## CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT BRIEF HOUSE BILL NO. 2332

As Agreed to March 31, 2003

## **Brief** \*

HB 2332 amends the Employment Security Law by doing away with the current requirement that a person's unemployment benefits have 50 percent of Social Security and Railroad Retirement Act benefits deducted from unemployment benefit payments.

In addition, the bill modifies the formula for unemployment benefits for one year. Under the bill two weeks of additional benefits would be given to claimants who exhaust regular benefits and any other federal or state extended benefits from July 1, 2003 to June 30, 2004. The bill clarifies that employers would not be charged for any extended or additional benefits.

Finally, the bill amends the Employment Security Law by changing Kansas law to match federal law regarding an unemployment tax on employers who hire immigrant agricultural workers. The bill does away with this unemployment assessment.

## **Background**

The sponsor appeared in favor of the bill. Others who testified in support of the measure included conferees from the AARP, the Kansas AFL-CIO, the Older Kansan Employment Program, and a private citizen. The Chief Counsel from the Department of Human Resources who provided information stated support for the bill. The Employment Security Advisory Council has endorsed the bill.

The fiscal note on the original bill indicates that unemployment benefits paid from the Employment Security Trust Fund would increase by \$1.2 million.
