Re: Prison Bed Impact Assessment, **SB 61** Human trafficking

IMPACT ASSESSMENT

- Impact on Prison Admissions: The impact of this bill will result in 3 additional prison admissions each year during the forecast period.
- Impact on Prison Beds: The impact of this bill will result in 3 additional prison beds in FY 2014 and 15 additional prison beds in FY 2023.

SUMMARY OF THE BILL

- New Section 1 would authorize the Attorney General to coordinate training regarding human trafficking for law enforcement agencies throughout Kansas.
- New Section 2 would designate the human trafficking advisory board established by the Attorney General as the official human trafficking advisory board for the state of Kansas.
- New Section 3 would establish the human trafficking victim assistant fund in the state treasury.
- New Section 4 would create a new crime, commercial sexual exploitation of a child. Commercial sexual exploitation of a child is a:
 - o Severity level 5, person felony;
 - Severity level 2, person felony when committed by a person who has, prior to the commission of the crime, been convicted of a violation of this section; or
 - Commercial sexual exploitation of a child or attempt, conspiracy or criminal solicitation to commit commercial sexual exploitation of a child is an **off-grid** person felony when the offender is 18 years of age or older and the victim is less than 14 years of age.
- **New Section 5** would supplement the provisions of the revised code for care of children
- **New Section 6** would create a staff secure facility and define the services to be provided.

- New Section 7 would provide help, support and services for the victims of human trafficking and establish a toll-free assistance hotline.
- Section 9 would add a new subsection (b) by requiring, on and after July 1, 2013, that the judge or clerk of the municipal court remit any fine for a violation of a city ordinance prohibiting the acts prohibited by K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6421 to the state treasurer and credit the entire amount to the human trafficking victim assistance fund.
- **Section 10** would add new subsection (b) providing criteria for a petition for expungement of violation of a city ordinance.
- Section 11 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-5301(c)(2)(G) by replacing promoting prostitution, as defined in K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6420, with commercial sexual exploitation of a child, as defined in section 4, if the victim is less than 14 years of age. This pertains to attempt.
- Section 12 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-5302(d)(2)(G) by replacing promoting prostitution, as defined in K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6420, with commercial sexual exploitation of a child, as defined in section 4, if the victim is less than 14 years of age. This pertains to conspiracy.
- Section 13 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-5303(d)(2)(G) by replacing promoting prostitution, as defined in K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6420, with commercial sexual exploitation of a child, as defined in section 4, if the victim is less than 14 years of age. This pertains to solicitation.
- Section 14 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6419(b), by replacing prostitution with selling sexual relations and adding promoting the sale of sexual relations and commercial sexual exploitation of a child, as defined in section 4, if the victim is less than 14 years of age.
- Section 15 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-5502 to add a new subsection (a)(16), commercial sexual exploitation of a child, as defined in section 4, if the victim is less than 14 years of age.
- Section 16 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6419, by replacing prostitution with selling sexual relations and adding a new subsection (c), an affirmative defense to the charge.
- Section 17 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6420, by replacing promoting prostitution with promoting the sale of sexual relations. This section would also increase the severity level for promoting the sale of sexual relations from a class A misdemeanor to a severity level 9, person felony and delete the severity level 6, person felony penalty when the prostitute is under 16 years of age.
- Section 18 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6421 by replacing patronizing a prostitute, a class C misdemeanor, with buying sexual relations. Buying sexual relations would be a:
 - o Class A person misdemeanor; and
 - Severity level 9, person felony when committed by a person who has, prior to the commission of the crime, been convicted of a violation of this, or any prior violation of this section.
- Section 20 would amend the definition in K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6626(c)(2), "sexually violent crime", by adding aggravated human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation of a child as defined in section 4 to the list of offenses considered for an offender being designated as an aggravated habitual sex offender.

