RE: Report to the Legislature Regarding the Availability of Broadband Services in the State of Kansas, as directed by the 2008 Legislature in K.S.A. 66-1250 through 1254.

The attached report is provided pursuant to the requirements of K.S.A 2009 Supp. 66-1250 through 66-1254. K.S.A. 66-1251 states:

- a) On or before January 15, 2009, and annually thereafter, subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 66-1252, and amendments thereto, the commission shall report to the legislature on broadband service being provided in the state of Kansas. Such report shall include the following information:
- (1) A report by census tract or other identifiable geographic unit indicating whether broadband service is available and the number of providers that offer service to customers in each census tract;
- (2) Beginning with the commission's report in 2010, a report by census tract of the change in: (A) The number of broadband providers; and (B) the geographic area or census tract where broadband service is available.
- (b) The commission shall maintain the information provided by each provider pursuant to K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 66-1250, and amendments thereto, as confidential and shall report only the aggregated information by census tract to the legislature. In maintaining the information, the commission shall adhere to the confidentiality provisions in K.S.A. 66-1220a, and amendments thereto.
- (c) The commission, after consulting with broadband providers, may adopt rules and regulations as necessary to establish the form and manner in which the provider information

shall be submitted and to fulfill all other requirements of the commission under this act.

(d) The commission shall, in addition to those reports required by subsection (a), on or before January 15, 2008, and annually thereafter, report to the legislature the names of the broadband service providers that fail to comply with the reporting requirements of K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 66-1250, and amendments thereto.

However, the Commission notes that K.S.A. 66-1252 states:

In the event the federal government or any federal agency implements a national program to collect information regarding broadband service deployment, the provisions of K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 66-1250 and subsections (a), (c) and (d) of K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 66-1251, and amendments thereto, shall no longer be effective, and the commission shall collect such broadband service data and report such data to the legislature in a form and manner that is in conformance with such federal program.

In accordance with K.S.A. 66-1252, the Commission's report has relied exclusively on the Federal Communications Commission's bi-annual report of *High-Speed Services for Internet Access*. That report solicited and summarized high-speed service availability by zip code.

This year's report draws primarily on data compiled by Connect Kansas¹ and provides a more granular view of availability in Kansas with data collected at the census block level. This data collection undertaking was initiated by the federal Broadband Data Improvement Act, signed into law October 10, 2008, and funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. The effort is guided by the State Broadband Data and Development Grant Progam, its Notice of Funds Availability (NOFA) (0660-ZA29) and its 12 page Technical Appendix identifying and defining the respective data elements to be collected.

In addition to the collection of broadband specific data, the process makes use of census data including population, household and other demographic statistics. The information is compiled using the following definitions:

<u>Households</u>: A household includes all of the people who occupy a housing unit. A housing unit is a house, an apartment, a mobile home, a group of rooms, or a single room occupied (or if vacant, intended for occupancy) as separate living quarters. Separate living quarters are those in which the occupants live separately from any other people in the building and that have direct

access from the outside of the building or through a common hall. The occupants may be a single family, one person living alone, two or more families living together, or any other group of related or unrelated people who share living quarters.²

<u>Speeds:</u> The Download/Upload speeds are "Maximum Advertised Download/Upload Speeds"³ as indicated in the following Attachments.

<u>Served:</u> "... 'broadband service' is 'available' at an address if the provider does, or could, within a typical service interval (seven to ten business days) without an extraordinary commitment of resources, provision two-way data transmission to and from the Internet with advertised speeds of at least 768 kilobits per second (kbps) downstream and greater than 200 kbps upstream to endusers at that address."

Broadband service generally refers to the high speed transmission of digital (as opposed to analog) signals. Such transmission is necessary for the efficient connection and transmission of telephony, video and data communications. The more specific definition of broadband service is an evolving definition. K.S.A. 66-1,187(a) defines broadband service as "... the transmission of digital signals at rates equal to or greater than 1.5 megabits per second." The FCC currently defines the service as a transmission rate of at least 768 kbps down (toward the end user) and 200 kbps up (from the end user). The National Broadband Plan recommends a target of 4 mbps down and 1 mbps up⁵. This status report presents data using the FCC's criteria (Attachments B & C) and the National Broadband Plan's recommendation (Attachments D & E).

This year's report is presented in five attachments summarized at the county level. Additional granularity is available down to the census block level and is available at the Connect Kansas website, http://www.connectkansas.org/mapping/Census_Block-Level_Data.php.

Attachment A illustrates the number of broadband service providers in Kansas and adjacent states.

Attachment B illustrates the number and percent of households where broadband service is available. This Attachment utilizes the FCC's current definition of broadband service of 768 kbps download and 200 kbps upload speeds, <u>less</u> satellite coverage. The Attachment shows a statewide average of 99.72% with twenty-one (21) counties falling below the state average. Chautauqua's 1,796 households have the lowest availability at 68.25%.

Attachment C illustrates the number and percent of households where broadband service is available. This Attachment utilizes the FCC's current definition of broadband service of 768 kbps download and 200 kbps upload speeds, <u>less</u> satellite and mobile wireless coverage. The

Attachment shows a statewide average of 97.16% with fifty-seven (57) counties falling below the state average. Chautauqua has the lowest availability at 66.6%.

Attachment D illustrates the number and percent of households where broadband service is available. This Attachment utilizes the National Broadband Plan's recommended definition⁶ of broadband service of 4 mbps download and 1 mbps upload speeds, <u>less</u> satellite coverage. The Attachment shows a statewide average of 99.41% with twenty-six (26) counties falling below the state average. Chautauqua has the lowest availability at 66.6%.

Attachment E illustrates the number and percentage of households where broadband service is available. This Attachment utilizes the National Broadband Plan's recommended definition⁷ of broadband service of 4 mbps download and 1 mbps upload speeds, <u>less</u> satellite and mobile wireless overage. The Attachment shows a statewide average of 92.74% with sixty-seven (67) counties falling below the state average. Linn's 3,807 households has the lowest availability at 23.62%.

Satellite service coverage, while it is generally available throughout the state, is not included herein because of the service providers inability to precisely (down to street address level) indicate its coverage area. Satellite service generally requires a clear unobstructed path between the end user's antenna and the southwest sky.
