Presented by highly trained law enforcement officers, D.A.R.E. This includes coping with high-risk circumstances including drugs, alcohol, violence, bullying, internet safety, and more.

The D.A.R.E. curricula was developed through partnerships with some of the most respected institutions and individuals in America. This includes the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy, U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, National Institute on Drug Abuse, Penn State University, Arizona State University, University of Akron, as well as leading experts in the field of drug abuse, prevention science, and medicine.
