SB87: Expanding student eligibility under the tax credit for low-income students scholarship

Thank you Madam Chair and Members of the House Education Committee,

My first order of business is to sincerely apologize to the Chair and anyone who felt that my previous testimony on HB 2136 implied that ANY church or private school is a tax scammer. I want to make it clear that the BILL is a tax scam, not any organization or family that makes use of it.

I still stand in strong opposition to SB87, as amended, further draining State General Funds and funneling them to private schools. The amendment keeps the current tax credit at 75%, but with the eligibility changes proposed in this bill, it can no longer even be pretended that it's just to help "low income" students. Four new categories of eligibility are opened up with NO income limits. If a recipient's family qualifies once, they maintain eligibility no matter how high their income shoots up. Foster and kinship care is now included no matter the income, as are Military, EMS Firefighters, LEO's etc.

Let's see how this can really play out:

An Army Colonel at Ft Leavenworth can make over \$9,000 a month in just basic pay and be married to a physician who makes six figures and qualify for \$8,000 per child per year.

That means that millionaires in my district with six figure incomes, and access to the TOP public schools in the state, can potentially enroll their children in eligible private schools to bankroll \$8,000 a year, for a dozen years, netting \$96,000, per child.

This tax credit is an unconscionable siphon of State General Funds from their intended support of state functions to private schools. Taxpayers can sweep 75 cents of every dollar of their tax liability, up to half a million dollars each! Instead of supporting Public Safety, Water, Agriculture, Humans Services, Colleges, they divert 75% of these SGF dollars to private schools. See attached for the complete list.

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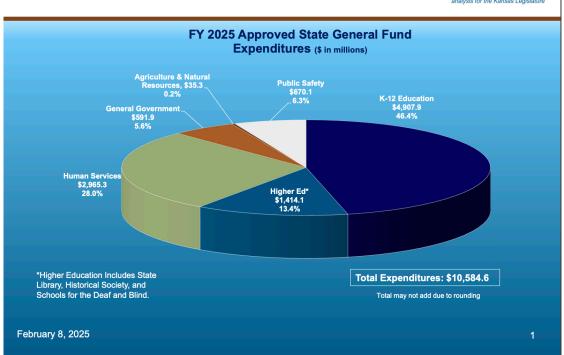
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Where does the money go?
