SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for SB 328 by Senate Committee on Public Health and Welfare


In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning SB 328 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

Under current law, a pharmacist is permitted to distribute epinephrine auto-injectors to a school pursuant to a prescription made by a physician or mid-level practitioner in the name of the school. SB 328 would remove “auto-injectors” and would instead permit a pharmacist to distribute epinephrine delivery systems to a school. The bill would also amend several definitions, including amending the definition of “epinephrine auto-injector” and changing it to “epinephrine delivery system.” An epinephrine delivery system would mean “a device that is approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration, contains a premeasured dose of epinephrine and is used to administer epinephrine into the human body.” The bill would also make technical changes.

Both the Board of Healing Arts and the Board of Pharmacy state that there would be no fiscal effect on either agency if the bill is enacted. The Kansas State Department of Education states there would be no fiscal effect on the agency resulting from the bill’s enactment.

The Kansas Association of School Boards indicates the bill’s enactment could have a fiscal effect on school districts by expanding the types of epinephrine delivery systems school districts are permitted to include in their emergency medication kits; however, the Association is unable to estimate a fiscal effect.
