My name is Jonathan Smith, a voter in Shawnee County, and it is my opinion that the wording of HB 2476 would allow giant agrichemical manufacturers to much more easily be shielded from litigation in the event that their products end up causing calamitous harms. It is for this reason that I urge you all to vote in opposition of HB 2476.

We have all seen times in history from various pesticide manufacturers, where their best intentions lead to horrendous outcomes, ruining land, harming or killing people. Do we not remember DDT?

There were prizes and fortunes made on the wondrous effects and efficiency of DDT as an insecticide, all for us to realize years later that it was leading, with a fairly strong correlation, to the near eradication of the Bald Eagle and Peregrine Falcon, both species who saw large population growths after discontinuing the use of DDT nationally.

The story of Roundup is also similar! With high praise and widespread use being the norm before realizing that it was fairly likely to be causing cancer in humans, as well as decimating local insect populations, which leads to local collapse of bird populations, which has a large impact on the health of trees in the local ecosystem and animals that eat birds and bird eggs, and when the trees go, we see multiple negative health consequences for us as humans.
