

Senate Committee on Public Health and Welfare **Proponent Testimony on Senate Bill 67** Presented by William Wilk, Senior Director of Government Affairs

## Thursday, February 13, 2025

Madam Chair and members of the committee, my name is William Wilk, Senior Director of Government Affairs for the Kansas Chamber. The Kansas Chamber appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony in support Senate Bill 67, which authorizes independent practice registered nurse anesthetists.

In 2022 the Kansas Legislature passed S Sub for HB 2279 allowing for the independent practice for Advanced Practice Registered Nurses. SB 67 would remove government-imposed barriers that increase the regulatory burden and restrict trained health care professionals from performing their work to the full extent of their training. Healthcare, like all other industries, faces a workforce shortage. Those challenges are made worse by unnecessary state laws and regulations restricting access to affordable, high quality health care for Kansans.

Today, CRNA's serve as the sole anesthesia provider in a majority of Kansas counties and according to their industry, account for 80% of anesthesia cases in our state. Whether we are talking about APRN's, dentists or CRNA's, we should ensure that state law does its job to protect patients without limiting competition in the marketplace. Those two philosophies can coexist and are not mutually exclusive.

The Kansas Chamber will continue to advocate for policies that reduce government barriers on our healthcare professionals without sacrificing any safety concerns when it comes to the regulation of health-related issues and practices. We should allow our health professionals to practice what they have learned and been trained to do through technological advancements in healthcare. Removing these government barriers will increase access to healthcare professionals, reducing current wait times to receive diagnoses and treatments for Kansans across the state.

We would encourage this committee to continue evaluating state policies and removing government created regulatory barriers where possible. Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of Senate Bill 67, and I'm happy to answer questions at the appropriate time
