Chair Estes and Member of the House Education Committee,

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in favor of passing out HB 2330, which makes November 14th Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day in Kansas. Ruby's inspiring story is inextricably tied to Kansas history, with the historic SCOTUS decision in Brown v. Topeka Board of Education, which declared that segregated schools are unconstitutional, 70 years ago. She became the most recognized icon of desegregation when she was the subject of Norma Rockwell's 1964 painting, *"The Problem We All Live With."*

Since 2021, Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day is celebrated nationwide for students to unite for a "<u>Day of</u> <u>Dialogue</u>" inspiring youth and creating positive change in our communities. I've seen this in action for Kansas students since becoming involved in 2023, when hundreds of students took part in seven Kansas counties. Those students were so inspired by Ruby's story of courage and resilience, that they <u>invited her to come to</u> <u>Kansas</u> in 2024, the 70th anniversary of Brown V. Board. She said YES! And on <u>November 14th, 2024</u>, she shared her story in person with 1000 students at Washburn University and via livestream at ten schools across the entire state.

Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day ties our state's history with a living historical icon, making it more real and relevant to today's students. I know this session is moving at a very fast pace, so I urge you to consider the overwhelming support for HB 2330 in this hearing today, and take action to suspend the rules, work the bill, and pass it out favorably today, the last day to do so. My name is William Rose-Heim, minister, consultant and USAF veteran, currently volunteering with an organization that works to help resettle refugees in the greater Kansas City metropolitan area. I support **HB 2330 – "**permanently recognizing November 14 of each year designated as Ruby Bridges walk to school day in the state of Kansas. My wife and I and two of our children were present in 1997 for the 40th anniversary celebration of the integration of Central High School in Little Rock with the Governor and U.S. President presiding. We had an opportunity to meet in a special service with members of the Little Rock Nine. Our children appreciate the importance of remembering that we in the United States are committed to assuring that every child receives respect, protection, and the best public education we can provide.

Military service first impressed upon me the practical application of education about the full story of our nation's history. The 22nd Security Police Squadron was charged to provide security for (among other base assets) B-52 alert aircraft loaded with weapons of mass destruction. Among us skin colors ran the gamut from dark to light. We spoke English in a variety of dialects, some with the accents of first and second-generation immigrants. We did not all like each other. We certainly did not agree politically. We were bound by an oath to protect and defend the Constitution of the United States of America and a mission to safeguard people, planes, and weapons of mass destruction. It helped that we all took training in diversity, equity and inclusion before it was known by those three words. Back then it was called Human Relations, and it was vital training for all of us who had to pull together well when it counted most. We never lost a weapon, a plane or a life we were to secure. Many of the children in our Kansas public schools will grow up to hold positions of grave responsibility. Passing HB 2330 will play a small but vital role in assuring that our children will be well equipped to serve and lead among all people.
