**SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for SB 414 by Senate Committee on Judiciary**

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning SB 414 is respectfully submitted to your committee.


SB 414 would expand the types of facilities eligible to receive funding from the Evidence-Based Programs Fund of the Department of Corrections. Under current law, the Secretary of Corrections may enter into memorandums of agreement with other cabinet agencies to provide up to \$2.0 million annually from the account for juvenile crisis intervention services provided by a licensed juvenile crisis intervention center. The bill would expand eligibility for this funding to include other residential facilities licensed by the Department for Children and Families or the Department for Aging and Disability Services that have a program purpose of behavioral health crisis intervention for juveniles.

The Department of Corrections indicates that SB 414 would not increase state expenditures beyond the \$2.0 million annually that is already authorized in current law for juvenile crisis intervention services from the Evidence-Based Programs Fund. The bill would expand the types of facilities eligible for the existing funding but would not change the total amount available.

The Department for Aging and Disability Services indicates that enactment of the bill could result in increased costs if funds were used for children's crisis respite facility creation, operation, and services. The Department notes that there are currently not enough children's crisis respite beds in the state. However, a specific cost estimate cannot be determined at this time. The

Department for Children and Families indicates that the bill would have no fiscal effect on its operations.
