**SUBJECT:** Fiscal Note for HB 2110 by House Committee on Energy, Utilities and Telecommunication

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2110 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

HB 2110 would require the State 911 Board to collect and distribute the 911 fees or contract for those services beginning January 1, 2026. Currently, the State 911 Board is required to contract with a local collection point administrator for those services.

HB 2110 would create the State 911 Grant Fund, the State 911 Operations Fund, and the State 911 Fund on July 1, 2025, instead of January 1, 2026. On July 1, 2025, the State 911 Board would transfer \$1.0 million from the 911 Operations Fund that is outside the state treasury to the State 911 Operations Fund that is inside the state treasury.


Currently, if the balance of the State 911 Grant Fund is greater than \$2.0 million prior to distribution, then \$0.01 from every 911 fee goes back to the public safety answering points (PSAPs). HB 2110 would remove the \$2.0 million threshold, and the \$0.01 would remain in the fund.

The bill would allow the State 911 Board to transfer part of the unencumbered balance of the State 911 Operations Fund to the State 911 Grant Fund no more than once a year, as long as the transfer does not impair the Board's ability to meet statutory requirements. The bill would make a technical correction for minimum distributions to PSAPs.

The State 911 Board indicates that the bill would not affect agency operations. The Board states that the potential increase in the State 911 Grant Fund could reduce the reliance on local general funds for equipment since more funds could be available to distribute. Any fiscal effect associated with HB 2110 is not reflected in *The FY 2026 Governor's Budget Report*.

The Kansas Association of Counties states that the bill could affect revenues to local PSAPs; however, the fiscal effect cannot be estimated. The League of Kansas Municipalities states that the bill could decrease the amount of revenues to cities since the distribution amounts are unknown. The League cannot estimate a precise fiscal effect.
