1 AN ACT concerning school districts; establishing celebrate freedom week 2 and related curriculum.

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4 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

5 Section 1. (a) In order to educate students about the sacrifices made 6 for freedom in the founding of this country and the values on which this 7 country was founded, the week starting September 15, 2013, and the week 8 of September containing the 17<sup>th</sup> day of such month in each year thereafter 9 is hereby designated as "celebrate freedom week" in each public school.

(b) The state board of education, in cooperation with such other state
agencies or private entities who voluntarily participate, shall promote
"celebrate freedom week" through a coordinated program.

(c) For purposes of this section, Sunday is deemed to be the first dayof the week.

15 Sec. 2. On or before December 31, 2014 2013, the state board of education shall adopt rules and regulations requiring appropriate 16 17 instruction be provided as part of the curriculum on-eivil history and 18 government concerning the original intent, meaning and importance of the 19 declaration of independence and the United States constitution, including 20 the bill of rights of the United States constitution, in their historical 21 contexts. The religious references in the writings of the founding fathers 22 shall not be censored when presented as part of such instruction. Such 23 rules and regulations shall provide that the study of the declaration of 24 independence include the study of the relationship of the ideas expressed in that document to subsequent American history, including the 25 26 relationship of such ideas to the rich diversity of our people as a nation of 27 immigrants, the American revolution, the formulation of the United States 28 constitution and the abolitionist movement, which led to the emancipation proclamation and the women's suffrage movement. Such instruction shall 29 be taught during "celebrate freedom week," established under section 1, 30 and amendments thereto, or during such other full school week as 31 determined by the board of education of the school district. 32

33 Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its34 publication in the statute book.
