SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for HB 2612 by House Committee on Judiciary


In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2612 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

HB 2612 would require a supervision term to be based on the longest supervision term imposed for certain crimes and supervision durations established in statute. The bill specifies that such an increase shall not be considered a departure from sentencing guidelines and would not be subject to appeal.

The Sentencing Commission states that enactment of the bill could increase prison admissions and beds, but a precise fiscal effect cannot be estimated. The Department of Corrections indicates enactment of the bill could increase expenditures if prison admissions and beds increase. However, a precise fiscal effect cannot be estimated.

The Office of Judicial Administration indicates enactment of the bill could increase expenditures of the Judicial Branch. The Office states the bill could require court services officers to supervise certain offenders for a longer period of time, which could increase the workload of the Judicial Branch. However, a precise fiscal effect cannot be estimated. Any fiscal effect associated with HB 2612 is not reflected in *The FY 2027 Governor's Budget Report*.
