Although our student body is predominantly Catholic, TMP-Marian welcomes all faiths. We are committed to making the years students spend at our school meaningful.

TMP-Marian offers more athletics and activities than any other 2A school in the state of Kansas. On the athletic side, TMP-Marian offers volleyball, cross-country, football, basketball, wrestling, baseball, softball, track and golf. Some of the activities that are offered include debate, forensics, chess team, musicals, science club, Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA), TMP Pop singers, choir, band, art club, FFA (Future Farmers of America), Key Club, gardening club, Monarch Music Ministry, and scholar's bowl.

I am writing today to share my support for SB 114, which would allow students in early college programs to fully participate in all KSHSAA activities. At TMP, we believe that academics are the top priority, but we also encourage our students to also participate in activities outside of the classroom. We believe that it helps students to explore diverse interests, build social connections, and contribute to the community.
