Re: SB 22 - Extension of the Postsecondary Technical Education Authority

Chair Kelley and members of the House Education Committee, my name is Keven Ward and I am a Public Sector Consultant with Trane U.S., Inc. I am requesting your full support for extending the Technical Education Authority.
