted that the proposed language gives the Secretary of the Department of Agriculture the authority to set the fees.

Responding to questions from the Committee, Ms. Lawrence indicated that the legislation would only authorize payments from the one single source. Christina Allen, Legislative Research Department, indicated that the proposed language would be in effect for one year with the intent of the Department of Agriculture to return to the 2012 Legislature to establish the fees in permanent statute.

Chris Wilson, Deputy Secretary, Department of Agriculture, appeared in support of the legislation (<u>Attachment 2</u>). Ms. Wilson noted that current statute allows the Department of Agriculture's laboratory to do testing; however, does not allow for the Department to charge a fee. The Department currently has received several requests from other states to do testing and would like to be able to charge a fee for these services.

Leslie Kaufman, Kansas Cooperative Council, presented comments in support of the legislation.

The Committee expressed some concern that the proposed language does not allow for the Rules and Regulations Committee to have input on the establishment of the fees.

The hearing on **SB 191** was closed.

Representative Carlin moved to insert the proposed language into SB 191 for House Substitute for Senate Bill 191 and recommend favorable passage. The motion was seconded by Representative Schroeder.

Representative Powell moved to amend the proposed language to include Rules and Regulation Committee authorization in setting the fees. The motion was seconded by Representative Holmes. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Representative Holmes moved to recommend H Sub for SB 191 as amended favorable for passage. The

HOUSE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 191

AN ACT making and concerning appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2012, for Kansas department of agriculture; authorizing certain transfers, fees, imposing certain restrictions and limitations, and directing or authorizing certain receipts, disbursements, procedures and acts incidental to the foregoing.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

- Section 1. (a) For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2012, appropriations are hereby made, restrictions and limitations are hereby imposed, and transfers, capital improvement projects, fees, receipts, disbursements and acts incidental to the foregoing are hereby directed or authorized as provided in this act.
- (b) This act shall not be subject to the provisions of subsection (a) of K.S.A. 75-6702, and amendments thereto.

Sec. 2.

KANSAS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

(a) There is appropriated for the above agency from the following special revenue fund or funds for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2012, all moneys now or hereafter lawfully credited to and available in such fund or funds, except that expenditures other than refunds authorized by law shall not exceed the following:

Provided, That all expenditures from the laboratory testing services fee fund shall be for the purposes of providing laboratory testing of samples from other states upon request: *Provided further*, That the secretary of agriculture is hereby authorized to fix, charge and collect fees for such laboratory testing: *And provided further*, That such fees shall be fixed in order to recover all or part of the costs incurred to provide the services and any other necessary and incidental expenses incurred in conjunction with such laboratory testing: *And provided further*, That all moneys received for such fees shall be deposited in the state treasury in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto, and shall be credited to the laboratory testing services fee fund.

Testimony on Senate Bill 191 to The House Agriculture and Natural Resources Budget Committee

Good afternoon, Chairman Schwartz and Members of the Committee. I am Chris Wilson, Deputy Secretary of the Kansas Department of Agriculture, and I am here in support of amendment to SB 191. Thank you for your consideration of this bill at this time.

We respectfully request amending this bill with a provision regarding the agency's Agricultural Laboratory. The laboratory is made up of four sections. These include dairy, Microbiology/Meat and Poultry, Feed and Fertilizer, and Pesticides. We maintain the laboratory to provide credible and defendable analytical results in support of the agency regulatory programs.

Since the end of the regular Session, the Kansas Department of Agriculture has received requests for the use of our laboratory services. Other states, such as South Dakota, are facing budget reductions which will necessitate contracting for laboratory services. EPA Region VII also has asked if the agency's lab might become a regional laboratory for the purpose of pesticide analysis. Other states, including Nebraska and Missouri, are supportive of Kansas providing this regional pesticide laboratory service.

Currently, the statutory authority for our laboratory allows us to provide analysis upon request, but not to charge fees for laboratory services. In the past, when other states have requested such assistance, we have provided it on a voluntary basis at no charge. A statutory change would allow us to charge a fee for such analysis upon request. We believe this would position our laboratory for the future by receiving fees from other states, allowing Kansas to maintain a highly qualified staff and precision instrumentation.

Thank you for your consideration. Audra Gile, Agricultural Laboratory Manager, and I would respond to questions at the appropriate time.

Additional SB 191 Laboratory Information

- The Kansas Department of Agriculture Laboratory is currently unable to accept fees for analytical services with the exception of the Dairy Lab. In 2010, the Legislature approved HB 2655, which allowed the dairy program to charge for regulatory samples.
- The KDA lab has analyzed samples for other states in both the pesticide and feed labs free of charge in the past. Often it has been just one or two samples here and there for confirmation analysis, but there have been larger groups. The states that have sent samples to KDA have included Florida, Idaho, Kentucky, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Utah.

2008: 13 samples of wheat heads were analyzed for Nebraska for residues of Azoxystrobin and Propiconazole because of the alleged failure of producers to maintain the pre-harvest interval for Quilt fungicide.

2007: 41 vegetation and soil samples were analyzed for Oklahoma for multiple pesticide residues while the Oklahoma lab moved to its new facility.

