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## STATE OF KANSAS Senate Committee on Ethics and Elections Testimony on House Bill 2437

## Secretary of State Kris W. Kobach

March 15, 2012

## Madam Chair and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of House Bill 2437. I proposed this bill to move the effective date of the requirement to provide evidence of United States citizenship from January 1, 2013 to June 15, 2012. Because of changes in the Division of Motor Vehicles' modernization project schedule, we are now requesting this committee to approve the bill with an amendment that creates a "soft assessment period" between June 15, 2012 and December 31, 2012. Passage of this bill will put all of the protections of the 2011 Secure and Fair Elections Act (S.A.F.E.) into place before the bulk of the anticipated voter registration activity this year.

Under S.A.F.E. as it was amended last year, voters are required to provide photo identification when voting in the 2012 elections, but the proof of U.S. citizenship requirement for registration was delayed until January 1, 2013 after the 2012 presidential election.

H.B. 2437 would move the implementation date forward by six months. Currently, the law is set to go into effect roughly two months after the Presidential election this November. As I have already presented to this committee, there have been reports of voter fraud in Kansas in the past. The 2010 Election was no different. There were 41 additional reports of voter fraud. The total number of cases since 1997 is now 235, as the attached chart indicates.

Even more importantly, for the purpose of the proof of citizenship requirement, my office discovered 32 aliens who were registered to vote in Kansas last year. This number only includes lawfully present aliens who applied for driver's licenses. When the total number of illegal aliens who did not apply for a driver's license is calculated, this number could be much higher. Unlike legally present non-US Citizens who obtain temporary driver's licenses, there is no list of illegal aliens to compare with our voter records. Therefore, any illegal alien that registers to vote before the implementation date will likely go undetected and remain on the Kansas voter rolls for years.

A few examples of aliens registering to vote illustrate how significant this problem can be. In 1997, a ballot issue was before voters concerning whether to allow a particular type of hog farming operation in Seward County. A few weeks before the election, a bus full of individuals believed to be aliens rolled up to the county clerk's office, where they were unloaded and told to register to vote. The clerk realized what was happening, but she was powerless to stop it. Under Kansas law at the time, the clerk had to allow them to register as long as they filled out and signed a voter registration card.

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Another incident happened in 2010, just across the state line. In the 2010 state representative race in Kansas City, Mo., between J.J. Rizzo and Will Royster, the election was allegedly stolen when Rizzo received approximately 50 votes illegally cast by citizens of Somalia. According to eyewitnesses, the Somalis, who didn't speak English, were coached to vote in his favor by an "interpreter" at the polling place. The margin of victory? One vote.

To vote in Kansas, a person must be a U.S. Citizen. The S.A.F.E. Act passed with broad bipartisan support in Kansas. There is no reason to delay requirements which were supported by such a broad majority. The state must have anti-fraud measures in place as quickly as possible. In fact, delay causes more problems. Of the 32 matches we discovered last year, there are still 27 currently on our voter rolls. For legal reasons, it is incredibly difficult to remove individuals from the voter rolls, even if they are not legally qualified to vote. Moving the implementation date forward will protect our voter rolls and avoid the difficult and time intensive process of trying to remove these individuals in the future.

Every four years, there is a surge of new voter registrations in the months before a presidential election. For example, approximately 149,000 people registered to vote in Kansas in the four months before the November 2008 presidential election. A significant portion came from Motor Vehicles offices. In contrast, an average of only approximately 6,200 voters registered each month in 2011.

A similar wave of new registrations is about to begin this fall in the run-up to the presidential election of 2012. The reason we need the proof of citizenship protection in place beforehand is that it is extremely difficult to find and remove the aliens on our voter rolls once they get on. Yet it is very easy to stop them from registering in the first place if the SAFE Act protections are in place. If we are serious about protecting the integrity of our voter rolls, we need to act now, before the wave of new voter registrations hits.

Additionally, a statewide voter education media campaign is already educating voters about the photo ID requirement that became effective January 1, 2012. My office is currently developing proof of citizenship educational materials. These materials will be distributed publically just before the effective date so citizens who register thereafter will know what documents to present at voter registration. Educating voters about the voter ID requirement and proof of citizenship requirement at the same time will minimize any confusion.

During 2012, there will be more than 165 elected positions on the ballot. Each candidate running for one of these positions is a stake holder in educating the public about this law. The incentive for these candidates to partner with my office to educate the public decreases dramatically after the November elections. Moving the date forward will ensure that candidates help educate Kansans about the proof of citizenship requirement as well as the photographic identification requirement.

Finally, I would like to explain my proposed amendment to H.B. 2437. The Division of Motor Vehicles believes that by August 1 it can confidentially and securely share driver's license proof of identity documentation with election officials who verify proof of citizenship for voting. Our proposed amendment makes the actual starting date of the final improvements to the DMV computer system irrelevant.

The amendment we propose creates a six month period whereby receipt of the proof of citizenship document by the DMV is good enough to satisfy the voting law. Transfer of the

document to the secretary of state or a county election officer need not occur immediately. Under our amendment, DMV's receipt of the document will be enough to satisfy Kansas voting law requirements in 2012. Only after January 1, 2013, will it be necessary for DMV to transmit the document to the county election officers or the secretary of state's office. The DMV can implement this proposal immediately, since they are already receiving documents and scanning them into the system.

