Chairman Carlson and members of the Committee:

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in favor of House Bill 2763.

My name is Ronald E. Long. I am retired and have been a resident of Rose Hill, Kansas for the past 30 years.

For decades, special interest groups have made their annual pilgrimage to the Capitol in Topeka seeking to preserve and protect their various exemptions and tax credits.

Their mantra has always been the same: "It's OK to gore someone else's ox, but not mine." Fact is, for myself, and indeed for the entire State of Kansas, I urge you today that we no longer want to keep feeding that same old under-producing ox called the Income Tax.