2003-2004: Idaho sent all of their medicated feed samples for a 6-9 month period for analysis of antibiotics relative to label guarantees while they were between analysts. Nearly 100 samples were analyzed.

- The laboratory was recently approached by South Dakota regarding the
 possibility of running approximately 600 feed samples for them for label
 guarantees of the components of protein, fat, minerals and medication
 contained in the feed. Their laboratory is closing in October.
- There is ongoing positive discussion at EPA Region VII regarding the possibility of KDA being a regional lab for pesticide formulation and residue analysis. KDA would receive samples from Missouri and Nebraska (which do not have their own pesticide labs). Missouri and Nebraska have been supportive of the idea of sending their samples to KDA as they are not pleased with the lab they are currently using.

Unlike most Kansas Department of Agriculture programs, the Agricultural Laboratory does not serve the public directly. Instead, the goal of the Agricultural Laboratory is to provide credible and defendable analytical results in support of agency programs that carry out the department's consumer and environmental protection missions.

All samples the laboratory receives come through department inspectors and investigators; no samples are accepted directly from the public.

The laboratory is made up of four sections. These include Dairy, Microbiology/Meat and Poultry, Feed and Fertilizer, and Pesticides. Each section is tasked with specific duties depending upon the regulatory program it serves.

The Dairy section is FDA certified to analyze milk and milk products for a variety of quality-related parameters in support of the agency's Dairy Inspection Program. Examples of some of these parameters include bacteria counts, somatic cells counts, measuring added water, testing for proper pasteurization, and testing for the presence of antibiotics.

The staff in this section must be individually certified for each test they perform. One staff member is the state's Laboratory Evaluation Officer and is tasked with providing training and conducting audits of producers that bottle milk for direct sale to the public to ensure they are correctly performing antibiotic screenings.

The Microbiology/Meat and Poultry section conducts microbiological testing of raw and ready-to-eat meat samples, trim samples, carcass swabs, and poultry rinses, as well as environmental samples from production facilities, for the presence of pathogens including Salmonella spp, Listeria monocytogenes, and E. coli O157:H7. Meat samples are also tested for protein, moisture and fat content, and cures and branding inks are also analyzed. Samples are received through the department's Meat and Poultry Inspection program.

The Feed and Fertilizer section analyzes samples for the Agricultural Commodities Assurance Program and the Pesticide and Fertilizer program. Animal feeds and pet foods are checked to see that they contain the amount of protein, fat, vitamins, minerals, non-protein nitrogen, fiber and moisture indicated in their product label guarantees. The amounts of antibiotics and other drugs are measured in medicated feeds. Feeds are also screened for mycotoxins and pet foods for melamine. Ruminant feeds are screened for the presence of prohibited materials. Fertilizers are analyzed to determine the amounts of nitrogen, phosphorus, potash or sulfur indicated on the product label. They are also screened see if they contain excessive amounts of a variety of heavy metals, such as arsenic or lead.


The Pesticide section provides analysis of all classes of pesticides in support of the Pesticide and Fertilizer program. Most of the samples received for residue testing are vegetation and soil, and result from use or misuse investigations, but they could also be water, swabs or clothing. Tank mix and product samples are also received and analyzed to confirm active ingredients, see that they are mixed properly, or that label guarantees are being met by the manufacturer. The Pesticide section also screens raw milk samples for some 45 different pesticides for the Dairy Inspection program.

As a whole, the Agricultural Laboratory performed more than 30,000 determinations on more than 7,500 samples during fiscal year 2010. The number of samples received by the laboratory decreased by approximately 18 percent from fiscal year 2009. The fiscal year 2010 figure is 8 percent less than that of fiscal year 2008. The majority of the samples received by the laboratory are milk and dairy products, and animal feeds and pet foods.


The success of the laboratory is due to the expertise of our highly trained staff and our precision instrumentation. Each section of the lab successfully participates in national and international check sample programs. Due to budget cuts, the laboratory has been understaffed by three FTE over the last several years. This has required staff members to pick up extra duties and cross-train in other areas.

Staff cannot support the regulatory programs without proper instrumentation. Fiscal year 2010 saw the signing of Senate Bill 396 creating the Laboratory Equipment Fund for the repair and replacement of laboratory instrumentation and equipment. This fund will be a great asset to the laboratory because it will help us acquire and maintaining the instrumentation and equipment needed to fulfill our commitments to the agency.

Also in fiscal year 2010, the FDA BSE grant originally awarded in 2005 reached its conclusion. We applied for the new FDA Feed Safety and BSE/Ruminant Feed Ban Project grant last spring and the grant awards were announced in September. We will receive \$1.1 million over the next five years to be used for a variety of feed safety and ruminant feed ban projects. A portion of this grant will allow the laboratory to retain a staff member and purchase equipment and instrumentation to be used to fulfill the mission of the grant. Projects include continuing prohibited material testing, more in depth mycotoxin screening, testing pet foods for Salmonella spp, and checking feeds for drug residues.

The Agricultural Laboratory program budget for fiscal year 2010 was \$1,264,797. 16 percent came from state general fund, 12 percent came from federal funds, and 72 percent came from fees.

The program had approval for 17.2 full-time equivalent and 2 unclassified temporary positions in fiscal year 2010.
