



**Senate Committee on Public Health and Welfare  
Testimony in Support to House Bill 2219  
Presented by William Wilk, Senior Director of Government Affairs**

**Wednesday, March 5, 2025**

Madam Chair and members of the committee, my name is William Wilk, Senior Director of Government Affairs for the Kansas Chamber. The Kansas Chamber appreciates the opportunity to submit proponent testimony to House Bill 2219, enacting the physician assistant licensure compact to provide interstate practice privileges for physician assistants.

The Kansas Chamber formed the Military and Veteran Affairs Council in 2023. The mission of the Military and Veterans Affairs Council is to provide a unified voice to support and grow our state's military institutions and to build stronger relationships between the servicemember and employer communities.

A legislative issue that was brought to our attention through the Military and Veteran Affairs Council was occupational licensing compacts. These compacts are Department of Defense initiatives for states to pass and implement for military spouses and families moving across the country. These interstate compacts streamline the transfer of occupational licenses across state lines. The compacts do not add any additional licensing requirements, change the Kansas licensing requirements for occupations, nor change the continuing education requirements.

Like most occupation fields, especially ones in healthcare, Kansas is experiencing a shortage in Physician Assistants. Over 60 of Kansas' 105 counties are deemed as medically underserved due to physician shortages. This compact will not only help streamline the licensing process of military spouses who are PA's but serve as a tool to assist Kansas in the overall shortage of physician assistants. Physician Assistants are trained and work right under the supervision of a doctor and can help relieve the doctor's role, especially in rural areas.

As I have stated in testimony on previous occupational compact licensing bills, it is important that the language remains the same of what is passed in other states for these compacts to work. This bill was amended by the House Health and Human Services Committee with friendly, technical amendments we provided for the committee.

In closing the Kansas Chamber views this compact as a necessary step to increase access to physician associates for Kansans and fast track the licensing process for military spouses moving into our state.
