## Testimony in Opposition to House Bill 2343 Senate Commerce Committee

Chairman Alley and Members of the Senate Commerce Committee:

The Northeast Johnson County cities of Prairie Village, Mission, Merriam, Roeland Park, and Westwood Hills oppose HB 2343. We appreciate the opportunity to provide testimony in opposition to HB 2343, which we believe directly challenges local government home rule authority of our locally elected officials because of the overly broad language and the potential impacts that may not be in the best interest of our community.

Our interpretation of this bill is that by utilizing the term “no-impact home-based business” the bill does not allow a local unit of government to require any application, registration, permitting, or licensing for any such business. The bill prohibits any local ordinance regarding the number of employees or contractors unless a city has a residential capacity ordinance. Any commercial project taking place in a residential community would have no limits on employees, and it’s unlikely we could address work hours or any sound nuisance issues as well.

The bill defines a “no-impact home-based business” as one which only sells goods or services. Unfortunately, the other stated limitations of no on-street parking and no substantial increase in residential traffic are both difficult to monitor or control and almost impossible to define (in the case of “substantial increase”). The property owner determines the variables including the use of the dwelling or any dwellings/buildings added to the property. Additionally, if the no-impact home-based business may extend to the entire premises, next door neighbors may be subject to business property and activities in neighboring backyards. Our community interest opposes this bill for the benefit of the property owners who may have to live with and suffer the impacts of anyone exploiting this bill.

Our citizens are best served when our locally elected officials have the freedom to conduct the business of their jurisdictions with views that best reflect the needs and desires of their constituents. We put regulations in place to preserve property values within our communities and ensure that we preserve the peace by limiting commercial activity within neighborhoods. HB 2343 as written would impact our ability to conduct business and protect residential neighborhoods.
