**SUPPLEMENTAL NOTE ON HOUSE BILL NO. 2740**

As Recommended by House Committee on  
Health and Human Services

**Brief\***

HB 2740 would amend law regarding the compounding of drugs to adopt the compounding standards established by the following general chapters of the U.S. Pharmacopeia (USP) and its referenced companion documents in effect on July 1, 2027:

- USP 795 Pharmaceutical Compounding – Nonsterile Preparations;
- USP 797 Pharmaceutical Compounding – Sterile Preparations; and
- USP 825 Radiopharmaceuticals – Preparation, Compounding, Dispensing, and Repackaging.

Current law requires the Kansas Board of Pharmacy (Board) to adopt rules and regulations regarding compounding practices. The bill would allow the Board to adopt such rules and regulations, as well as establish exemptions or waivers from the requirements established in the USP.

The provisions of the bill would be effective on July 1, 2027.

## **Background**

The bill was introduced by the House Committee on Health and Human Services at the request of Representative W. Carpenter on behalf of the Board.

### ***House Committee on Health and Human Services***

In the House Committee hearing, **proponent** testimony was provided by a representative of the Board, who stated that the standards in the USP have been adopted by reference under federal law and by more than 35 states. The conferee noted that the Board conducts routine inspections and audits of Kansas pharmacies and outsourcing facilities and believes that most facilities are already compliant with the current USP standards, but the Board will provide a new webpage and awareness campaign to help the transition before the bill would be effective on July 1, 2027.

No other testimony was provided.

## **Fiscal Information**

According to the fiscal note prepared by the Division of the Budget on the bill, the Board states any fiscal effect resulting from the bill's enactment would be absorbed within existing resources.
