1 AN ACT concerning cities and counties; relating to residential fire
2 protection sprinkler systems; amending K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 12-16,219
3 and repealing the existing section.

5 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:*

6 Section 1. K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 12-16,219 is hereby amended to read
7 as follows: 12-16,219. (a) As used in this section:

8 (1) "Municipality" means any city or county.

9 (2) "Residential structure" means any improvement to real property
10 to be used or occupied as a single-family dwelling or multi-family
11 dwelling of two attached living units or less or any manufactured home.

12 (b) On and after July 1, 2010, no municipality shall adopt or enforce
13 any ordinance, order, code, standard or rule requiring the installation of a
14 multi-purpose residential fire protection sprinkler system or any other fire
15 sprinkler protection system in any residential structure. Nothing in this
16 section shall prohibit any person from voluntarily installing a multi-
17 purpose residential fire protection sprinkler system or any other fire
18 sprinkler protection system in a residential structure.

19 (c) ~~The provisions of this section shall expire on July 1, 2011. No~~
20 ~~municipality shall require the installation of a multi-purpose residential~~

Re: Fire Related Statistics

Per your request made on January 26, this memorandum answers questions you posed regarding the loss of property and lives in Kansas due to fire.

According to data collected by the State Fire Marshal's Office and the National Fire Incident Reporting System's database, there were 8,992 fires in Kansas during FY 2010. These fires resulted in the loss of property collectively worth \$60.5 million. There were 225 fire-related injuries, including 132 civilian and 93 fire service injuries. There were a total of 42 fire-related deaths, including 3 fire service, 5 automotive, and 34 civilian deaths.
