SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for HB 2633 by House Committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2633 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

HB 2633 would increase the maximum service charge fee for licenses, permits, stamps, and other issues from the Department of Wildlife and Parks that are issued or sold by the Secretary, county clerks, or agents from not to exceed \$1.00 to not to exceed \$2.00. The service fee for the migratory waterfowl habitat stamp, which is an exception, would be increased from not to exceed \$0.50 to not exceed \$1.00.


The Department of Wildlife and Parks states that enactment of the bill has the potential to increase revenues for the Department, county clerks, and other licensing vendors. The Department only receives service charge fees from sales made over the phone and through their offices. Even though the bill creates the ability to increase the maximum fees, the Secretary would set the service charge fee amounts. The Department used the average sales from FY 2024 and FY 2025 to create the following estimates. There are three general types of vendors that include the Department, vendors (i.e. Walmart and Academy), and Brandt (an online licensing agent on contract with the Department). The two-year average for fees collected from the migratory waterfowl habitat (MWH) stamps by the Department was \$586. If the fee is increased to \$1.00, the agency could receive \$1,172, an increase of \$586. The two-year average for fees collected from all other issues by the Department was \$42,434. If the fee is increased to \$2.00, the agency could receive \$84,868, an increase of \$42,434. Thus, the Department's revenues could increase by \$43,020 starting in FY 2027. Any fiscal effect associated with HB 2633 is not reflected in *The FY 2027 Governor's Budget Report*.

The Kansas Association of Counties states that the bill would increase revenues because county clerks' offices would retain the additional service charge fees. However, a precise fiscal effect cannot be estimated.

Based on the Department of Wildlife and Paks average sales from FY 2024 and FY 2025, the following estimates are for the various vendors and Brandt. The two-year average for fees collected from the MWH stamps by vendors was \$3,297. If the fee is increased to \$1.00, the vendors could receive \$6,594, an increase of \$3,297. The two-year average for fees collected from all other issues by the vendors was \$182,122. If the fee is increased to \$2.00, the vendors could receive \$364,244, an increase of \$182,122. Thus, the increase in vendors' revenues could total \$185,419 starting in FY 2027.

For Brandt, the two-year average for fees collected from the MWH stamps was \$18,054. If the fee is increased to \$1.00, then Brandt could receive \$36,108, an increase of \$18,054. For all other issuances, the two-year average for fees collected was \$503,639. If the fee is increased to \$2.00, then Brandt could receive \$1,007,278, an increase of \$503,639. Therefore, total increase for Brandt could be \$521,693. However, the fees Brant charges are set in contract, if the contract was not amended to increase Brandt's service charge fees, their fee would be less than the fees charged by the Department of Wildlife and Parks and other vendors. It is possible that more consumers could start to use Brandt, thus increasing their revenues and decreasing the Department's and other vendors' revenues.
