Mike Heim, Revisor, read and explained the bill. Clancy Holeman, Riley County Counselor gave testimony that would confirm the right of all counties to accept credit and debit cards for county services (attachment 1). Nathan Eberline, Kansas Association of Counties testified that **SB 207** would clarify the authority of Kansas counties to accept credit and debit card payments. (attachment 2) Written testimony was submitted by Alvan D. Johnson, Riley County Board of Commissioners, Chairman (attachment 3).

Discussion followed that focused on the "convenience fee". The question was posed as to whether the "convenience fee" would be a problem we should address. The response was that we could allow citizens to pay by credit/debit card, but then the taxpayers would be paying the convenience fee out of the general fund. This bill permits us to shift the burden for paying the fee to the individual citizen that wants this service.

<u>Senator Kelsey moved to pass SB 207 out of committee. The motion was seconded by Senator Huntington. The motion passed.</u>