Our amendment will also provide a period whereby county election officers and voter applicants can become familiar with the law before the "hard assessment" of citizenship documents by county election officers begins in 2013. The amendment also allows us to educate voters during an election cycle when they are more inclined to listen to our education advertisements on radio and TV.

I have also attached a letter from Secretary Jordan indicating that this will work from their perspective. As you know, DMV is already collecting proof of citizenship documents – the technical issues that we are waiting on DMV to solve involve transmission of those documents to the voter database (which will now be unnecessary until 2013).

I urge the committee to amend House Bill 2437 as I proposed, to recommend favorably for passage, and to avoid unnecessary delays in ensuring that only United States citizens are registered to vote in Kansas.

## Senate Committee on Ethics and Elections Instances of Voter Registration by Non-U.S. Citizens

March 15, 2012

In 2011, the Secretary of State's office compared voter registration records to driver's license records and discovered 32 aliens registered to vote in Kansas. We are providing a summary of the information to the committee for its consideration.

- 1. The records indicate that of the 32 such individuals, five are no longer registered to vote. One was removed for a felony conviction, three moved out of the county, and one was removed based on information provided by the Immigration and Naturalization Service.
- 2. Of the 32 individuals, two registered in 1998; one in 2002; 11 in 2008; three in 2009; and 13 in 2010. Of the remaining two, one registered in 1994 and one in 2000.
- 3. Fifteen of the individuals registered to vote through motor vehicle procedures during or after 2007. We are unable to determine which individuals registered in person and which used the online process.
- 4. Each applicant for voter registration must check a box indicating whether he/she is a U.S. citizen and must sign a statement saying that he/she possesses the qualifications of an elector, including U.S. citizenship. The signature indicates that the person knew he/she was applying for registration. Each applicant subsequently receives a mailed notice from the appropriate county election officer informing the applicant of the disposition of the application.
- 5. The individuals were registered to vote in the following counties: 1 in Barton, 1 in Cloud, 1 in Crawford, 1 in Ellis, 1 in Finney, 1 in Ford, 5 in Johnson, 1 in Kearny, 1 in Leavenworth, 3 in Lyon, 3 in Riley, 6 in Sedgwick, 1 in Seward, 1 in Shawnee, 1 in Thomas, and 4 in Wyandotte.

Dear Secretary Kobach:

In response to your inquiry, I write to confirm that, in 2011, the Department of Revenue's Division of Vehicles completed the statewide rollout of photo-first technology, which allows us to electronically capture proof of identity documents and more effectively verify lawful presence for driver's licenses as required by law. For first-time Kansas driver's licenses, we are now capturing images of drivers' birth certificates and other proof of identity documents, and we will continue to do so in the future.

We also are in the process of integrating the photo-first technology into the state's larger DMV modernization project, which we anticipate implementing this summer. We estimate that August 1, 2012, is the date by which we will have implemented both phases of the new voter vehicle system and be able to confidentially and securely transmit images of proof of citizenship documents to election officials who verify proof of citizenship for voting.

We understand that, in light of the August implementation date, you are now proposing a "soft" assessment of citizenship documents from June 15, 2012-December 31, 2012, under which we will-provide your-office with regular lists of new-licensees-who have provided proof of identity—documents to the Division of Vehicles for the purposes of obtaining driver's licenses. You could then use these lists as you wish to register voters under the Secure and Fair Elections Act.

As soon as the technological capability is in place, we also will provide electronic copies of the documents-themselves. The documents collected during this timeframe would be transferred to election officials no later than December 31, as requested. Our system is already receiving such documents; the work being done now will integrate those documents into the new motor vehicle system for our purposes, as well as facilitating the transfer of them to election officials.

## 3. Valid Proof of U.S. Citizenship Documents

The following documents may be used as proof of United States citizenship for purposes of registering to vote in Kansas:

- Driver's license or nondriver identification card issued by the division
  of vehicles or the equivalent governmental agency of another state
  within the United States if the agency indicates on the applicant's
  driver's license or nondriver identification card that the person has
  provided satisfactory proof of United States citizenship
- · Birth certificate that verifies United States citizenship

(If only the number of the certificate of naturalization is provided, the applicant shall not be included in the registration rolls until the number of the certificate of naturalization is verified with the United States Bureau of Citizenship and Immigration Services by the county election officer or the secretary of state, pursuant to 8 U.S.C. § 1373(c))
- Other documents or methods of proof of United States citizenship issued by the federal government pursuant to the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952

- Bureau of Indian Affairs card number, tribal treaty card number or tribal enrollment number
- Consular report of birth abroad of a citizen of the United States
- Certificate of citizenship issued by the United States Bureau of Citizenship and Immigration Services
- Certification of report of birth issued by the United States Department of State
- American Indian card, with KIC classification, issued by the United States Department of Homeland Security
- Final adoption decree showing the applicant's name and United States birthplace
- United States military record of service showing applicant's place of birth in the United States
- Extract from a United States hospital record of birth created at the time of the applicant's birth indicating the applicant's place of birth in the United States
