However, the substantial upfront capital required for these projects necessitates a stable environment where investments won't be undermined by utility-owned chargers backed by risk-free capital. SB 167 would establish that environment, promoting a fairer competitive landscape that encourages innovation and expansion in the EV charging sector.

Moreover, by ensuring that electric utilities can only operate EV charging stations through unregulated subsidiaries, this legislation will help prevent the unfair pricing advantages that currently exist. It is vital that electric utilities offer the same rates to themselves that they provide to private businesses. This equality in electricity pricing is essential for creating a vibrant, competitive market for EV charging, allowing all providers to thrive without undue advantage.

Establishing a collaborative framework between fuel retailers and electric utilities will enhance the customer experience for EV drivers, ensuring convenient access to charging stations across the

state. With SB 167 in place, both sectors can focus on their strengths—fuel retailers on providing exceptional service and electric utilities on efficient energy distribution.

In conclusion, SB 167 is not just an important legislative measure; it is a necessary policy to foster a competitive, innovative, and sustainable EV charging market in Kansas.
