"The paucity of insurance benefits for effective treatments of ASDs very likely contributed to lasting functional impairment of individuals with autistic and related disorders. To the extent that such care cannot be funded by parents, nor provided publicly, individuals are likely to endure life-long cognitive and social deficits with enormous direct and indirect social costs (see Ganz, 2007)."
