Representative Larry Powell turned the introduction of Congressman Tim Huelskamp over to Senator Ostmeyer.

Congressman Huelskamp is on the Washington Agriculture Committee. Kansas has had a long history with this committee. Last fall there was discussion on the Super Committee. In this committee they began to talk about the farm bill, which was discussed for an hour. He also described the free trade agreements with Korea, Panama, and Columbia as a positive. Kansas was a big winner in these agreements. These countries want to buy our wheat, beef, and corn. Korea will be an area of growth for decades to come. Vietnam was also interested in pork products for the future. A Vietnam ambassador came to Washington County to see how pork was produced here.

Also, the farm bill debate over crop insurance will continue. Senator Pat Roberts is working very hard on that issue. Last fall the failure of MF Global was a disappointment. Farmers need protection of risk management.