- Section 21 would amend the K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6627(a)(1)(E) by replacing promoting prostitution, as defined in K.S.A.2012 Supp. 21-6420, with commercial sexual exploitation of a child, as defined in section 4, if the victim is less than 14 years of age.
- Section 23 would amend the definition in K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6815, "crime of extreme sexual violence", by adding aggravated human trafficking, if the victim is less than 14 years of age and commercial sexual exploitation of a child as defined in section 4, if the victim is less than 14 years of age.
- Section 24 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 22-2515 by adding human trafficking, aggravated human trafficking, sexual exploitation of a child, commercial sexual exploitation of a child, buying sexual relations and selling sexual relations to the list of felonies in which a wiretap may be sought.
- Section 25 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 22-2530 by replacing prostitution with selling sexual relations in the requirements for obtaining a search warrant.
- Section 26 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 22-3601(b)(4)(F), by replacing promoting prostitution, as defined in K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 21-6420, to commercial sexual exploitation of a child, as defined in subsection (b)(2) of section 4.
- Section 27 would amend the definition in K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 22-3717, "sexually violent crime" by adding aggravated human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation of a child, as defined in section 4.
- Section 28 would amend the definition of common nuisances in K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 22-3901, by replacing promoting and habitual prostitution, with promoting and habitually promoting the sale of sexual relations.
- Section 29 would amend K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 22-4902, the Kansas offender registration act, by adding aggravated human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation of a child as defined in section 4 to the list.
- The remaining sections have no criminal penalties.

KEY ASSUMPTIONS

- The target population of this bill includes any offender who commits a crime or crimes as defined above.
- Projected admission to prison for the target offender is assumed to increase by an annual average of 2%, which is the same percentage used in relation to the baseline prison population forecast produced in August 2012 by the Kansas Sentencing Commission.
- It is assumed that the effective date is on July 1, 2013.

FINDINGS

Aggravated Human Trafficking

 Currently, two offenders are incarcerated in prison for the crime of aggravated human trafficking. One was sentenced at nondrug severity level 1 and one at nondrug severity level 2.

Commercial Sexual Exploitation of a Child

- o In FY 2012, **one offender** was convicted of the crime of **promoting prostitution**, in which the prostitute was less than 14 years of age and the offender was 18 years of age or older. The offender was sentenced to probation at severity level 7.
- According to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation, four offenders were arrested for the crime of promoting prostitution, in which the prostitutes were 16 years of age and older.
- No arrest data is available for FY 2012.

• Selling Sexual Relations (formerly Prostitution):

According to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation, in FY 2011, there were 359 misdemeanor arrests for the crime of **prostitution** involving 152 offenders.

• Promoting the Sale of Sexual Relations (formerly Promoting Prostitution):

- According to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation, in FY 2011, there were 59 misdemeanor arrests for the crime of **promoting prostitution** involving 29 offenders.
- o In FY 2011, **one** offender was sentenced to prison at severity level 9 for the crime of **promoting prostitution**.

• Buying Sexual Relations (formerly Patronizing a Prostitute):

According to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation, in FY 2011, there were 72 misdemeanor arrests for the crime of patronizing a prostitute involving 50 offenders.

IMPACT ASSESSMENT

• Commercial Sexual Exploitation of a Child

- o If **one** offender each year is convicted of the crime of commercial sexual exploitation of a child, the victim is less than 14 years of age and the offender was 18 years of age or older and the offender is sentenced to an off-grid prison term of 25 years, by:
 - FY 2014, one prison bed would be needed; and
 - FY 2023, **10 prison beds** would be needed.
- o If **four** offenders are convicted of the crime of commercial sexual exploitation of a child and **two** are sentenced to prison at severity level 5 with 32 months and the other **two** are sentenced to probation at severity level 5, by:
 - FY 2014, two prison beds would needed; and
 - FY 2023, **five prison beds** would be needed.

• Selling Sexual Relations (formerly Prostitution)

- The penalty of this section remains unchanged. Therefore, there is **no impact** on prison admission and bed need.
- Promoting the Sale of Sexual Relations (formerly Promoting Prostitution)
 - If 50% of the 29 offenders who were arrested for the crime of promoting the sale of sexual relations are convicted and sentenced to probation at severity level 9, person felony, there would be no immediate impact on prison admission or bed need.
- Buying Sexual Relations (formerly Patronizing a Prostitute)
 - Creating a severity level 9, person felony for the second conviction would result in **no immediate impact** on prison admission and bed need.
- The remaining sections of the bill have **no impact** on prison admission and bed need.

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
